

3 Candidates In Peru Run Close Race

Choice of President May Go to Congress

LIMA (AP)—Three leading candidates in Peru's presidential race were closely bunched Monday in partial, unofficial returns.

Early indications were that the new Congress might have to elect the nation's chief executive from the leading trio of contenders. None appeared headed for the required 34 per cent of the valid votes.

An early trend favoring former dictator Manuel A. Odría seemed checked in post-midnight tabulations by newspapers and radio and television stations.

Official returns are not expected before June 18, after the national electoral jury completes a scrutiny of the ballots.

A Confused Picture

Since there are hardly any non-partisan factions in the country, the election picture in its early stages was one of confusion.

The newest trend bunched Odría with Fernando Belaunde Terry of the leftist Popular Action party and Victor Raul Haya de la Torre of the left-center APRA party. The four other presidential candidates were clearly out of the running.

The newspaper La Prensa, which gave some backing to Haya de la Torre, reported a change in an early trend favoring Odría. It reported results from 10,000 of the nation's more than 16,000 voting districts yielded 74,429 votes for Haya, 68,668 for Odría and 67,910 for Belaunde. The total was roughly 12 per cent of an anticipated total vote of about 1.7 million.

Different Results

The newspaper El Comercio said its tabulations favored Odría with Belaunde and Haya behind in that order. El Comercio backed Odría and violently opposed Haya. Its tabulation: returns from 1,063 of 3,418 districts in Lima and nearby Callao, Odría 70,729, Belaunde 59,132, Haya 49,523. El Comercio said Belaunde appeared to be leading in the provinces.

La Tribuna, organ of Haya's APRA party, claimed Haya had 240,615 votes, Belaunde 150,611 and Odría 122,598.

The election Sunday, one of the costliest and bitterest in Peru's history, went off in apparent peace. There were no reports of violence.

Seven candidates in all sought to succeed incumbent President Manuel Prado for the six-year term. Also at stake were the Senate seats and the 184 seats in the Chamber of Deputies.

Degrees Granted At Washington

SEATTLE (AP)—Nearly 1,500 graduates of the University of Washington Sunday heard University President Charles E. Odegaard tell them to take an emotional approach to world problems.

Odegaard gave the principal address at the university's 87th commencement exercises at Edmundson Pavilion.

"We have had divisions before," Odegaard said, "but there is a violence of invective and an animosity toward opposition in recent debate which demonstrates the edginess of our times."

In addition to the bachelor's degrees, 287 graduate students, 71 medical students and 51 dental students were presented diplomas.

518 Awarded Degrees at PSC

PORTLAND (AP)—Degrees were awarded to 518 graduates at Portland State College's commencement exercises Sunday. It was the largest graduating class in the young school's history.

The commencement address was given by Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore. She said public spending on education was an investment in the nation's future.

"We shall have to abandon the kind of thinking that reckons education in terms of cost and not in terms of value," she said.

PORTLAND (AP)—The 12th annual communication of the Grand Lodge of Oregon Masons will be held Wednesday through Friday in Portland. Some 600 Masons are expected to attend.

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Moslem Attack Kills 3 Europeans

ALGIERS—Moslem auxiliary policemen Monday fired on Europeans near the Algiers dockyards, killing three and wounding six.

The uniformed Moslem policemen said Europeans attacked them and they shot back. Two Europeans riding in a truck near the scene of the shooting were seized and held as hostages.

A European police official said the Moslems, who were guarding a dockworkers' hiring point, opened fire without provocation on Europeans passing by.

Secret Army Organization commandos struck in a Sahara oil field Sunday in their "scorched-earth" warfare but a Moslem nationalist leader said the terrorist fire power is fading.

Terrorist saboteurs blasted a well being drilled in the Sahara, about 60 miles south of the big Hassi Messaoud oil field, and set off a spectacular gas fire.

French officials expressed fears that the secret army, whose hard core now is believed

to be largely French army deserters, would attempt to blow up dams, railroads and oil installations in their campaign to leave the country in ruins for the future Moslem rulers.

Chawki Mostefai, a spokesman for the Front (FLN), told newsmen Algeria's Europeans were turning against the secret army fanatics. "It would not be rash to foresee a halt in the present events," he said.

Premier Youssef Ben Khedda of the Algerian provisional government was reported preparing a "solemn declaration" directed at the million European settlers on their role in the new Algeria.

"We believe that this declaration will satisfy everyone," said Mostefai. He declined to go into details.

The European settlers were the backbone of the secret army in an attempt to block American independence but there have been increasing signs they now realize the fight is hopeless.

They still hold bargaining power, however, because a mass exodus of skilled Europeans would cripple the economy of the independent nation.

New explosions and fires

raged in Algiers Sunday but crowds poured out to the beaches as usual.

Secret army bomb and arson commandos destroyed three more schools, an agricultural cooperative, a tax office and an Algiers hydraulics center. Thousands of records were burned.

Gunmen staged four holdups, including the municipal gambling casino in the capital's biggest hotel.

Machine gunners shot up a bus carrying Moslem hospital

employees and fired on a truckload of French gendarmes, who fired back. Casualties were not reported.

In a sideline row, rival Moslem factions fought in the village of Baraki, 15 miles south-east of Algiers.

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
