

# On Forming Coalition Laos Prince Optimistic

KHANG KHAY, Laos — Laos' three rival political princes met in the rebel-held Plaines Des Jarres Thursday, and neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma said the long-awaited agreement on a coalition government might be reached Friday.

Souvanna said his first meeting with Prince Boun Oum of the right-wing Vientiane government and pro-Communist Prince Souphanouvong encountered little difficulty.

"If we continue to work in an similar atmosphere, I am sure we will reach a final agreement Friday," Souvanna said.

It was the prince's first meeting since January.

Boun Oum was accompanied to Khang Kay by his deputy premier and royal government strongman Gen. Phoumi Nosavan.

# Four Sailors Face Hearing On Shooting

YOKOSUKA, Japan — Four 19-year-old U.S. sailors, arrested after the fatal shooting of a Japanese policeman, were referred Thursday to a Japanese family court as juveniles.

George T. Davis, San Francisco attorney who flew here to represent them, said a hearing will be held Monday to determine whether the case should be sent back to the prosecutor's office or taken over by the family court.

The four are apprentice seamen Robert Driscoll of Dumont, N. J.; Joseph J. Urgan Jr., of Canoga Park, Calif.; Eugene Paellli, Atherton, Calif., and Richard Lee Jackson, Kansas City, Kan.

A fifth American, Seaman Edgar Williams, 20, of Scotts Mills, Ore., was indicted Thursday on charges of obstructing police duties.

The policeman, Hiroshi Endo, 38, was shot to death with his own revolver during a brawl in this naval base city May 5.

Jackson was wounded when he tried to escape arrest by Navy shore patrolmen. He is recovering in a Navy hospital.

# Six of Family Die in Blaze

PALMYRA, Pa. — A father and his five young children burned to death in their home 3 1/2 miles north of this Lebanon County community early Thursday.

Fire officials identified the dead as Charles Franklin Neiswender, 27, and his children, Natalie, 6; Kathleen, 5; Charles, 4; Karl, 3; and Terry, 1.

Neiswender's wife, Peggy, was treated for burns and shock at Lebanon's Good Samaritan Hospital.

She told firemen her husband had told her to jump from a window of the family's five-room, one-story frame cottage and he would take care of the children.

Mrs. Neiswender said she did not see her husband or children again as flames swept the building. She ran to the home of neighbors, who called firemen.

Dr. A. H. Heisey, county coroner, said the father was found with the one-year-old child in his arms. The other four youngsters were lined up behind him, as if he had been trying to lead them to safety.

# Goes Home

WASHINGTON — For the first time since taking office, Secretary of State Dean Rusk will pay a visit to Berlin during a 10-day European trip later this month, the State Department announced Thursday.

The department said Rusk will travel to Berlin, Bonn, Paris, Rome, London and Portugal from June 19-28.

One of the main purposes of Rusk's trip is to discuss differences in Allied policy and cold war tactics that have cropped up lately. However, State Department spokesman Lincoln White said he would not call it a "fence mending" mission.

White said Rusk will confer with foreign ministers and other Allied officials in each city. He could not say definitely whether the secretary will see French President Charles de Gaulle and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

He will arrive in Paris June 19, and during his stay there will have an informal meeting with the North Atlantic Council.

Rusk will fly to Berlin June 21 and will continue on that evening to Bonn where he will remain through June 22.

On June 23, he will go to Rome. Rusk will fly to London June 24 and on June 27 will head for Lisbon, en route to the United States.

# Poison Story Discounted

NAPLES, Italy — Charles "Lucky" Luciano died last Jan. 26 of a heart attack and not from poison, an official Italian medical report said Thursday.

There had been reports both here and in the United States that the former New York vice lord might have been poisoned to seal his lips, or taken poison to escape rearrest.

When he staggered and fell dead at Naples Airport, he was being shadowed by Italian narcotics agents. They had questioned him a few hours earlier.

A U.S. Bureau of Narcotics official indicated later that Luciano's arrest had been imminent.

A preliminary medical report said the 64-year-old deported gangster had suffered a heart attack.

Afterward, however, Rome newspapers carried reports that Luciano might have died of poison.

# Funds Allocated

BEAVERTON — The U.S. Public Health Service has allocated \$1,066,000 to the Oregon Primate Research Center near Beaverton, center officials said this week. It was the second installment of the government's continuing grant to operate the center.

# Changes Mind Grace Kelly Turns Down Film Role

NICE, France — Princess Grace of Monaco says she definitely will not play in Alfred Hitchcock's film "Marnie." She indicated she probably has retired from the movies permanently.

The former Grace Kelly announced two months ago that she would make her return to the screen this summer in the Hitchcock movie. Later the British director said he had postponed the production.

The newspaper Nice Matin, published an interview Thursday with Princess Grace.

"On the one hand I will not have time and on the other I have been definitely influenced by the reaction provoked in Monaco at the announcement of my participation in the making of this film," she said.

"Such a 'vacation' devoted to the cinema would have been amusing for me, but under the condition that the prince (her husband, Prince Rainier) and our children be present. That is not possible, and I would not care to go without them. Making a film takes much time nowadays and 'Marnie' would take longer than I had thought."

Asked if she had definitely decided to abandon film making forever, the princess said:

"I would not like to use the word 'definite' but it is evident that the same problem would arise."

# Oil Firm Granted Lease to Explore

Superior Oil Co. of Bakersfield, Calif., has been given a lease to explore for oil on 359 acres of state-owned land in Lane County.

The acreage is located about two miles west of Creswell near the Canas Swale Road.

The firm also was granted exploration leases on 404 acres in Marion County.

The land is owned by the state and leases for 50 cents an acre plus a percentage of profits if oil is taken from the ground.

Superior is also understood to have leased some private lands in the area near Creswell.

# Senate Votes to Cut Off Funds To Red-Dominated Countries

WASHINGTON — The Senate has jolted the Kennedy administration by directing that no slices of next year's foreign aid pie go to a Communist or Marxist dominated nation.

While Secretary of State Dean Rusk was lamenting Wednesday's Senate action as most unfortunate, administration leaders marshaled their forces to fight off another onslaught on the \$4.7-billion authorization measure—an effort to lop off \$400 million.

The aid restriction—still to be considered by the House—is aimed directly at Yugoslavia and Poland, the two Communist nations which receive U.S. help.

# White House Plea

The administration takes the view that by assisting the two it acts to wean them away from domination by the Soviet Union. But the amendment's author, Sen. Frank Lausche, D-Ohio, declared in Wednesday's debate that any aid granted to a Communist country "can never be in the interest of the security of the United States—it can only be in the interest of the promulgation of international communism."

The Lausche amendment passed by a 57-24 vote when 34 Democrats turned a deaf ear to a White House plea and sided with 23 Republicans. Voting with the administration were 18 Democrats and 6 Republicans.

If accepted by the House, which has yet to act on its version of the bill, the amendment would specifically prohibit \$10

million in development loans to Yugoslavia next fiscal year, and ban shipments of surplus agricultural commodities to Yugoslavia and Poland.

The Senate acted within minutes after Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana read a White House letter protesting the cut as an action which would "play into the hands of those who are most hostile to the United States."

"We must have confidence in the President," Mansfield said.

# NW Senators Split on Issue

WASHINGTON — Five senators of the Pacific Northwest and Alaska voted with the majority Wednesday when the Senate approved an amendment to the foreign aid authorization bill.

The senators who voted for the amendment to ban aid to any nation dominated by Communists were Bartlett and Gruening, both of Alaska, Church, Idaho Democrat, and Dworshak, Idaho Republican, and Magnuson, Washington Democrat.

Jackson of Washington voted with the Democrats who opposed the amendment.

Senator Neuberger, Oregon Democrat, did not vote but was announced as paired against the amendment.

Not voting nor paired but announced as against the amendment was Sen. Morse, D-Ore.

as he read the letter from McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to Kennedy.

"Writing Off" Millions  
In his statement Rusk said "adoption of the Lausche amendment will give the impression abroad that we are permanently writing off to Soviet domination the millions of people who still yearn for freedom."

Administration hopes for a modification of the restriction appeared to rest on whatever success it may have in persuading the House not to adopt such an amendment and sending it into a Senate-House conference where other language might be worked out.

The bill before the Senate simply sets limits on foreign aid. Actual appropriations will be handled in another measure.

The effort to slice \$400 million takes the form of an amendment by Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, R-Iowa. The President would determine where the cuts would apply.
