Man Burned
In Crow Fire

CROW — A garage operator was hospitalized with second degree burns after an explosion and fire here Wednesday afternoon.

Paul Bloom, 57, owner of Bloom's Auto Service, was listed in good condition Thursday at Eugene Hospital where he was taken for treatment of burns on his hands, left leg and face.

Ear Test
Deadline
Set Friday

Friday is the last day to sign up for pre-school children free hearing tests in Lane County. The tests will be administered July 2 through 6.

The tests which are being sponsored by the county health department and the maternal and child health section of the Oregon State Board of Health, can be made by contacting the local public health nurse or health department office for the tests which will be held in Florence, Cottage Grove, the Eugene-Springfield area, Veneta, Elmira, Junction City and Oakridge.

The tests are not required for children entering kindergarten or first grade this fall because they will be tested at that time.

The testing schedule:
July 3 — Eugene-Springfield, all day program at Roosevelt Junior High School E. 24th Avenue and Hilyard Street, Eugene.
July 5 — Veneta, Fern Ridge-Crow, Elmira at the Elmira Upper Grade School in the morning, Junction City at Laurel School in the afternoon.
July 6 — Florence with location to be announced.

Volunteers and trucks from the Western Lane Forest Protective District extinguished the 5 p.m. daylight fire, which caused extensive damage to the rear of the building.

Mrs. Bloom said her husband was draining gasoline from a tractor and had a bucket of gasoline in his hand when an explosion occurred.

It was tentatively thought the explosion may have been caused by static electricity.

Bloom's clothing caught fire and he extinguished the blaze by wrapping a piece of cardboard around his body.

Four other persons nearby when the explosion occurred were uninjured. They were Mrs. Bloom; her sister, Mrs. Harold McCollum of Klamath Falls; Charles Liles, Crow farmer, and Bernie Larson, an oil distributor.

Mrs. Bloom said her husband got into a pickup truck and pulled the tractor belonging to Liles from the garage during the fire.

Extent of damage has not been determined. The loss was insured. Mrs. Bloom said the office portion of the building wasn't damaged.

Construction
Sets Mark

WASHINGTON (AP)—Construction activity in June hit a record high for any month, the Commerce Department reports.

Private outlays increased over May at double the normal rate, department figures showed Thursday, and total spending for new construction put in place reached an annual rate of just under \$63 billion, an increase of \$2.2 billion over the rate in May.

For private projects the annual rate this month was \$45.1 billion, compared with \$43.5 billion in May, and public construction climbed to an annual rate of \$17.9 billion from \$17.3 billion.

So far this year total new construction has amounted to \$27.7 billion—6 per cent more than the \$26.1 billion spent in the comparable period of 1961.

Highway Rerouting Fought

McKenzie Group Seeks Help

A delegation of McKenzie River area residents went to Salem Thursday to appeal for support from Gov. Mark Hatfield to keep the McKenzie Highway where it is.

They are fighting an alternate route proposed by state highway engineers which would relocate a section of highway between Blue River and McKenzie Bridge on the south side of the river.

The State Highway Commission is expected to decide Friday whether to approve the new route or rebuild the existing one.

Edwin E. Zietz, chairman of the North Bank Road Committee, said his group had an appointment to see Hatfield Thursday afternoon.

The committee has prepared a 33-page report outlining objections to the South Bank route and explaining in detail

why the McKenzie River community favors the North Bank route.

The report is critical of the State Highway Department's attitude in attempting to "sell" the South Bank route over the existing North Bank route.

The committee said the proposed new route would have "disastrous" economic effects on

businesses depending on tourists, would destroy scenic and recreational values and would leave the state with two high ways to maintain—one on each side of the river.

Zietz said a representative of his committee will also be present at Friday's State Highway Commission meeting when the matter is discussed.

Benton Resident Dies at Corvallis

CORVALLIS—Ivan T. Rickart, a life-long resident of Benton County, died Wednesday morning in a Corvallis Hospital.

Rickart was born Dec. 1, 1885, in Benton County and received his formal education in South Benton schools.

He had spent his 76 years in the Bellfountain community and had worked as a logger and

farmer. He was a member of the EUB Church and the IOOF lodge of Alpine.

Rickart is survived by a brother, Irven, of Bellfountain, and a sister, Grace Vlesko, of Portland.

Funeral services will be Saturday at 3 p.m. standard, 4 p.m. daylight in McHenry Funeral Home here. Burial will be in the Monroe Cemetery.

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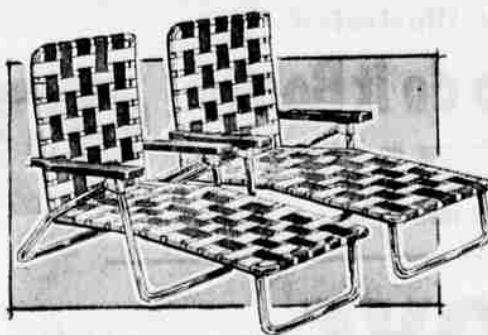
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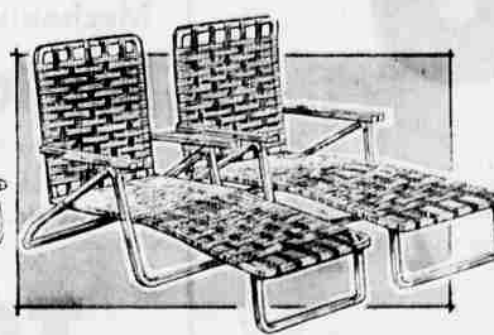


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
