

Indictment Handed Up On Financier

Misappropriation
Of \$1.9 Million

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted Edward M. Gilbert, 39, on charges of misappropriating \$1,953,000.

The 15-count indictment also accuses him of using the mails and wires for fraudulent purposes while he was president of the E. L. Bruce Co., the nation's largest hardwood flooring manufacturer.

The top penalty upon conviction on all counts is prescribed by law as 74 years in prison and fines totaling \$82,000.

Gilbert is in Brazil, which has no extradition treaty with the United States.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Peter M. Morrison obtained a bench warrant for Gilbert's arrest from U.S. Dist. Judge Thomas F. Murphy a short time after the indictment was handed up Thursday.

Sole Defendant

U.S. Atty. Robert M. Morgenthau said Gilbert is the sole defendant in the case which led to the indictment.

The indictment grew from an investigation initiated by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The investigation, which is continuing, was started almost immediately after Gilbert resigned as president of the Bruce firm on June 12 and admitted to its stockholders that he had withdrawn the \$1,953,000 from the company without authorization. He flew to Rio de Janeiro a few hours later.

At Rio de Janeiro Gilbert said: "I hope to pay everybody back and make everything whole some day."

In Deep Hole

Gilbert said he had sunk a fortune in efforts to retain control of the Bruce firm and to gain control of the Celotex Corp., manufacturer of building materials, to merge it with Bruce. The big drop in the stock market shattered his operations and put him in a deep hole, he said.

The grand jury charged — among other things — that Gilbert used the money he transferred from Bruce funds to repay obligations to banking institutions and individuals here and to banks in Geneva and Zurich, Switzerland, and Paris.

The indictment contains a variety of charges, including fraud in stock transactions, failure to comply with regulations of the Securities and Exchange Commission, and selling unregistered shares of E. L. Bruce stock, in addition to converting the \$1,953,000 of the company's funds to his own use.

The government has filed liens against properties owned by Gilbert on the ground that he was in arrears on income taxes.

New City Manager

PORTLAND (AP) — John E. Slayton, administrative analyst on the staff of Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk, Thursday was named city manager for Vancouver, Washington. He succeeds Robert Clute to the \$12,000-a-year post.

AMA Elects

Medic Assn. President-Elect Foe of JFK Medical Program

CHICAGO (AP) — The president-elect of the American Medical Assn. is Dr. Edward R. Annis, a Democrat who for a year has been the AMA's chief spokesman in its fight to defeat President Kennedy's medical care program for the aged.

The AMA's House of Delegates upset the normal pattern of its elections Thursday by naming Annis, 49, a Miami, Fla., surgeon, to become head of the AMA, which has a membership of nearly 200,000. He will take office next June, succeeding Dr. George M. Fister of Ogden, Utah.

It was the first time in 40 years that the AMA elected a man who has not been groomed for the post through service in the House of Delegates, AMA councils or committees. Annis' only position in the AMA is chairman of the national speakers bureau.

The House of Delegates elected Annis by a vote of 142 to 65 for Dr. Raymond McKeown of Coos Bay, Ore., an AMA trustee. Annis, the father of eight children, has become nationally known through television appearances in speeches in opposition to the King-Anderson bill

for medical care for the aged which is backed by the Kennedy administration. He made the rebuttal to President Kennedy's plea for a bill at a New York rally last month. He also has appeared in television debates with senators and with Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers.

The AMA, at the end of its five-day annual convention Thursday, reaffirmed its active opposition to the King-Anderson bill which would finance medical care for the aged from Social Security taxes.

The House of Delegates adopted a report declaring "King-Anderson type of legislation"

would "lead to deterioration in the quality of medical care," and reminding doctors of the AMA principles of ethics. It urged doctors to work for better care of the aged through the Kerr-Mills law in which the federal government cooperates with states in meeting medical expenses.

Fister, commenting on the action, said: "We will take care of patients in our own manner and all who need care will receive it. If the bill passes, it still leaves freedom for the physician to practice under, or for the patient to consult under provisions of the law."

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U.N. Asks New Constitution

Rhodesian Resolution OK'd

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The U.N. General Assembly has asked that Britain call a conference soon to draft a new constitution for Southern Rhodesia giving a vote to every man in that British African territory whether he is black or white.

The resolution faces an uncertain future. Britain's chief delegate to the U.N. said it was unacceptable and impracticable. An African political leader from the territory warned that if Britain ignored the assembly's advice, bloody revolution might follow.

The resolution was sponsored by 38 African and Asian countries and toughened by a Bulgarian amendment. The assembly adopted it late Thursday in the last act of its 16th annual session, the longest ever, which started Sept. 18.

The vote was 73-1 with 27 abstentions. Only South Africa voted against the resolution. The Communist countries, almost all Africa and Asia and

more than half of Latin America voted for it. The rest of Latin America, the United States, non-Communist Europe, the white countries of the Com-

monwealth and a few Asians abstained.

British delegate Sir Patrick Dean boycotted the voting to underline his "nonparticipation."

The resolution said "the vast majority of the people of Southern Rhodesia," where Africans outnumber Europeans more than 10-1, had rejected the proposed new constitution setting up a voters' registration system expected to produce a legislature next spring composed of 50 Europeans and 15 Africans.

Britain was asked to urgently convene a constitutional conference to formulate a new constitution "which would ensure the rights of the majority of the people." Here, by adopting the Bulgarian amendment, the assembly added, "on the basis of 'one man, one vote.'"

SAIGON (AP) — South Viet Nam reported 12,000 primitive mountain tribesmen evacuated their homes because of Viet Cong terrorist attacks.

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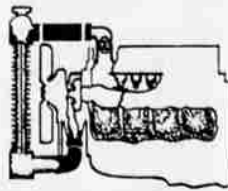
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
