Offices, Firms To Take Holiday

Most Eugene businesses and public offices will be closed Wednesday in observance of Memorial Day, a national holiday.

City, state, county and federal offices will be closed. Public schools and the University of Oregon will observe the holiday.

On legal holidays, it is not necessary to put money in the city's parking meters.

The Eugene Public Library will be closed. The University of Oregon library will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. standard, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daylight.

U.S. Proposes International Launch Site

GENEVA (AP) — The United States Monday proposed establishment of an international launching site for space research near the equator.

The proposal was made by U. S. Delegate Homer Newell, director of space sciences of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, at the first meeting of a subcommittee of a new United Nations committee on the peaceful uses of outer space.

Newell told the 28-nation committee there was a need for a rocket range somewhere near the equator to supplement similar ranges already operating. This could be a good starting point for international cooperation in space research, he said.

There was no discussion of the proposal at the brief opening meeting, which elected David F. Martyn, head of Australia's national committee on space research, as chairman of the four-week session.

PORTLAND (AP) — Fourteen-year-old Ronald Mowlds of Portland has earned a trip to Greenville, Tennessee, to compete in the Veterans of Foreign Wars national marble tournament June 21-24.

Second place went to 12-year-old Donald Lutz of Bend, third place to Douglas Lathan of Sheridan.

Carpenter's Flight Draws K's Praise

Red Says Russia Not Alone in Space

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Premier Khrushchev, opening an Italian industrial fair, Monday praised American astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter and said the Soviet Union now is not alone in the cosmos. His remarks came as the Soviets shot another unmanned satellite into orbit.

Scores of Italians and Soviets, clustered around the speaker's stand, heard the Soviet leader praise Italian industry, but spend most of the half-hour talk on Carpenter's orbital flight.

"Now we are not alone in the cosmos," he said. "Now the Americans have put two men in space."

The Soviet premier congratulated America's two spacemen, John H. Glenn Jr. and Carpenter, adding:

"I especially congratulate the second one on his courage and fortitude in a situation when he could have turned up if something went wrong, or drowned in the sea."

He scoffed at the scientists who directed the latest flight for the incident when Carpenter's space suit heated up.

"They couldn't give him any better advice than 'Drink as much water as possible,'" he said.

Orbiting of the new unmanned satellite — Cosmos 5 — was announced by Tass, the Soviet news agency. Tass said it is a routine device and functioning normally, the fifth in the Cosmos series which the Soviet Union started March 16.

The Italian fair was held in the pavilion built by the United States for its big exhibition and bought afterward by the Soviets.

Khrushchev severely criticized the American fair, which he said had made the worst possible impression on the Russian people "because there was nothing but propaganda in it."

He complained that the kitchen in which he debated with Vice President Richard M. Nixon was a propaganda fake.

"The kitchen was created to surprise Russians," he said. "But it did not."

Churches Conduct Integrated Service

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Seven white and four Negro babies were baptized in an integrated service Sunday at the First Methodist Church with a Negro bishop and a white bishop presiding. The babies were children of ministers.

Three joint services closed the annual conventions of the Central Kansas Conference, headed by Bishop Eugene Slater of Topeka, and the Central West Conference, a six-state Negro Methodist organization led by Bishop Matthew W. Clair Jr. of St. Louis, Mo.

NBC Reschedules AMA Spokesman

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Broadcasting Co. says the cancellation of a program on which an American Medical Assn. spokesman was to appear Sunday night resulted from a conflict with Astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter's news conference.

The network said the AMA spokesman, Dr. Neal Annis of Miami, would appear at a later date on the pre-meet television program, "Meet the Press."



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Damascus Fair Opens Saturday

DAMASCUS (AP) — Little Damascus, the opening of its Century 19 Little World's Fair just five days away, is humming with activity.

Ground still has not been broken for a horse-drawn, merry-go-round restaurant — a poor man's Space Needle — but can-can girls are rehearsing in full dress on a partially completed boardwalk.

Most of the town's 200 residents are involved in preparations for the event, just as they were in 1959 when the community staged its own version of Oregon's Centennial celebration.

A highlight of the Little World's Fair will be the lighting of a tall peace candle by Ingrid Engstrom, 22, Sweden's former Lucia Bride.

Americans See No Chinese Refugees

HONG KONG (AP) — Two Americans arrived from Red China Monday and reported complete quiet on the Communist side of the border across which thousands of Chinese refugees have swarmed in recent weeks.

Mary Downey and her son William of New Britain, Conn., came from Peiping where they had visited Mrs. Downey's other son, John. He has spent 10 years in a Red Chinese jail serving a life sentence on spy charges.

William Downey said they saw no sign of any refugees during the 95-mile train ride from Canton to Hong Kong. Thousands of refugees rode the train to the frontier between May 1, and last Friday when Communist guards tightened border control.

The undersea research ship Seaview, brought here by an American marine engineer, Edwin Link, located the marble pieces of the church in the cargo of a Greek ship which sank off Cape Passero, outside Siracusa Harbor, in the Sixth Century A.D.

Almost the entire cargo was salvaged.

Plenty of Hugs and Warm Smiles

Wives Greet Astronauts

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.

No tears, but plenty of hugs and warm smiles marked the welcome home for America's newest spacemaster, Malcolm Scott Carpenter.

The sunburnt and smiling astronaut walked down the ramp from an Air Force plane Sunday into the welcoming embrace of his attractive wife Rene.

His fellow astronauts, with the exception of Donald K. "Deke" Slayton, scrambled out of the two planes returning from Grand Turk Island in the Bahamas — and started looking for their wives.

John H. Glenn Jr., who got off the first plane, spotted his Annie, rushed over and hugged her. He stood with his arm around his wife, waiting

for Carpenter's plane to arrive.

Louise Shepard was on hand to greet her husband, Alan B. Shepard Jr., who had been in California during preparations and launching of Carpenter's orbital flight.

Also joining in the welcoming were astronauts Walter Schirra and Leroy Gordon Cooper Jr.

Only Mrs. Slayton had no husband to ride with her in the 12-mile motorcade to Cape Canaveral from Patrick Air Force Base. Slayton was unable to return in time from Australia where he had been assigned during Carpenter's flight Thursday.

Rene Carpenter looked cool and poised in spite of a hot sun. She wore a two-piece green linen ensemble, white pumps and a white head band in her ash-blond hair.

Her handsome 37-year-old husband, after giving her a kiss, crooked an arm around her neck and greeted their four children and then his mother, Florence Carpenter of Boulder, Colo.

Carpenter was hugged around the knees by his daughter, Candy, 5, who lifted an elbow to show her father a minor bruise.

Carpenter told the crowd of about 500 at the airport that he had had the supreme experience of his life and added, "It's easy to see I'm glad to be back."

The couple held hands and smiled during the drive through friendly but unobtrusive crowds.

As he received the National Aeronautics and Space Ad-

ministration Distinguished Service Medal, Carpenter was serious looking but his wife smiled happily.

"This acclaim is due and merited by a thousand persons here," he told a large group of newsmen and Air Force personnel. He said he accepted it on behalf of "all those people without whom these flights would not occur."

Turning suddenly to his family seated on the platform, he said, "I got carried away and neglected my lovely family."

After introducing them, he pointed to his mother sitting down in the audience. "Of course, I owe more to my mother than anyone else."

The astronaut's father, Malcolm Carpenter of Palmer Lake, Colo., was unable to attend the ceremonies.

Pilot to Give Prized Sword To Brookings

BROOKINGS, Ore. (AP) — Nobuo Fujita brought out the prize Samurai sword he wore on a bombing mission over this region in World War II to give it Monday to this community as a peace-time gift.

Fujita is the only known Japanese pilot to bomb this nation during the war. Now, in a goodwill gesture, he, his wife and son are guests of this community for a week highlighted by the Brookings Azalea Festival last weekend.

Fujita will present the sword to Brookings at a special banquet in his honor tonight. Traditionally, the heirloom, which he describes as "about 600 or 700 years old . . . and one of my most treasured possessions," would go to his son.

Fujita wore the sword when he flew a submarine-based plane and dropped fire bombs into forests near here in 1942. The bombs did little damage.

The Fujitas attended a round of events during the festival, including a parade, a barbecue, flower show, luncheon and dinners. They were warmly greeted everywhere they went.

Fujita, now a Tokyo businessman, also flew over his former targets again. He took the controls briefly, and said he recalled the terrain well.
