

Luce Renews Plea Against Waste of NW Power

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bonneville Power Administrator Charles F. Luce Monday renewed his oft-repeated plea to Congress: Prevent electric power worth millions of dollars from flowing unused to the sea.

Luce appeared before the House Reclamation subcommittee in support of legislation intended to pay the way for a 1,000-mile transmission line to connect Bonneville Power Administration with California's federal power system.

The legislation, introduced by Reps. Julia Butler Hansen, D-Wash., and Grace Pflast, D-Idaho, would give Pacific North-

west power consumers—including private industry—first claim on electricity produced in the area.

The legislation was introduced to allay fears in the Pacific Northwest that firm power would be drained off to serve federal preference customers in California.

Luce said power worth up to \$32 million a year was being wasted because it is secondary power without a market in the Pacific Northwest.

"We're exporting it to the ocean," he said, "and we're not getting paid for it."

Seattle attorney Gordon C. Culp supported the legislation in behalf of both private and public utilities in the region.

Culp said there has been "the utmost cooperation" between the BPA and private industry in seeking "to squeeze the last kilowatt out of the rivers."

But Pennsylvania Rep. John P. Saylor, ranking Republican member of the Interior Committee, and Rep. Craig Hosmer, R-Calif., remained unimpressed.

Saylor, terming the BPA a "monster," said Luce would some day come before the committee to ask for authority to build steam power facilities to compete with private industry.

"How naive can you people in the Pacific Northwest get?" he asked Culp.

Saylor and Hosmer spent nearly two hours in questioning Luce in seeking to prove that the interstate power was not needed.

Their questioning included an attempt to show that the so-called "dumpy" power could be sold in the Pacific Northwest without the proposed interconnection with California.

Luce, who remained outwardly unruffled, answered that the secondary power—available during periods of good streamflow—could profitably be sold to utilities which use steam power generation.

Such utilities can shut down their generators and buy cheap "dumpy" power when it is available.

But, Luce explained, the lack of adequate gas and oil resources in the area meant that hydroelectric power was the most economical. Thus, he said, the area had few utilities which used steam generation.
