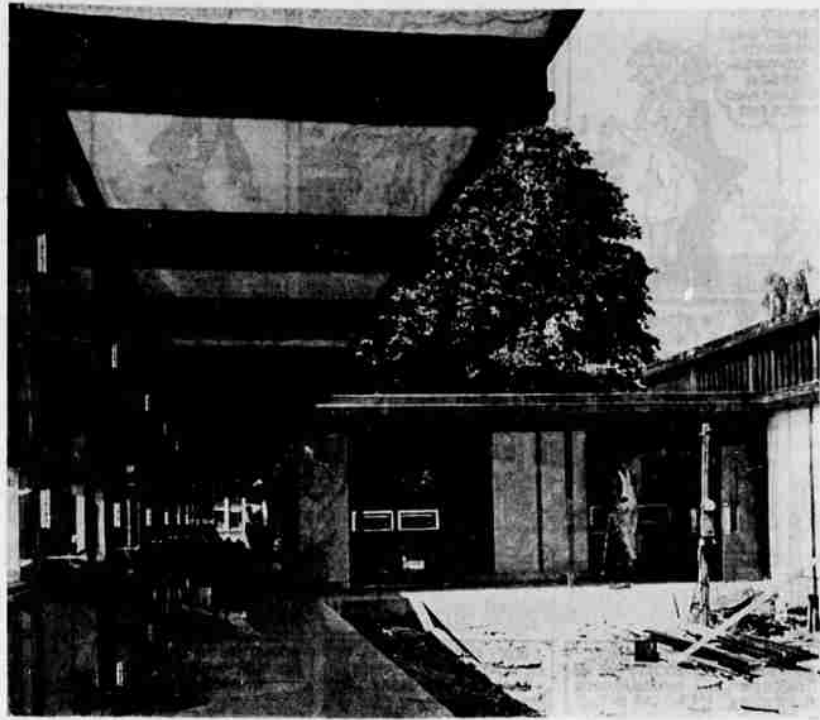




The New Soon to Replace . . .

Final Worship Set Sunday In Army's Old Quarters

Salvation Army Moves Monday To New Building

Members of the Salvation Army Corps in Eugene will hold final worship services tomorrow in the building that has served the Eugene Corps for 34 years.

The building, located at 707 Pearl St., will be razed to make way for Eugene's new city hall. The Corps will move its religious services and offices Monday to the new Corps headquarters at 640 W. Seventh Ave.

Final services in the old building will be Sunday school at 8:44 a.m. standard, 9:44 a.m. daylight; morning worship at 10 a.m. standard, 11 a.m. daylight; and an evening worship service at 6 p.m. standard, 7 p.m. daylight.

At the latter service, the summer cadet trainee for the Eugene Corps will be introduced.

The Army's present building on Pearl Street was purchased from Lighthouse Temple in 1928 and is now more than 50 years old. But Salvation Army work in Eugene is older than the building—it began in 1896.

At first, Corps members had their headquarters in various "store fronts" on Broadway.

The new headquarters includes a senior hall (worship auditorium) and a young people's auditorium. The two rooms can be combined to seat approximately 400 persons. The young people's auditorium doubles for use as a dinner and banquet facility.

Present seating in the Pearl Street building is limited to "about 100," Capt. Oliver Stenwick, Eugene commanding officer said. "The Army," he noted, "has been handicapped in growing numerically by lack of space."

The new building will also have administrative offices for the Corps, facilities for the Ladies Home League, a Christian education wing with 13 classrooms and a nursery for child care; a Corps officers' study; kitchen facilities for church functions; golden age facilities and a music room.

Captain Stenwick said the cost of the new building, exclusive of land, is \$93,320. This money, he said, was raised through the sale of the present property to the City of Eugene; several bequests; and from last year's Forward Fund campaign to raise capital funds for building.

Although the first worship services are scheduled in the new Corps headquarters on Sunday, June 24, official dedication will be held Sept. 30, when Army officials from the western states will participate in the ceremonies.

Also Monday, the Army's welfare activities will be separated from the worship and fellowship activities and administered from the Army's building at 645 Olive St. This building, left to the Army by the late Mrs. Carl Washburne, will house the Army's Thrift Store and welfare offices.

By 1965, the Army hopes to tear down this building, and construct an "emergency lodge," which will include welfare activities and housing for "temporarily homeless persons," both from Lane County and other areas.

Probable cost of the lodge will be \$50,000, Stenwick said. "We will make our needs known . . . and hope that we can obtain the funds."

To Better Serve Others

Personality Review Urged for Ministers

NEW YORK — A prominent mental health expert feels that anybody who becomes a clergyman ought to see a psychiatrist.

Dr. John P. Kildahl actually doesn't mean it quite that way; he's a clergyman himself, an ordained Lutheran minister.

But he also is a practicing psychotherapy specialist, as well as the head of the psychology department of Brooklyn's Lutheran Medical Center, and his double-edged experience has convinced him that "the demands on a minister's personality and emotions are greater than most other professions."

Only by thoroughly understanding themselves, he said, can ministers help others solve their problems.

Dr. Kildahl believes clergymen must maintain a healthy detachment in their relations with their flocks, which isn't always easy. "If there's a death in the parish," he said, "the minister can't allow his own emotions to be affected if he expects to be of help to the bereaved family. He must be able to differentiate between sympathy and empathy."

He said most parishioners expect their pastor to be, as St. Paul put it, "all things to all men." But Dr. Kildahl feels this is all but impossible for a normal human being living in the 20th Century to take literally.

"One person thinks you should be the world's greatest preacher," he said. "Another wants you to play softball with the youngsters. Someone else thinks you should be available to chauffeur her to an afternoon doctor's appointment—sort of a glorified errand boy."

The result, in some cases, is that the pastor actually begins to resent his own congregation. This is where psychotherapy comes in.

Dr. Kildahl feels most ministers need only a "personality review" a session or two with a psychiatrist to help them better understand themselves. Others, however, might require a long term program of anywhere from 50 to 200 sessions on the couch.

His desire to counsel others was what led Dr. Kildahl from the ministry to medicine.

After his graduation from St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., in 1949 he entered the Lutheran Seminary in St. Paul. During his postgraduate years he served as a hospital chaplain and the experience whetted his appetite for more knowledge on the methods of dealing with others' emotional problems.

He entered New York University while serving as an assistant minister at Bethany Lutheran Church in Brooklyn. When he received his doctorate in 1957 he left the ministry and took up private practice as a psychologist.
