

Dems Revise Tax Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Administration supporters in the Senate are proposing a compromise plan to try to save the bitterly disputed plan to withhold taxes on income from dividends and interest.

The compromise, disclosed Friday by Senate Finance Committee members, would exempt from withholding persons with income of \$5,000 or less.

One senator said he understood the proposal might even win the endorsement of the Treasury.

However, it was learned that it has not won over the committee chairman, Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., who has announced his opposition to the withholding plan.

Wilderness Bill Stalled, Solon Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic members of the House Interior Committee were accused Friday of trying to kill an administration-backed plan to preserve millions of acres of public land in a state of natural wilderness.

Rep. John P. Saylor, R-Pa., top GOP member of the committee, said the Democrats had launched a "deliberate attempt to make sure the wilderness bill is not brought up."

It is no secret that many miners, ranchers and lumbermen view the proposed wilderness system as a threat to their livelihood.

The House public lands subcommittee, headed by Rep. Gracie Pfoz, D-Idaho, has held nine days of public hearings on the Senate-passed proposal.

But Saylor told newsmen that an effort was now being made to keep the controversial legislation bottled up in committee.

"If I can blast the bill out of committee and onto the House floor," Saylor said, "there is no question it will be approved."

Under the plan, about seven million acres of public land already declared wilderness areas automatically would be included in the system.

Additional public land, estimated at 60 million acres, would be considered for gradual inclusion in the wilderness system with Congress having a veto power over individual parcels.

Nuclear Shot Due Tonight

May Be Visible 2,000 Miles Away

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States plans to explode a rocket-borne nuclear device about 30 miles over a remote Pacific island tonight, the first of a series of high-altitude weapons tests.

The Atomic Energy Commission said the near-space shot would be held over Johnston Island about 1 a.m., PDT, Saturday.

The experiment, like others to follow through July, is designed to help scientists study effects of the blast on the Earth's magnetic field and the Van Allen radiation belts, which surround the planet. A particular aim is to determine its effect on communications.

The first device will have the power of less than a million tons of TNT. The AEC said it would be set off at an altitude of tens of kilometers, which was unofficially interpreted as meaning about 30 miles.

The joint task force conducting the tests said the explosion could occur any time within five hours after 1 a.m. Saturday. If it is delayed by weather or other reasons for more than five hours, it will be rescheduled.

The AEC said persons 800 miles away in Hawaii would be able to see the glow from the blast and auroral displays resulting from it may be visible in the Samoan area, more than 2,000 miles south of Johnston Island.

In all, the commission intends to explode three or four shots high above Johnston. One, an H-bomb, is to be exploded at an altitude of about 500 miles—perhaps the highest nuclear shot ever set off.

The shots are a new phase of the U.S. atmospheric series which began at Christmas Island April 25. Fourteen announced tests have been conducted in the Christmas Island area so far.

Limp Picket

An unidentified limp peace picket was removed from the U.S. marshal's office in San Francisco Thursday. Peace pickets descended on the office and federal courts for a series of non-violent demonstrations protesting prosecution of three pacifists for contempt of court. The three had attempted to sail a trimaran to Christmas Island nuclear testing area in defiance of a court order.

Evangelist Wants to Return To Small Christian College

CHICAGO (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham, in Chicago for a 19-day crusade for Christ, says he is looking forward to the day when he can return to Christian education work in a small college.

"I don't know when the last crusade will come, but I do know these years of the revival have taken a great physical price," Graham said Thursday. "I don't seem to have the reserve, the strength that I used to have."

The North Carolina evangelist, 43, added "I'm tired of traveling and I'd like to be home with my family."

Graham was president of Northwestern College in Minneapolis from 1947 to 1952.

Some 20,500 persons attended the second night's meeting of the crusade in McCormick Place. Approximately 200 persons made "decisions for Christ," bringing the two-day total of decision makers to about 650.

Judge Delays Proceedings Against Crew

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—U.S. Dist. Judge William T. Sweigert Thursday extended to June 7 a temporary restraining order halting sailing of the boat Everyman toward the nuclear testing ground at Christmas Island in the Pacific.

He also postponed to the same date contempt of court proceedings against the boat's crewmen, Edward Lazar, Harold Stallings and Evan D. Yoes.

The trio was removed from the plywood three-hulled craft, a trimaran, by coast guardsmen and United States marshals off the coast May 26.

The men had sailed out the Golden Gate despite a restraining order issued by Judge Sweigert with the approval of U.S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy.

While court action proceeded slowly, pickets marched around the Federal Courthouse Building. The picketing was by supporters of the Committee for Non-Violent Action, a New York headquartered organization which sponsored the Everyman venture to protest the nuclear testing.

Lazar, 27, still contending the federal court had no jurisdiction because he was apprehended on the high seas, came into court in a wheelchair.

He refuses to walk and uses the chair as a symbol of his non-violent way of denying the court's jurisdiction.

Spoke in Eugene

Edward Lazar made three speaking appearances in Eugene last November. At that time he urged step-by-step disarmament by the United States, regardless of whether the Communist nations followed suit.

Lazar is no stranger to jailings for his pacifist activities. While in Eugene he told of spending 5½ months in jail after participating in a "walk-in" on an Omaha, Neb., missile base.

Male Delivered Marked 'Fragile'

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A youth who tried to ship himself by air in a box labeled "canned goods" has been given a suspended fine and sentence for disorderly conduct.

Fred Milbrocker, 20, Lake Orion, Mich., pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 and sentenced to ten days in jail Wednesday, but Magistrate Hugh White suspended both on condition a checkup showed his previous conduct was good.

The husky young man was arrested at Anchorage International Airport Tuesday. Employees of Northern Consolidated Airlines became suspicious when a 206-pound box

marked "Fragile—Canned Goods" moved.

The big carton addressed to William Miner at Dillingham, Alaska, was ripped open, and out climbed Milbrocker, explaining he and Miner cooked up the scheme to save money.

He said he and Miner drove to Alaska to try to find work and ran short of money, so Miner flew to Dillingham, paying the \$50 fare, and he was to fly as freight. The rate for canned goods is 10 cents a pound.

"When the box wiggled," said Ray Petersen, president of the airline, the men figured either an animal, a person or Mexican jumping beans were being shipped as canned goods."

Petersen said freight marked as canned goods normally would be stored at the bottom of the cargo hold, and Milbrocker might have suffocated after other freight was piled on top of his box.

Milbrocker, who said he and Miner wanted to get into commercial fishing at Dillingham, was encased in a sleeping bag and air mattress inside the large cardboard box.

No charges have been filed against Miner.

Pact Averts Ferry Strike

ASTORIA (AP)—The Inland Boatmen's Union and the Astoria Navigation Co. reached a settlement late Thursday night on a new three-year contract, averting a threatened strike that could have tied up Columbia River ferry operations.

The old contract expired Friday morning.

Richard Hillis, union business agent, came to Astoria from Portland to conduct negotiation of the last-minute settlement.

Hillis said the new contract provides a total wage increase of 48 cents an hour—24 cents the first year, 12 cents the second and another 12 cents the third.

He said that would bring the basic wage to \$3.02 an hour. Hillis said the union agreed to a 6-month extension at the end of the three years, in case the bridge across the Columbia at Astoria is not finished by then.

Astoria Navigation Co. has the contract with the Oregon Highway Department to operate the ferry service.

New Freeway Section Opens

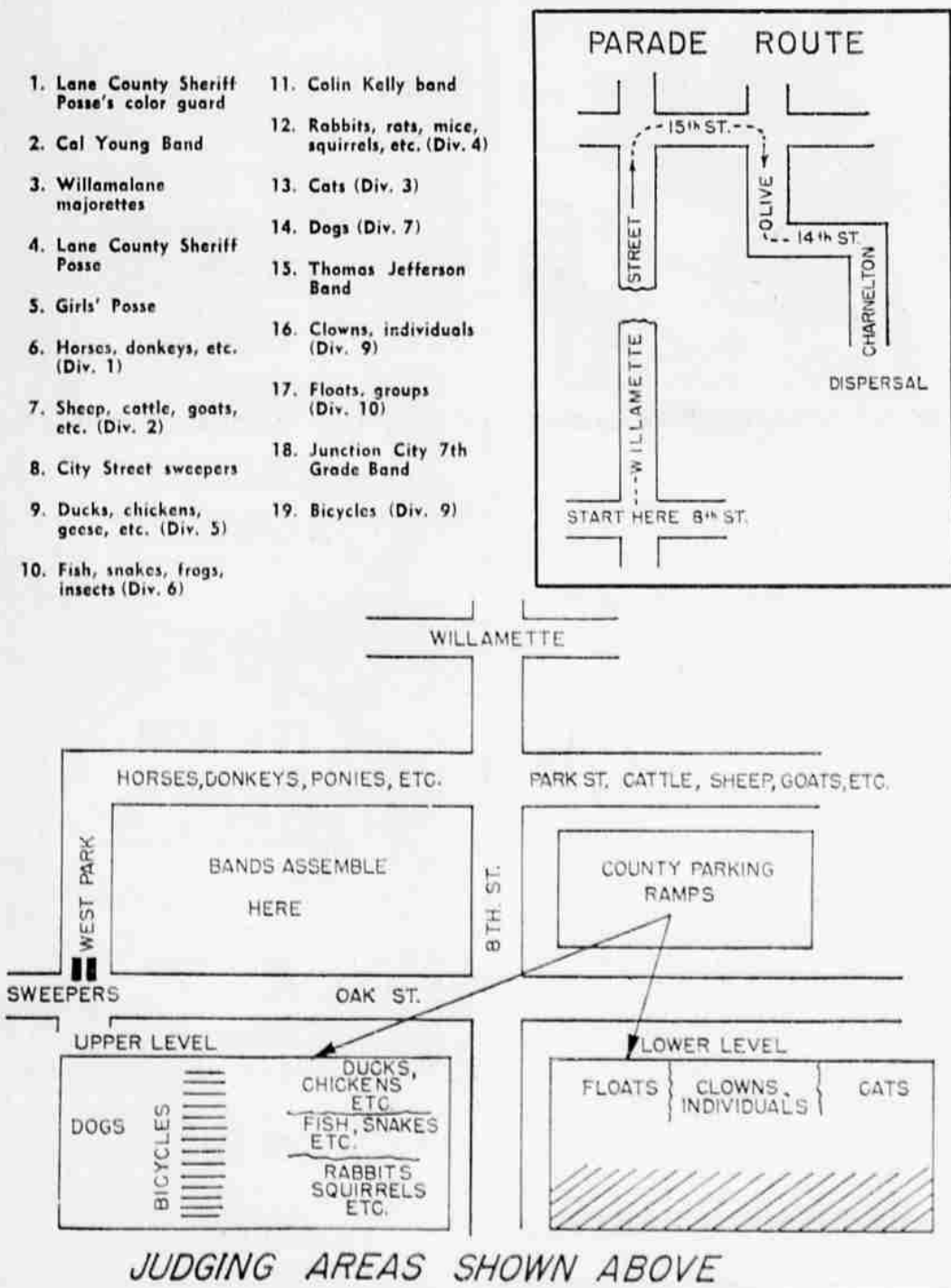
GRANTS PASS (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Friday dedicated a 10-mile section of the Pacific Freeway between Grants Pass and Rogue River.

The new \$10 million section of the route will link two other freeway sections, making a 24-mile stretch that is the third longest section of freeway in the state.

The longest section is 108 miles between Portland and Eugene. Second is a 33-mile highway between Portland and Bonville.
