

Club, Market Alky Permits Suspended

State Commission Charges Violations

A Glenwood club and a Eugene market have had their liquor licenses suspended temporarily after being charged with violations of the state liquor law.

Suspended Wednesday by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission were the Emerald Club at 3697 Franklin Blvd. in the Glenwood district, and Irish & Swartz Market No. 3 at 777 W. Sixth Ave., Eugene.

A 20-day suspension effective July 9 was imposed on the Emerald Club, owned and operated by Merle Short, on a charge of misrepresenting alcoholic liquor (by dilution) to the public. State liquor control authorities said the violation occurred May 24.

The suspension against the Irish & Swartz Market is for 15 days effective July 9, and is based on a complaint that beer was sold to a minor on March 7.

The commission Wednesday also denied the request of Jack J. Curtiss of Eugene for a license to sell draft and bottled beer in The Hut in Lowell.

That denial was based on the opinion of the commission that granting of such license "is not demanded by public interest or convenience."

K Predicts Reds Will Catch U.S.

HUNEDOARA, Romania (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev predicted Thursday that the Soviet Union would overtake the United States in total industrial production in the next 10 years.

Addressing 30,000 steel workers at the Hunedoara Stadium, he also said the USSR expects to produce 250 million tons of steel a year—roughly twice America's present capacity—within 20 years.

Hunedoara is Romania's biggest iron and steel complex, producing the bulk of the country's steel output which in 1961 was 2,127,000 tons.

Eugene Reports Loss of Money

William F. Stone of 132 W. Eighth Ave., Eugene, reported to Eugene police Thursday that an envelope containing some money had been taken from papers in his room.

Stone said that he had a visitor between 12:30 and 2:30 p.m. daylight Wednesday. He called police early Thursday morning when he discovered the loss.

Market Sinks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market continued to sink Thursday in active trading.

Averages slipped under the lowest levels at which the market had closed this year and edged toward the midday depths of May 29, when the market first plunged.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks was off 6.69 at noon to 556.39, only a few points above the 533.75 hit during last month's slide.

Eugene Quartet In Contest

Members of the Eugene quartet are Dennis Stier, tenor; Allen Koberstein, lead; Terry Shannon, baritone; and Curt Roth, bass. The quartet is a member of the Cascade chapter of the SPEBSQSA.

The competition will continue through Saturday night. Some 45 quartets, plus choruses from throughout the United States and Canada, will take part in the competition.

Radio Station KERG of Eugene will broadcast 25 minutes of the final contest at 12:05 p.m. standard, 1:05 daylight Sunday.

Frank Graham, of Jasper, an international board member, and J. H. "Bud" Leabo, Jasper, director of the Cascade Chorus, are also attending the event in Kansas City.

Club Intime Tries Hard, Somehow Misses

If you like variety night club style, you may have enjoyed Club Intime Wednesday night.

If you found the evening dull, no one can justly accuse you of being a hopeless sloop, because Club Intime's initial bill, presented in the Student Union building "Fishbowl" under the auspices of Carnival Theatre, was rather dull.

Maybe it was the heat. Maybe it was the unfamiliar intimacy of working within arm's reach of the audience. Whatever the

reason, the performers, hard though they worked, failed to arouse a predominantly student audience that remained polite but largely unimpressed.

In spite of the assistance of the Starlighters, an extremely able and willing five-piece dance combo, an air of audition hovered over the performances that were tight and frequently self-conscious.

An exception was the last act on the bill, the Grenadiers, an instrumental and vocal trio from Eugene who specialize in folk music. Jim and John Dol-

son and Bob Siegenthaler were performing together for only the third time Wednesday night, but they displayed a great deal of promise. Their voices blend well. What's more, they have charm.

Linda Blodgett, supported by a chorus of four, was again pleasing in "Life Upon the Wicked Stage," a number she does so well in "Showboat."

Vivian Tendollen, who did Eleanor Roosevelt in the UT production of "Sunrise at Campobello," appeared to advantage as a ballad singer. She is sweet-

voiced and attractive, but unfortunately the latter quality was hidden from part of the audience by a monstrous microphone that might easily pass for a scoop shovel.

"Poetry Sketch," a monologue by Karen Higgins, who was chosen UT's best actress of 1961-62, satirizes the pretentious and phony in ultra esoteric poetry and for that reason has comedy possibilities. It barely grazed its target Wednesday night because it was too overdrawn to be especially pointed or funny.

Other acts presented were

Jane Stevens in an Irish jig; Paula Bonnier in "Dance of the Seven Veils" from "Showboat;" Terry Thomas and Patti Flower, dance duo; Pricilla Hake, vocalist; a dance chorus directed by Thomas; Carol McIntyre, vocalist; and Ron Coulter, ventriloquist. Lowell Slick was master of ceremonies.

Club Intime will continue weekly performances, with a weekly change in bill, in the "Fishbowl" until July 4 when it moves outside to the Carnival Theatre amphitheater adjacent to the University Theatre.

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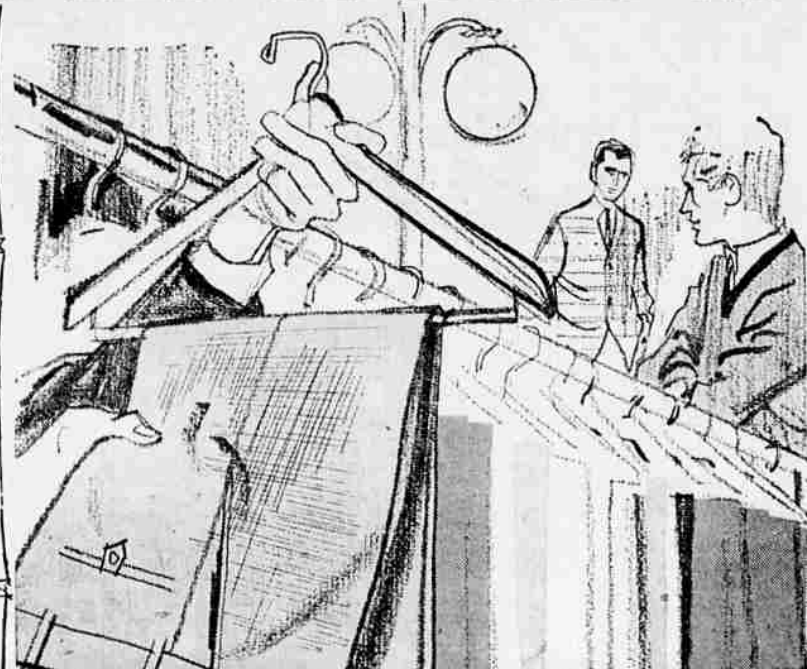
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
