

# CD Completes Shelter Survey

Lane County is moving into "Phase II" of its part in the national group fallout shelter plan, Asst. County CD Director Ernest Norris said at a staff meeting Monday night.

The first phase consisted of determining which buildings contain areas that might be used for group fallout shelters during nuclear attack, and measuring their protection factor and their capacity.

Norris said data has been returned to the county civil defense office showing those buildings with a protection factor of 40 to 100, and those with a factor of 100 or above. The factor of 100 is designated as the required protection to keep individuals safe from fallout in this area.

(A safety factor of 40 indicates that inside that shelter a person would receive 40 times less radiation than a person standing outside. A safety factor of 100 indicates that the radiation would be 100 times less.)

In the Eugene area data received so far lists 72 shelter areas

in 45 buildings with a factor of 40 or over, and 15 areas in 11 buildings with a factor of 100 or more plus a minimum capacity for 50 persons.

Norris said the local civil defense office will begin immediately contacting the owners of buildings with a factor of 40 or above, asking them to sign a fallout shelter license form.

These forms give permission to use part of the premises for public shelter purposes, to mark the buildings as shelters, and to stock the shelter spaces with emergency food supplies.

While such permission will be asked for all buildings with a factor of 40 or above, only those buildings with a factor of 100 and a minimum capacity of 50 persons will actually be marked and stocked.

County CD Director James C. Koepke noted during the meeting that the federal civil defense program for 1962-63 places all its emphasis on the national group or mass fallout shelter plan.

This is the plan in which all existing large buildings are surveyed to identify those that can be used for shelters for a minimum of 50 persons.

Koepke also said the federal plans indicate that for metropolitan cities the theory of evacuation is "not as tenable" as it used to be, and the likelihood of large cities being evacuated during attack is diminishing.

This means, Koepke said, that in a support area such as Lane County, fewer total evacuees would be expected, but a larger proportion of those received probably would be medical casualties.

Dwight Foster, CD director for Cottage Grove, briefly described that city's plans during the staff meeting Monday. He also announced that he has submitted his resignation from the post, having served three years.

## Lions Given Briefing On Peace Corps

The United States' Peace Corps program and projects like it will help erase the image of the "Ugly American" held by many people abroad, members of the Springfield Lions Club were told Monday noon.

Jim Cloutier, University of Oregon senior in education, explained the operation and purposes of the Peace Corps program and said the cost to establish the project was less than the cost to fire a single Atlas missile.

The program, initiated by presidential order March 1, 1961, is expanding rapidly and will need many hundreds of qualified volunteers in the years to come, Cloutier said.

Request Assistance  
He explained that men and women trained in the Peace Corps program are sent only to those foreign nations which have requested assistance. And a project requested by a foreign nation must first be approved by the Peace Corps before any assistance can be given.

The Peace Corps is looking for teachers, construction workers, farmers, medical technicians, administrative personnel, and other skilled or semi-skilled persons, the speaker said.

A Peace Corps training program for new volunteers is conducted for about three months, generally in a college or university. The three phases of the training program are occupational, survival, and cultural, Cloutier explained.

Volunteers receive \$75 a month salary, a basic living allowance, and transportation.

Northeast Ethiopia  
Cloutier himself will be engaged this summer in what is called the African Crossroads Program, an assistance project sponsored by a private organization.

He and 11 other volunteers will go to northeast Ethiopia to help build classrooms. "We will be sleeping in sleeping bags and living at the village level," he said.

Cloutier said the greatest obstacle in overseas service is not disease and wild animals but "cultural shock" caused by the "boredom and frustration" of suddenly entering a strange environment.
