All over—50 persons of the Emerald Empire are invited to take note of the date set for the first annual Sale Fair, for which they are invited to prepare articles of handicraft during the summer. The Sale Fair, which will open Monday, Nov. 19, and last through the entire week, ending Saturday, Nov. 24, will be in Eugene Hotel. It is sponsored by the Emerald Empire Council for the Aging.

Articles offered at the Sale Fair will be sold, the receipts going to the makers of the articles, less a 20% commission for overhead.

All types of needlework, — embroidered linens, crocheted or knitted garments; ceramics; copper tooling; woodwork — carving, wooden toys and furniture, flower baskets, spoonholders of wood — anything that is handmade may be included.

Some of the women may wish to knit an afghan, and early notice will provide time for this, or for weaving garments and materials.

The committee stresses the importance of design and workmanship for salability of the articles to be submitted.
