Anti-Polaris Protest Staged

HOLY LOCH, Scotland (U)—More than 1,000 anti-nuclear demonstrators converged here Saturday for a sit-down attempt to block supplies to the U.S. Polaris submarine depot ship Proteus. Police quickly broke it up and arrested 94.

The squatters included girls with long hair and tight jeans. The police, heavily reinforced and with the Royal Navy frigate Exmouth standing by to help if necessary, warned the demonstrators they would be charged with breach of the peace if they failed to move on at the first request.

Most moved on. The others ignored the warning, but put up no resistance. Men and women had to be lifted bodily from the entrance to Holy Loch's Ardnam pier into waiting police vans. They were carted off to jail cells around the country. They had come from as far south as London and as far north as Aberdeen. They were organized by Scotland's Committee of 100, which is campaigning against nuclear tests and bases of both the United States and the Soviet Union.

"We are not anti-American," they said. "We are anti-Polaris."

The government-owned British Railways provided a special train and boat at reduced rates to bring the ban-the-bomb campaigners from Glasgow.

It seemed an odd move in view of the government's determination to deal firmly with the demonstration. Some 300 police were drafted to deal with the protest and the Exmouth was detached from a fleet exercise for the emergency.

On the Proteus itself, everything was business as usual. Of the arrested demonstrators, 90 were charged with breach of peace and released for later hearings.

But 34 who refused to identify themselves were stood up against a wall and photographed. They were then fingerprinted and jailed.

Martin Quits Movie After Star's Firing

HOLLYWOOD (U)—Dean Martin quit the movie "Something's Got to Give" Saturday because Marilyn Monroe was fired.

"I have the greatest respect for Miss Lee Remick and her talent and all the other actresses who were considered for the role but I signed to do the picture with Marilyn Monroe and I will do it with no one else," Martin said.

Martin notified 20th Century-Fox studios of his decision through Music Corp. of America, his agent.

The studio had fired Miss Monroe on Friday, charging breach of contract for her repeated absences from the film.

When Miss Monroe originally signed for the movie, she had personally asked that Martin be her costar.

Martin's abrupt action probably was in gratitude for Miss Monroe's choice.

"I guess Dean's the best friend Marilyn has," a spokesman for the golf playing singer and comic said. "His decision is no reflection on any other actress. It's just his way of helping Marilyn."

Lumber Quota Idea Gains Favor

WASHINGTON (Special)—The idea of imposing a quota on lumber imports from Canada is gaining strength in the nation's capital.

If and when such an obstacle will be raised to stop the flood of British Columbia's cheaper lumber is still a long way from a certainty. But it is the first major proposal which has gained considerable bipartisan support on Capitol Hill.

Whether the Kennedy administration will accept this idea of restricting trade with Canada at a time when the chief executive is seeking broad authority to trim protective tariffs remains the greatest unknown factor.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., discussed the situation with Secretary of State Dean Rusk recently and says he found Rusk amenable to some sort of action if trade figures clearly show "a violent change" in the lumber

trade pattern over the past 18 months.

Rusk also said, according to Magnuson, the State Department would take the matter up directly with the new government of Canada after the forthcoming national elections in that country June 18, but that there was no point in talking to the present government right now in the midst of an election campaign in Canada.

Magnuson, who is a specialist in legislative horse trading on Capitol Hill, has long favored a direct approach to Canada in an effort to persuade the Canadians that they have more to gain by a reasonable restriction on lumber shipments to the United States than by increasing their market at the cost of damaged good will in Congress. If this won't work, then a quota can be fixed by the President.

The quota idea has gained vocal support in the House from Northwest congressmen of both parties. The National Lumber Manufacturers Assn. originated it.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Ida., supports a lumber quota for much the same reason that President Eisenhower imposed an import quota on lead and zinc, whose domestic producers in his state and elsewhere suffered from substantial foreign competition.

Rights Committee Meets Sunday

SALEM (U)—The advisory committee to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission will meet Sunday afternoon in Salem.

The commission has been reconstituted.

Eric W. Allen Jr., Medford editor, is chairman, succeeding ex-Gov. Charles A. Sprague, Salem.

Other members are Sprague; The Rev. Harold Glen Brown, Portland; Prof. Hans A. Linde, University of Oregon Law School; Rabbi Emanuel Rose, Portland; Mrs. Mercedes F. Deiz, John C. Beatty Jr., and Shirley A. Field, Portland attorneys.

The meeting will be conducted by Robert E. Freelen, Atherton, Calif., regional consultant for the commission.

Two Injured In Accidents

Two injury accidents, one on Highway 126, the other on Highway 58, were reported Saturday by state police.

A car driven by Henry Thomas Rayson, 20, of Vida, struck a deer on Highway 126, near the Leaburg Power station, at 4:10 a.m. daylight, state police said. The car turned over several times, and Rayson was thrown from the car, the police report said. Rayson, who suffered back and chest injuries, was treated at Sacred Heart Hospital. He was reported in good condition Saturday night.

The second accident, late Saturday morning, involved a truck and a pickup truck at East Dexter Junction and Highway 58. The pickup, state police said, was driven by Einar Julius Johansson of Los Angeles. He was accompanied by his wife, Gertrude, 48.

The truck was driven by Verle Alva Jacobs, 49, of 171 Aberdeen Lane, Eugene. Police said both trucks were going west. Johansson attempted to turn right into Dexter Park as Jacobs began to pass, police said, and the two vehicles collided.

Johansson was given outpatient treatment for head injuries at Sacred Heart Hospital. Neither Mrs. Johansson nor Jacobs was injured.

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
