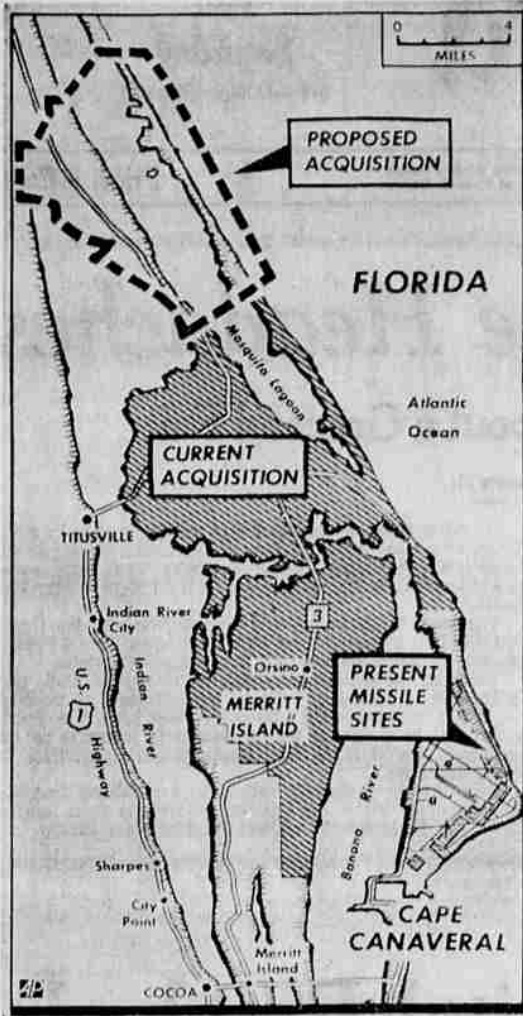

10-Year-Old Boy Heir to Fortune

BRUNSON, S. C. — A tall 10-year-old boy who has led an unobtrusive life in this rural South Carolina community is heir to the lion's share of one of the country's largest fortunes.

Walker P. "Skipper" Inman Jr., was bequeathed \$30 million of the \$40 million estate left by his grandmother, Nana-line H. Duke.

Mrs. Duke, widow of the founder of the American Tobacco Co., died April 12 at the age of 90. An order admitting the will to probate was signed Thursday in Surrogate Court in New York.

Since the death of his parents, Skipper has lived in this little community near the Georgia border, midway between Augusta and Savannah.

Royal Flight Interrupted

UDON, Thailand (AP) — The plane carrying King Bhumibol Adulyadej and Queen Sirikit on a tour of U.S. and other Allied military camps in Thailand made an emergency landing Friday. But the royal couple refused to let the incident interrupt the tour.

The twin-engine C47 had just taken off at Nakorn Phanom for the 182-mile flight to Udon when the right engine began belching smoke. The plane quickly turned back and landed.

The engine trouble was diagnosed as a burst line that spewed oil into a cylinder. The royal party switched to another C47.

The king and queen extended a personal welcome to the 1,800 U.S. Marines camped at Udon and thanked them for coming to Thailand's aid. The Marines in turn put on an impressive display of air and ground power.

Business Doesn't Have Him Where It Wants Him

JFK Seeks GOP Votes for Proposals

WASHINGTON—President Kennedy, giving Democrats in Congress a light pat on the back, has urged Republicans to ignore party labels and vote for his major proposals.

Kennedy's prod at his news conference Thursday amounted to a concession that he needs GOP votes on some issues as well as a challenge to Republicans to adopt a non-partisan stance on "matters of great national import."

As a senator, Kennedy recalled, he sided with former Republican President Dwight D. Eisenhower on such questions as raising the debt limit and permitting aid to Communist Poland and Yugoslavia as a tool of foreign policy. He encouraged Republican support on these propositions. And he put special emphasis on his farm bill, already passed by the Senate, to couple production controls with price supports for wheat and feed grains.

Kennedy also used the nationally televised conference to exhort flight engineers "to meet their public responsibilities" and abandon strike threats against Pan American, Trans

World and Eastern air lines. He did not rule out the possibility of seeking authority to seize the airlines if the engineers walked out, but said he hoped they would submit their dispute to arbitration or find some other peaceful solution.

Then, in reply to questions, Kennedy suggested politics and old positions be discarded in favor of fresh thinking on business and the economy. Here, he appealed to Republicans outside of Congress to concentrate on "the real problems of our country" and wait until 1964 to argue politics. Those problems exist regardless of who occupies the White House, he said, commenting that Eisenhower held office during the 1958 and 1960 recessions.

The chief executive said he couldn't imagine anyone deriving political or personal pleasure out of the stock market plunge or economic crises. That was his response when asked about a columnist's report that the current big business attitude toward Kennedy is: "Now we have you where we want you."

Kennedy previously had remarked that most businessmen are Republicans and happier when a Republican is president. He got a laugh by saying: "I can't believe I am where big

business wants me."

Laughter again rolled through the auditorium when he said he'd read the column in the St. Louis Post Dispatch, the newspaper added to the White House reading list when the New York Herald Tribune was canceled.

On support of his legislative program, Kennedy said members of his own party have done pretty well, except for a few who habitually vote with Republicans. He noted that when the House passed his request Thursday to raise the debt ceiling to \$308 billion, only nine Republicans voted with him but "Democrats met their responsibility."

Kennedy said if Republicans make his farm bill a party issue, "We will find ourselves with a very close vote on a matter which has the first chance of bringing some order out of what is a very chaotic situation."

The administration measure, he contended, would save taxpayers \$4 billion over the next four years. Defeat, he said, would reinstate the program of Eisenhower's secretary of agriculture, Ezra Taft Benson—and he maintained this has cost more than \$6.5 billion a year, would continue piling up surpluses and depress farm income.

House Okays Temporary Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has chalked up for President Kennedy what may be a short-lived victory in his fight for a temporary national debt ceiling of \$308 billion.

By a vote of 211-192 it sent to the Senate Thursday a bill upholding the President's position after defeating, 258-145, a Republican-backed drive for a \$306-billion limit.

More trouble lies ahead in the Senate. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., chairman of the finance committee, opposes the larger figure.

Byrd has suggested no compromise figure, but informed guessing is that in its final form the limit will be pegged at \$306 billion, a figure the administration claims won't give it enough leeway to deal with fiscal fluctuations during the coming year.

Kennedy suggested at his news conference Thursday that failure to raise the debt ceiling could have a profound effect on the economy.

The question came up when he was asked to comment on Republican charges the administration has been pressuring congressmen to support a higher debt limit or risk loss of defense work in their districts.

Without replying directly, Kennedy said he hopes it was explained to all congressmen that failure to boost the limit would force the government to stretch out payment of its bills.

Senate Investigators Hear Night Club Dancer's Story

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anita Lopushok, a dancer known as Fathema or Fatima, told Senate investigators Friday she was shouted down under a barrage of flung cookies and coffee when she tried at a union meeting to protest the treatment she and other night club entertainers had to endure.

A dark-haired woman who gave her age as 22, Mrs. Lopushok also poured out to the Senate Investigations subcommittee a story of being tricked into

signing away her right to her baby, and having been threatened by a night club operator with mob vengeance if she continued to fight to recover custody of the child.

The subcommittee is investigating charges that high officials of the AFL-CIO American Guild of Variety Artists (AGVA), an entertainers union, have connived with a crime syndicate which allegedly fattens on profits of prostitution, pocket picking and other racket

connected with its string of honky tonk night clubs.

Earlier in the hearings, some witnesses from the g-string crowd have told stories of girls being pressured into prostitution.

But Mrs. Lopushok testified no one ever dared to try to lure or drive her into prostitution, because "they knew better."

She said she was forced to "mix" with the customers at night clubs, to hustle the sale of drinks to customers.

The subcommittee also scheduled testimony from Ann O'Connor, a union official described as a foe of those under fire in the hearing, and from Martin Cavanaugh, AGVA's Chicago branch manager. AGVA is an AFL-CIO union for entertainers.

Sgt. Louis Cantone of the vice and narcotics unit of the Chicago Police Department told the subcommittee Thursday that Chicago mobsters used fronts to conceal their ownership of night clubs, and of holding their entertainers in terror.

"There certainly is a state of collusion existing here," Cantone charged in a blast at the AGVA.

"AGVA," he said, "is not doing a doggone thing about it."

He contended there is much the union could do to protect its members from exploitation. "They are absolutely aware of the conditions in these clubs, they know all about it," the sergeant said.

48 Negroes Being Enrolled In 'White' Schools in Atlanta

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Forty-eight Negro pupils will attend classes with white youngsters in 11 desegregated Atlanta public high schools this fall if all transfers approved by School Supt. John Letson take place.

This will leave five high schools for white children and five for Negroes in the Georgia capital. There are 106,000 pupils in the school system, including 48,500 Negroes.

Letson announced Thursday the acceptance of 44 Negro applications for transfers, a step that will lower traditional racial barriers at seven additional high schools.

Four schools were desegregated without incident last year during the start of a grade-a-year pupil placement plan approved by federal court. Because

of a year's delay in implementation the junior and senior classes were integrated at that time.

Nine Negroes participated in the precedent-breaking procedure but one later withdrew at her own request. Four were graduated and four will be seniors in the fall.

Joining them will be 32 sophomores, nine juniors and three seniors.

Letson said applications for transfers were received from 266 Negroes this year, double the 133 who sought transfers a year ago.

In making selections, he said, greatest emphasis was placed on the proximity of the applicant to his present school as compared with the school applied for, and probable academic success at the school requested.

Nikita, Pravda Toast Cliburn

MOSCOW (UPI)—Texas pianist Van Cliburn drew a rave review in Pravda Friday capping a personal tribute from Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The Soviet leader showed up unexpectedly Thursday night at Cliburn's second sell-out concert and toasted him at a dinner party after it was all over.

Cliburn, 27, said after the two-hour party he had no advance notice that Khrushchev would show up.

"We talked about many things, but really it was a family affair," he said.

Pravda, the Communist party paper, said today that Cliburn has become a "bigger, maturer, more balanced" artist since his last appearance in Moscow in 1960.

Tiros Develops Weak Memory

WASHINGTON (AP) — Space agency officials say the Tiro-IV weather eye satellite has developed trouble and is sending back pictures which are suitable only for limited weather analysis in the United States.

The satellite, launched Feb. 8 from Cape Canaveral, Fla., had been transmitting data for worldwide weather analysis until a tape recorder began to malfunction over the weekend.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration officials said Thursday that the recorder trouble has limited picture transmissions to within 1,500-mile ranges of Wallops Island, Va., and Point Mugu, Calif., the two Tiro-IV receiving stations.

Youth Shot Trying to Flee East Berlin

BERLIN (AP) — A 12-year-old boy trying to escape from East Germany was shot dead by Red border guards, West Berlin police reported Friday.

The shooting occurred last Sunday, during the Whitsun holiday, when two groups of East Germans managed to tunnel their way to freedom.

Because the shooting took place on the East side of the Communist wall, West Berlin police did not get details immediately.

His death brought the known number of deaths along the wall to 36.

Another 14-year-old East German boy was shot last month by East Germans as he swam a canal to the West. He escaped with seven bullet wounds. He still is in a West Berlin hospital.

Apparently incensed by the number of successful escapes, the Communist regime is strengthening the barricade around West Berlin.

Six concrete bunkers have been located at strategic points, and Friday they added a seventh—a covered firing position—facing the U.S. sector border opposite Zehlendorf.

At other places on the 100 miles of frontier they were digging ditches and putting up more barbed wire.

Turks View Capsule

ISTANBUL (AP)—Turks stood four and five deep along Istanbul's main thoroughfares for a glimpse of Col. John H. Glenn's Friendship 7 space capsule on parade here this week.
