Killings Continue

OAS Bombs 12 Schools

ALGIERS (AP) — Secret Army Organization terrorists bombed and burned public schools and buildings Saturday, vowing to leave only debris and ruins for an independent Algeria.

Police reported a dozen empty schools were destroyed or damaged by plastic bombs, phosphorus grenades or charges of explosives attached to gasoline containers. Two town halls were damaged by fire.

A secret army pirate radio broadcast said Moslems "will get Algeria as we found it 130 years ago."

The terrorists continued their attacks against Moslems and Europeans considered to favor Algerian independence.

Mortar, machine gun and bomb attacks killed at least 20 persons—most of them Moslems—and wounded more than 33 by nightfall.

Three wounded Europeans were finished off by terrorist bullets while being carried away in ambulances. Two died when their ambulance was stopped by a band of Europeans who flung open the rear doors and went inside. The ambulance crew heard several pistol shots.

The third victim, in a separate incident, was shot to death through the rear window by Europeans who blocked the ambulance way.

The day's bloodshed began at dawn, with the thunder of 29 mortar shells fired into the Moslem Belfort section in the suburb of Maison Charee. No one from the European side went to pick up the Moslem victims.

The Belfort victims were not included in the tally compiled by police.

School Board To Discuss Building Plans

Discussion of the Eugene School District's long range building program is scheduled for the agenda at Monday's Eugene School Board meeting.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. standard, 8 p.m. daylight, in the School Administration Building, 275 E. Seventh Ave.

Among other topics on the agenda:

- Consideration of bids for school buses, bids and supplies.
- Consideration of preliminary plans for a new junior high school in the Santa Clara area.
- Report on the disposition of inventory of textbooks provided for private and parochial schools.
- Approval of lists of graduating seniors for North and South Eugene High.

Thornton Ruling Blocks UO Plan

SALEM (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Saturday that \$40,000 in federal grant money that higher education wants to spend on a research laboratory building in Eugene comes under the \$900,000 statutory limit on expense for minor capital outlay.

The State Board of Higher Education asked for the opinion. The project is a paleoecology lab at the University of Oregon, for the study of environment and evolution of mammalian communities. It ties in with a research grant from the National Science Foundation.

Thornton said the state's \$900,000 limit on minor capital outlay projects for higher education includes "granted" funds. This, he said, is consistent with legislative intent to exercise control over the state's capital construction program.

Iceland Vote Eyed Closely

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) — Iceland's voters will choose new city and town councils Sunday in an election that will test Communist strength in this NATO country defended by 4,000 U.S. sailors and Marines.

Transcending local issues, this first countrywide vote since a coalition government took office in February 1960, will be watched closely in Washington and Moscow for clues to the effect of ceaseless Communist propaganda against the North Atlantic Treaty Organization base and its American garrison.

Iceland, a nation of only 175,000, has no armed forces of its own.

The Communists, who captured almost a fifth of the vote at the last general election in October 1959, have assailed the base as a danger to the country, and a blow to national pride.

They sought last March to cancel the American-held license for a television station at the U.S. Naval Base at Keflavik but were defeated 43 to 8 in Parliament.

The Communists claimed the station, the only one in the country, was damaging the culture of 1,000 Icelanders who owned sets and tuned in on jazz and Westerns.

Russell to Sponsor Moscow Gathering

LONDON (AP) — Bertrand Russell says he will serve as a sponsor of the World Peace Congress in Moscow despite threats to expel him from the British Labor Party.

"I shall go on doing what I think fit and if that means the Labor Party does not want me I don't mind very much—I can do without them perhaps," said the 90-year-old philosopher.

Probing Marshall's Death

Grand Jury Gets Data on Estes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department rushed confidential material Saturday on financier Billie Sol Estes to a Texas grand jury that is investigating the death of agricultural official Henry H. Marshall.

The material, part of a Department of Agriculture report on Estes and cotton allotments, isn't likely to shed any light on the circumstances of Marshall's death.

However, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said, there are several references to Marshall in the report and they are being made available under a well-recognized procedure.

Before he was found dead last June 3 on his farm near Franklin, Tex., Marshall had been investigating Estes' cotton acreage allotments. Marshall's death at first was ruled a suicide, but the case was reopened last week and a pathologist said Marshall probably was murdered.

The report already has been given to the Senate Investigations subcommittee headed by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., which is probing Estes' tangled affairs.

Kennedy said the Justice Department's criminal division has prepared verbatim excerpts from the report and all possibly relevant parts were flown to Texas Saturday in an effort to cooperate as fully as possible with the Robertson County, Tex., grand jury.

The U.S. attorney in Dallas, will offer the material to the grand jury when it reconvenes Monday in Franklin, Kennedy said.

Trains Crash; Injuries Few

RAVENNA, Ohio (AP) — Three cars of a fast-moving passenger train were banged off the rails by a sideswiping freight car Saturday, but injuries—miraculously—were few.

Eleven persons were treated at Robinson Memorial Hospital and were released. Most of them sustained only cuts and bruises.

The collision left nine cars of the freight train strewn across the Baltimore and Ohio tracks in Ravenna's industrial area. The first car in the Washington-to-Cleveland passenger train was knocked over virtually on its side.

This was a combination baggage and snack car. The next car, a passenger coach, was tilted at a 45-degree angle.

Man, Wife Hurt In Car Crash

Faye L. Teare and his wife, Lucille Mae, both of 1055 W. Hilliard St., Eugene, were injured Saturday afternoon when the car which they were driving was struck on Game Farm Road.

Teare, 50, and Mrs. Teare, 46, were taken to Valley Lane Hospital in Eugene where their conditions were listed as "fairly good" Saturday night. State police said that a car driven by Edward A. Rice, 20, of Rt. 2, Box 272, Eugene, struck the Teare vehicle as it attempted to turn into a private driveway on Game Farm Road, one-half mile off Harlow Road. The accident occurred at 4:48 p.m. daylight.

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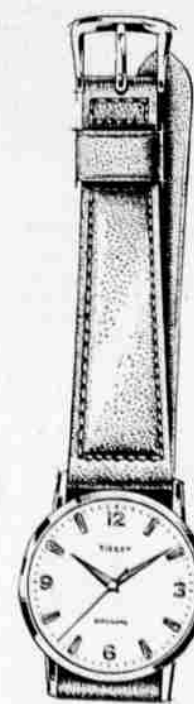
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
