# Hunt Drawings Set

Hunters who hope to roam southeastern Oregon's high desert in search of antelope this summer must apply by July 10 for the 600 tags which will be available for the Aug. 25-29 season.

The synopsis of big game hunting regulations for 1962 will not be distributed before the middle of July but application forms for antelope tags, controlled season tags, and antlerless permits are available at sporting goods stores. An outline of big game hunting rules and special seasons will be mailed to license agents within a week, a game commission spokesman said Tuesday.

A public drawing for the antelope tags is scheduled July 25. Deadline for controlled deer season tags will be Aug. 1 with the drawing one week later, while the closing date for antler-

less deer permits will be Aug. 8 with the drawing a week later. Elk permit applications must be filed by Aug. 29 and the drawing will be Sept. 7.

Party applications for antelope tags have been eliminated but will be accepted for deer or elk tags or permits. Persons who received an antelope tag during the past two seasons are not eligible to apply this year.

Hunters who obtained an antlerless elk permit in 1961 also are not eligible this year.

### Rule Dropped

When final hunting regulations were adopted after a hearing last Friday, the game commission killed a tentative rule which would have required hunters to bring out the head of elk, deer and antelope. Retained in its place was last year's bull elk regulation, which requires the hunter to tag and possess the antlers with scalp

and eyes attached while the carcass is in possession in the woods or on the road.

But tagging regulations were amended to provide that when the holder of any big game tag kills an animal for which the tag is issued, he shall immediately validate the tag by punching out in its entirety the printed month and date of kill, apply his signature, attach the tag securely to the animal, and write the date, species and county of kill in the space provided on the back side of the hunting license.

Persons who obtain a tag for one of the 22 controlled deer seasons also will be issued a permit, which when affixed to their unused general deer tag, will allow them to kill a second deer of the kind, and in the manner, specified for that particular controlled season.

As an example, suppose you obtain one of the 5,000 five-dollar tags authorized for the Willamette Valley controlled hunt Sept. 8-23, Oct. 6-21 and Nov. 10-25 on or within one mile of cultivated agricultural land in Lane, Linn, Benton, Polk, Marion, Clackamas, Yamhill, Washington and Columbia counties. During those dates and in the prescribed areas, your tag and permit would entitle you to kill two deer of either sex.

So your deer hunting could be finished before the general season, which will be Sept. 29-Oct. 21, unless you apply for another controlled hunt. If tags for a controlled deer season are available ten days before the opening date of that season, the holder of a tag may apply for up to two additional tags.

The general deer tag alone will be good for a spike or better in eastern Oregon and not less than a forked horn west of the Cascades summit. Either-sex season will be Oct. 6-21 with a total of 135,600 permits, an increase of 6,700 over last year. The Silver Lake, Hood River, Sprague, Minam, Juniper and Wagonrout units will not be open to either-sex hunting this year.

### Elk Setup Same

Elk season also will be similar to last year's setup with Oct. 27-Nov. 9 on the coast and Oct. 27-Nov. 25 elsewhere in the state. Aside from the permit hunts, bag limit will be one bull with antlers longer than the ears in all sections of the state except the southeast, where it will be either sex.

Elk hunting in the Clatsop area again will be limited to holders of 5,000 permits. Six hundred permits will be issued for a five-day hunt in the Wilson unit. Both units will be for bulls only. Twenty two permit hunts are scheduled in areas along the coast and in northeastern Oregon.

Hunters who apply for elk permits in areas where no other elk hunting is allowed and fail to get a permit in the drawing will be eligible for a refund on their elk tag.

Bear is classified as a game animal in all national forests between highways 99 and 97 and within one mile of the Rogue river between Graves Creek and Agness. Open season will be Sept. 1-Dec. 15 with a bag limit of one bear.

## Carr Rated Clear Choice In Am Play

HOYLAKE, England (U.P.)—Joe Carr, the golfing pride of Ireland, was a clear favorite Wednesday to win the British Amateur Championship for the fourth time—with 12 Americans still among those trying to stop him.

England's Michael Bonallack, last year's winner and top seed, was shocked into a 2 and 1 defeat Tuesday by a young Irishman, Jackson Taggart. The experts predicted that with Bonallack gone, no one would be able to hold the big hitting Carr on this course of long flat fairways.

The 40-year-old Irishman, who won the title in 1953, 1958 and 1960, was scheduled to meet John Langridge, a little known English player, in the third round.

Robert Sweeney, 50, of Palm Beach, Fla., who won this title in 1937, met John Glocer of Northern Ireland in the second round.

David Goldman, 53, of Dallas, Tex., who was runner-up to Lawson Little in the American Amateur of 1934, was matched against R. E. Rimmer of England in the third round.

Goldman reached the final of the French Amateur last week.

## Osuna Posts Net Triumph

SEATTLE (U.P.)—A win by top-seeded Rafael Osuna of Mexico and an upset by an unknown Miami player marked action Tuesday in the National Hard-court Tennis Championships.

Osuna drew a bye in the first round of the men's singles and then came on to defeat Ray Van Hollenbeck of Seattle, 6-0, 6-0.

The upset was provided by John Karabasz, University of Miami junior, who defeated Dave Reed, Southern California junior champion from Glendale, 6-6, 11-9, 6-2.

Other seeded players won with ease. Second-seeded Larry Nagler from Los Angeles eliminated Dean Parsons, Wenatchee, Wash., 6-2, 6-1. Third-seeded Bill Bond of LaJolla, Calif., defeated Gary Larson, Seattle, 6-3, 6-1. Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, the No. 4 seeded player, beat Dick Odabashin, Cashmere, Wash., 6-1, 6-1.

Fifth-seeded Rodney Mandelstam of South Africa defeated Wally Bostick, Seattle, 10-8, 6-1 and Pete Fisher, Seattle, 6-1, 6-3. Bill Lenoir, the No. 6 seed from Tucson, Ariz., defeated Omar Pabst of Chile, 6-2, 6-3, and Clint Knox, Richland, Wash., 6-0, 6-1.

# Palmer Again Favorite for Open Crown

OAKMONT, Pa. (U.P.)—Arnold Palmer, the favorite, and Gary Player, the leading foreign threat, disagreed Wednesday over the fairness of the rugged Oakmont Country Club course on which the U.S. Open golf championship will be decided starting Thursday.

"It's the best course I've played in five years," said Palmer, feeling fine after a practice round 69, two under par.

"It's unfair and artificial," insisted Player, the South African who fired a par 71.

Player was especially critical of the sand traps — of which

there are 208 on the 6,894-yard par 35-36-71 layout—and of the sloping fairways.

He singled out the first, 10th, 11th and 12th holes as "very unfair."

"You can drive the ball in the middle of the fairway on the 12th and not have a shot," the 1960 Masters winner complained. "You can be on the down slope there and the green slopes so badly away from you it's very hard to stop the ball."

Palmer agreed that the first, 10th and 12th holes are tough ones, "but if the greens hold, I

don't see where anyone has cause for complaint."

"These are the finest greens I've played on in years," Palmer continued. "They are true. Of course, if the greens don't hold, it's another story. But I think this is one of the greatest courses in the world, as good as they come."

The only thing Palmer and Player agreed on was "it's the same for all of us."

Defending champion Gene Littler, who tested the course for the first time Tuesday, found it did not play as long as he expected it would.

"This is a course where driving is the biggest factor," Littler said. "You've got to keep the ball on the fairway. If you keep spraying into the rough, you can forget it."

Littler played badly, but he said he expected a letdown after his \$25,000 first place victory in the Thunderbird Open. He said he had no complaints over the greens or the traps.

Player, while prefacing his criticism with an assertion that he was "grateful" to be playing in the Open, criticized the two-inch furrows which are raked into the traps.
