## Gallery Tour Arranged By Friends of Museum

Lucile Golson, assistant professor of history of art in University of Oregon school of architecture, will conduct a gallery tour Saturday for Friends of the Museum of Art at the university.

The tour will cover The Stieglitz Circle, an exhibition of 52 paintings, sculptures, drawings, and photographs by 12 artists, on display at the Museum through June.

The exhibition, originally sponsored by Alfred Stieglitz, pioneer photographer and crusader for avant garde American art early in this century, now is sponsored by Museum of Modern Art of New York.

Miss Golson, a member of University of Oregon faculty since 1960, was educated at The Sorbonne, Radcliffe College and University of California. Before coming to Oregon, she was museum assistant and lecturer at San Francisco Museum. For two years, she was a research assistant at the Louvre Museum and has written many articles on art history.

Works in the exhibition were selected by Peter Selz, curator of painting and sculpture exhibitions at the Museum of Modern Art. Artists represented in the show in addition to Alfred Stieglitz include Oscar Bluemner, Arthur B. Carles, Charles Demuth, Arthur G. Dove, Marsden Hartley, Gaston Lachaise, John Marin, Alfred Maurer, Elie Nadelman, Georgia O'Keeffe, Max Weber and Edward Steichen.

The tour will begin at 3:30 p.m. standard time, 4:30 p.m. daylight. Tea will be served following the tour.
