

Moslems Fire Into French

ALGIERS — Moslem auxiliary police fired on French troops Tuesday in the first such clash since the Algerians were called in to help cope with European Secret Army terror.

One French lieutenant and three Moslems were killed in the shooting in the Beau Fraiser area south of Algiers, police reported.

Police said the firing broke out when a French patrol was attacked by a group of armed Moslem civilians. The troops immediately returned the fire.

The auxiliary Moslem policemen on duty in the district rushed to the scene and opened fire on the French troops.

Foreign Aid Funds Bill Clears Hurdle

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Foreign Affairs Committee Tuesday gave its final approval to a \$4,688,500,000 foreign aid authorization bill which fell \$810 million short of what President Kennedy wanted.

The committee vote, taken behind closed doors, was 21-4.

The House group, led by Rep. Thomas E. Morgan, D-Pa., chopped \$210 million from Kennedy's general aid requests for next fiscal year. It cut another \$600 million from the President's long-range Alliance for Progress aid plan for Latin America.

Meanwhile, Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala., urged approval of the Senate's \$4,682,000,000 version of the aid bill. In opening floor debate, he called the measure "a realistic approach to United States interests abroad" and a needed buffer to the pressure of Communist imperialism.

His Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved the bill, 14-3.

Kennedy originally asked for a \$4,878,500,000 program. The Senate committee trimmed it by \$216.5 million, including \$100 million requested for Kennedy's contingency fund.

The incident caused grave concern among French authorities, who hope to maintain order in Algiers with cooperation of French troops and the Moslem auxiliaries.

Meanwhile, an expected wave of violence from the Secret Army failed to develop, and the French suspected this was due to deep rifts and indecision in the Secret Army leadership. The Secret Army had ordered a resumption of terrorism after a brief truce, but first reports mentioned two killings of Moslems.

A Moslem was shot down not far from the center of the city and the body of another Moslem was found in the Bouzahreh suburb but calm reigned in most parts of Algiers.

The secret army warned Monday night in a pirate radio broadcast that it was ending the five-day truce in terrorism but that it hoped for further contacts with the Moslem nationalists.

French officials continued to hope for a "solution of reason and good sense." They believed the secret army was torn by indecision and deep ideological and leadership troubles.

In contrast, fear began to sweep Algeria's European community anew. Most Europeans began to lose hope for a settlement that would safeguard their future in a Moslem-run Algeria.

Early Tuesday morning, crowds besieged banks to withdraw their savings. Police stations and administrative buildings were crowded by men and women filling out repatriation documents and demanding passports.

Portland Doctors Hold Rally To Protest Medicare Plan

PORTLAND (UPI) — Doctors in the Portland area staged a rally in the Portland Public Auditorium Monday night opposing President Kennedy's plan for medical care for the aged.

About 2,000 persons attended the rally.

There were some 35 pickets outside the building. The pickets carried signs reading: "Please help us to pay our own way under Social Security. We don't want charity." "Doctors: Please help us protect our families. We depend on you."

The major speakers at the rally were radio and television announcer Harry Von Zell and U.S. Rep. James B. Utt, R-California.

Von Zell charged that the power of the federal government was growing at the expense of the people. He said the proposed medical care plan "deviates from this nation's foundations."

Utt closed the rally with an attack on what he called "the terrific Madison Avenue program put on to sell this to the American public."

"The government will go broke," Utt said, when it begins "giving security from the cradle to the grave."

The Kennedy plan would provide financing for medical care to the aged through the Social Security program.

JFK Replies To Message From Doctor

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy, striking back in the battle for his medical care program, acidly challenged the American Medical Assn. Tuesday "to set the record straight" on its policy toward Social Security.

The White House made public a briskly worded letter from Kennedy to Dr. Leonard W. Larson, AMA president, in reply to a message Larson had addressed to the President late last month.

In his letter, Larson charged Kennedy with spreading the impression that the AMA once referred to the Social Security system as a "cruel hoax" and declared this was untrue.

Larson said the AMA never took a position on the Social Security system, never opposed it and even supported one section calling for extension of public health services.

Kennedy had declared a few days earlier at a news conference that the AMA was one of the chief opponents of Social Security in the 1930s.

In his letter to Larson, Kennedy cited actions he said were taken by the AMA in 1939, 1949 and 1953, all critical of Social Security.

"If your organization did not oppose Social Security before its enactment—only afterwards—I will be glad to point out this unique distinction at my next press conference," Kennedy said.

"Your letter objects to my news conference statement that the AMA was among the opponents of the original Social Security system," the President wrote Larson.

"If your letter endorses the Social Security concept on behalf of the AMA, if it signifies a willingness on the part of the AMA to include doctors under its coverage—then I am certain that your letter will be enthusiastically welcomed by the great majority of the American people."

Smiling as Slyly as a Gate-Crasher

Bob Hope Gets Degree

WASHINGTON—Bob Hope, in cap and gown and smiling as slyly as a gate-crasher, swished grandly into Georgetown University's commencement exercises and remarked: "I feel as out of place as President Kennedy at a meeting of the American Medical Association."

Thus, on the tree-shaded greenward of Georgetown, rapid Robert Hope—whose education was "straight from high school to dancing school and vaudeville"—became an honorary doctor of humane letters Monday.

It was one of the most

rollicking graduation ceremonies in memory.

The principal speaker, the Rev. Gustave Weigel, said "a commencement is hardly a hushed gathering around a dying friend."

Hope proved it. When he received the Latin citation of his degree, he quipped: "I can't wait until I get home and have my son read it to me." Hope, a Presbyterian, said of the Roman Catholic university, "My getting a degree from Georgetown is the end, but then you do specialize in miracles, don't you?"

He called out to his son, Anthony, who was among the 1,066 receiving degrees: "Slump down, you make me feel like Alan Ladd."

As he posed for photographs in his gown, the comedian cracked, "This'll be a shock to some of the educators in Cleveland." That is where he went to school.

There was a serious side to the ceremony. The president of Georgetown, The Very Rev. Edward B. Bunn, S.J., said the degree was

awarded "for your salutary gift of laughter to an often-troubled world." The citation also called attention to his many trips overseas to entertain servicemen.

"The most profitable kind of education is that which makes a man happy in the knowledge that he is of use to others," Hope told the graduates.

"Give a little bit of yourself and it will come back in carloads. This is one of those comeback days for me."

In the machine-gun patter of his television shows, Hope gave a quick rundown on the economic situation:

"The price of steel was so low I hear President Kennedy is even buying some. And AT&T—I put a dime in a telephone this morning and a voice said 'God bless you.' Like all commencement speakers Hope had a few words of advice for the graduates.

Said Hope: "My advice to young people going into the world: Don't go."

Missionaries Still Sought

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — Three American missionaries kidnapped by Communist guerrillas from a leper camp last Wednesday night are still widely hunted.

The government said Tuesday both ground forces and helicopter crews are searching for the three. A mission spokesman said no trace has been found of any of them.

Taken in the raid by a 12-man band on the leper camp, 150 miles northeast of Saigon, were the Rev. A. E. Mitchell, 44, of Ellensburg, Wash.; Dr. Eleanor Ardel Vietti, 35, of Houston, Tex.; and Daniel Gerber, 21, of Dayton, Ohio, a Menonite volunteer who worked as a maintenance man.

The guerrillas eventually have released most of the foreign prisoners taken this year. Communist North Viet Nam has invariably accompanied each release with propaganda aimed at convincing listeners of the peaceful motives of the rebels.

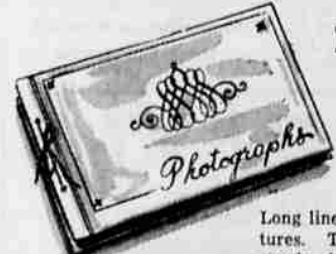

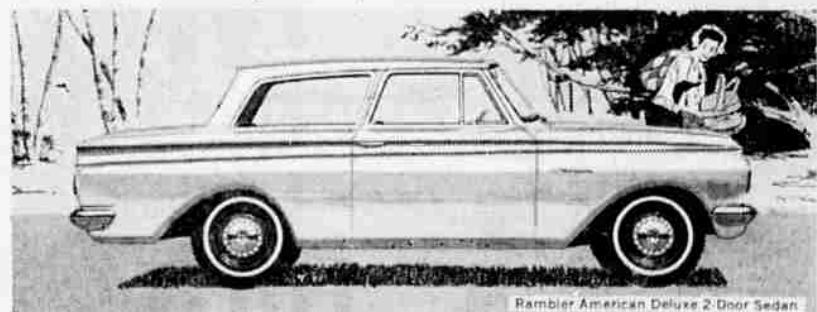
