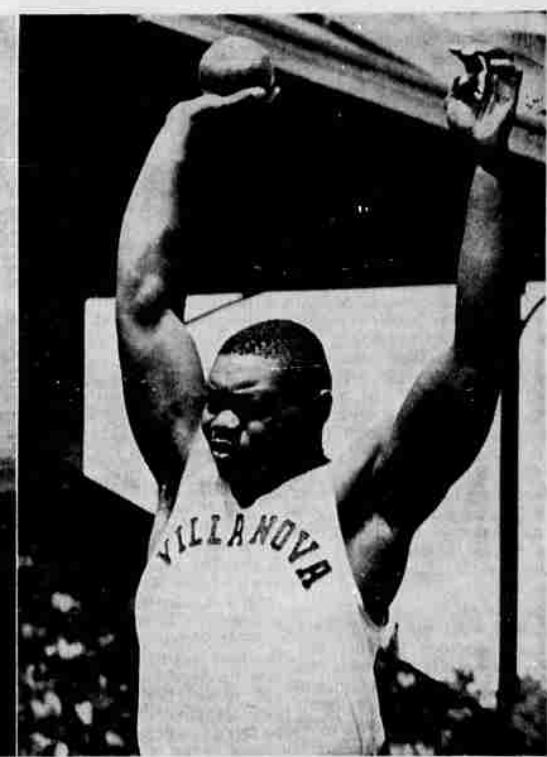
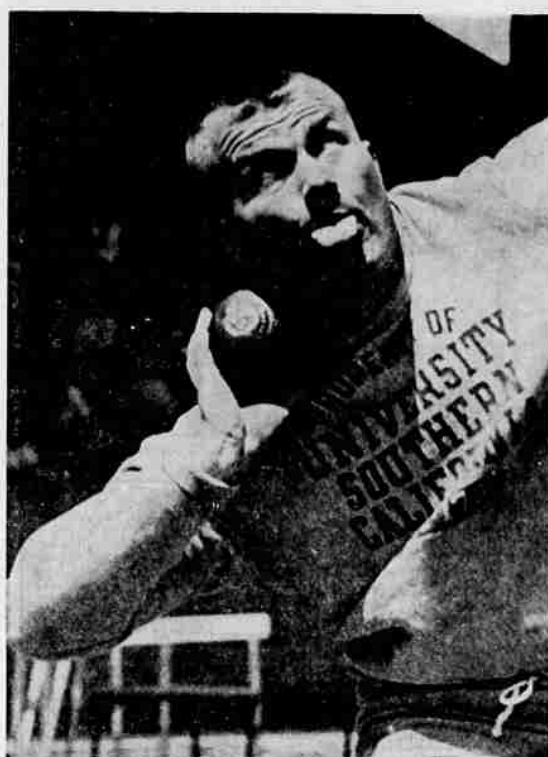

Event by Event

THREE-MILE—Pat Clohessy, Houston, successfully defended his title after taking the lead over Oregon State's Dale Story at the start of the first lap. He fought off a challenge by Story on the back stretch and then won over Brian Turner, Southern Illinois, going away—by 15 yards. Story, running out of gas as the result of his fighting back-stretch drive, finished 15 yards behind Turner, but managed to beat out one of the other title contenders, Pat Traynor of Villanova. Harry McCalla, Stanford, who finished sixth, was the leader for the first five laps and then Story took over. The Oregon Stater held a bare lead with the first four finishers in a close package during the late stages of the grueling race that caused nine contestants to drop out. Oregon's Clayton Steinke was never a serious contender and dropped out in the ninth lap along with Bill Boyd, OSU, and Jerry Brady, OSU, dropped out in the 10th lap of the 12-lap "marathon." Oregon's Vic Reeve was a strong contender, but suffered two spike wounds on his Achilles ligament and was forced to drop out just after going into the turn on the third lap. The Webfoot was fighting mad, but could not identify the runner who spiked him.

100-YARD DASH—Frank Budd, Villanova, the defending champion and world record-holder at 9.2, established himself as the favorite by the second heat in 9.3 with an allowable 2 mph tail wind. Budd didn't appear to be bothered by a groin injury. The 9.3 tied the NCAA championship meet record and bettered Harry Jerome's field record of 9.4. Roger Sayers, Omaha, was second but strided behind Budd. Jerome won the first heat by several nose lengths over Dennis Johnson, San Jose, and Paul Drayton, Villanova, challenged Jerome who won in 9.5 with Johnson and Drayton both at 9.6. The first four in each heat qualified for Saturday's finals.

HAMMER THROW—Ed Bailey, Harvard, the favorite, took the lead in the prelims with 193-7. Only two men were able to break the usual Eastern dominance of the event, Ed Burke, San Jose, was third and George Freen, Abilene Christian, sixth.

SHOT—Dallas Long, USC, the defending champion and the favorite, took the lead in the prelims with 64-7 and Gary Gubner, NYU, was next at 63-4. Both established new records for the NCAA championship meet. Dave Steen, Oregon, remained a point potential with a fifth-place effort of 58-4. Long also had three other 60-

foot efforts, from 62-8½ to 64-1¼. Gubner also had four over 60, from 60-5½ to 62-10.

BROAD JUMP—Every one of the seven qualifiers for the finals bettered last year's winning effort of 25 feet by Don Meyers of Colorado who failed to qualify along with Oregon's Jerry Close. Oregon managed to qualify Men Renfro with a new Oregon record of 25-11¼, but good for only second place to favored Anthony Watson of Oklahoma with 26-½. The seventh qualifier was Charles Mosley of Alabama with 25-2¼. Renfro's second jump was 25-4¼, indicating his consistency. He also had a scratch jump of 26-8. Close, favoring a bad ankle, could do no better than 24-7.

HIGH HURDLES—Jerry Tarr, Oregon, defending champion, looked like the favorite as he won his heat by four strides in the first of two heats to qualify for the finals. His time was 13.6, tying the NCAA record, but not allowed because of a 5 mph tail wind. His closest contestants, causing a photo finish, were clocked in 14.4. Tarr hit the fifth hurdle en route. Mel Renfro, Oregon, who hit the seventh and eighth hurdles, came close to winning the second heat in 14-flat, just behind winner Russell Rogers, Maryland State, who was timed in 13.9.

440-YARD DASH—Rex Cawley, USC, in the toughest semifinal feat had the better time with a 47-flat, but the defending champion, Adolph Plummer, New Mexico, who won the other semifinal in 47.4 was very definitely a contender to repeat. Dave Mills, Purdue, and Jim Baker, Missouri, were close to Cawley in 47.1. Even the fourth qualifier for the finals had a better time than Plummer, with 47.2. Lynn Eves, Oregon State, who was fourth in the first heat, won by Plummer, was last in the semifinals. Norm Monroe, Oregon State, who was fourth in the third prelim in a photo finish, also placed fourth in the Plummer semifinal.

JAVELIN—Jerry Dyes, Abilene Christian's great all-around athlete who had scratched out of the broad jump with all four jumps, was the leader in the javelin with 246, a narrow margin over favorite Jan Sikorsky, USC, who had 244-2½. Les Tipton, Oregon, fourth at 233-5, was the only qualifier from Oregon. Failing to make the grade were John Burns who had 221 and Ron Gomez with 218 of Oregon; Steve Pauley, Gary Stenland and Dan Likens of OSU. Stenland was second in the NCAA last year, Stenlund in 1960.

440-YARD HURDLES—Jay

Luck, Yale, had the best time in the semifinals with a 51.9 when favored Rex Cawley, USC, missed his stride coming into the home stretch and finished an unconcerned second in 52.3. Jerry Tarr, Oregon, won the other semi in 52.3 and could be a strong contender for the title in view of winning with comparative ease with a stretch drive. With 15 yards before the tape Tarr slowed up and looked over his shoulder. Amos Marsh, OSU, was last in Tarr's heat, but was still disqualified for failing to clear hurdle at first turn.

880-YARD RUN—Jim Dupree, Southern Illinois, looked like the favorite after winning his first semifinal heat in 1:49.2 after running second to Oregon's Archie San Romani in the quarter-finals in the same time of 1:50.7. Apparently the quarter-final race was too much for San Romani, who had been suffering from a cold this week. He was dead last, Don Bertoia, WSU, battled Sig Ohlmann to the finish line in the other semifinal heat, but in the slow times of 1:52.7 and 1:53.0, Ohlmann had beaten the WSU Cougar in the quarter-finals, both clocked in 1:49.8. Ohlmann was second last year. Ted Abram, Oregon, was beaten out in the quarter-finals by Tom Lile, USC, a heat won by Ben Tucker, San Jose.

DISCUS—Dave Weill, Stanford, the favorite took the lead in the prelims with 188-1 and Carl Johnston, Arizona, was second with 180-2 and the only contestants over 180. With the last qualifier, Clyde Webb, Iowa, at 166, Oregon's Jerry Stubblefield failed to qualify with an under-par performance.

HOP-STEP-JUMP—Kermit Alexander, UCLA, took the lead with a 50-11¼. The favorite, Elif Fredrickson, WSC, was close at 50-6¼. The last qualifier for the finals was David Thomas, Los Angeles State, at 48-11. Oregon's contender, Jerry Close, limped throughout his jumps and failed to make the grade at about 47 feet.

220-YARD DASH—Harry Jerome, Oregon, looked like the best by running both his quarter-final and semifinal heats in 20.7 seconds, good enough to tie the NCAA meet record and break the Hayward Field mark. In both races there was a 2 mph allowable tail wind. Jerome's semifinal victory saw the dethroning of the defending champion, Frank Budd, Villanova, who was nosed out for a fourth-place qualifying spot in 21.1 by Steve Haas, Occidental. Paul Drayton, Villanova, was a definite title contender, winning his quarter-final in 20.9 and his semifinal in 20.8.

Strut, Strain

Dallas Long (left photos) of USC isn't showing his displeasure with his competition in Friday's NCAA shot put preliminaries. But sticking out his tongue was part of the ritual as the USC weightman heaved the 16-pound ball 64 feet, 7 inches for a new meet record. His competition didn't use the tongue act. But Dave Maggard of California and Willie Joe of Villanova showed their facial expressions.

Bob Rosburg, Palmer Tied

OAKMONT, Pa. (AP)—Arnold Palmer and Bob Rosburg met today for the U. S. Open golf championship with Billy Maxwell, who reached his greatest peak as the amateur champion, leading the pack breathing hot on their heels.

The muscular Palmer and the pudgy Rosburg, tied at the end of the second round with three under par 135's, went out together for the two final breathless circuits of the Oakmont course known as "The Monster." The odds favored Palmer, shooting for a slam of the British Open and PGA title if he can add this one to his Masters crown, because he's playing in his own back yard and what shapes up as a tremendous gallery will be rooting for him on every shot.

Two shots back of the leaders was the chunky Maxwell. The little Texan, a quietly consistent money winner in his nine years on the tour but never a world-beater, moved inconspicuously into second place with a 70 for 141.

But there were more watchful eyes on a tough trio banked at even par 142, three blows off the pace but ready to take charge should the front-runners falter.

They were Jack Nicklaus, the two-time amateur champion; young Kentuckian Bobby Nichols who has been a steady winner on the tour, and South Africa's steady-nerved Gary Player, hoping to become the first foreign winner in 42 years.

Not out of it yet, either, were first round leader Gene Littler and Miller Barber of Rye, N. Y., who stood at 143. Littler, hoping for a successful title defense, began the chase with a 69 but fell back badly Friday with a 37-37-74 as his putter went sour.

Webfoots Dominate With 9 Qualifiers

Houston University's Cougars, as usual, took the first individual championship and the team lead in the 41st National Collegiate Athletic Assn. (NCAA) track-and-field title meet on sun-drenched Hayward Field Friday.

A crowd of 8,100 watched the preliminaries in 12 events

and the one finale with four NCAA championship meet and five field records either broken or tied.

Pat Clohessy of Houston, who won the NCAA three-mile in Philadelphia last year and was second in the 5,000 meters the previous year, scored a stirring triumph in successfully defending his title. His time of 13:51.6 broke the field record, but the NCAA mark of 13:47.7 he established last year. He beat off a determined challenge from Oregon State's Dale Story on the back of the gun lap and the OSU Beaver faltered to third behind Brian Turner of Southern Illinois.

Clohessy, the Australian, gave the Texas school the point lead in the meet, but the 10 points for first were two short of the lead of last year when teammate John Macy was fifth.

Four events were not contested Friday—the mile, steeplechase, pole vault and high jump.

Trojans Second

Although it was a blow to Oregon's title hopes to have no finishers in the three-mile, coach Bill Bowerman's Oregon Webfoots retained plenty of potential points in the mile and steeplechase and nine qualifying places earned Friday. Southern California's defending champions were next with five, followed by San Jose, Villanova and Stanford with four each.

Vic Reeve and Clayton Steinke were Oregon's three-mile entries. Steinke wasn't figured for any points, but Reeve, with the second fastest college two-mile this season, was rated a title contender. He was still in the pack on the third lap of the 12-lap race when badly spiked and forced to drop out. Another Oregon disappointment was the failure of Archie San Romani in the 880.

Frank Budd, Villanova's world recordholder in the 100-yard dash, tied the NCAA meet record by running the 100 in 9.3 that also broke the field record. His world mark is 9.2. Budd, however, lost a chance to defend his 220-yard title as Oregon's Harry Jerome twice ran the furlong in 20.7 to tie the NCAA meet record and set a new field mark.

Dallas Long, who beat out his top rival Gary Gubner of NYU in the shot-put trials, established a new NCAA meet and field record with a heave of 64 feet, 7 inches. Minutes earlier Gubner did the same thing with a 63-4 performance.

Tarr Ties Mark

Oregon's Jerry Tarr, the defending champion and collegiate recordholder, tied the NCAA meet record while winning his high hurdles trials in 13.6. Tarr's best is 13.3. The other record was a field mark by Jay Luck of Yale who won one of the 440-yard hurdles trials in 51.9. The Ivy Leaguer, however, will have to contend with both USC's Rex Cawley and Tarr.

Many of the preliminary performances in the field events are likely to hold up through Saturday's final round. Besides Jerome and Tarr, other Webfoots who managed to qualify were Mel Renfro, in both the high hurdles and broad jump; Sig Ohlmann, half-mile; Les Tipton, javelin, and Dave Steen, shot.

Renfro was outstanding. He was second in the broad jump with a new Oregon record of 25 feet, 11¼ inches, and a 14-flat in the hurdles.

After Jerome Beat Budd in 220

Drayton: 'I Didn't Know He Was That Potent'

After it was all over Friday, Oregon's Harry Jerome finally cracked a smile. But not a second before.

It was a grim day for Harry. But it turned out to be a happy one. Jerome, considered by many spectators to be a top threat in the 100-yard dash in the NCAA Championships, but only a possible winner in the 220, showed 8,100 fans what he's made of—blazing speed.

After a slow start in his 220 quarterfinal heat, he came bursting down the straightaway and flew past Frank Budd of Villanova as if he was running backwards.

Jerome equaled the Hayward Field record set 21 years ago and the NCAA mark set in 1958. But he hadn't yet cracked a smile—he still had Budd's teammate, Paul Drayton, to contend with.

In fact, Drayton was in con-

tention still after the semifinals. Harry breezed to another win, while Drayton repeated his quarterfinal victory with a semifinal win.

Drayton was one of those surprised by Jerome's great performance. "I didn't know he was that potent in the 220," he said. "I was very surprised."

That's what made Harry happy. When told that Drayton was shocked by his speed, Harry broke into a grin and said, "Good." He's the one I want to beat.

Budd finished a poor fifth as Jerome ran his second 20.7 of the day.

"He just hasn't recovered yet," Drayton said of his teammate. "Frank took about three or four days off after he was injured at Compton. I'm not trying to alibi for him, but he just isn't ready for that many races yet, I guess."

The modest youngster, running one of his few races around a turn this season, was quick to

credit the track for aiding him to fast clockings.

"It's a marvelous track," he said. "And I like running the turn much better than the straightaway because it takes more skill."

While it was all cream and sugar for Oregon's Jerome, some of his teammates were a little less reluctant to smile after Friday's performances.

Three-mile Vic Reeve, understandably mad when he was told that a nasty spike wound on his left heel would put him out of action for a couple of weeks, was still fuming about his unlucky fate a half-hour after the race.

It was an unhappy day, too, for Webfoot halfmiler Archie San Romani who ran fifth in his semifinal heat, though his time was about two seconds faster than the first place time in the other semifinal.

"I kind of had a feeling I wouldn't make it before I even

started," he said grimly. "That's a bad way to start."

After Archie had won his quarterfinal heat earlier by defeating Jim Dupree of Southern Illinois, today's co-favorite in the finals along with San Jose State's Ben Tucker, San Romani said, "I just ran to stay with them. I didn't work too hard."

Jerry Close had his disappointing moments too. "I haven't been able to work out much since I sprained my ankle two weeks ago. Then I hurt it on my first jump—I couldn't get much lift," he said after leaping 24-7 but failing to qualify for the finals in the broad jump.

"Two years ago I jumped 24-feet and placed—now I go 24-7 and can't even get in the thing," Jerry missed last year's finals because of an injury too. He tried to make it in the hop-step-and-jump after failing in the broad jump Friday, but again met defeat. "I could take a hop but as soon as I landed I

couldn't get up," he said dejectedly.

"That 28-8 (scratch) jump surprised me—but it did feel far. It kind of made me mad."
