

Spanish Student To Visit Junction

JUNCTION CITY—A young Spanish student whose father is a plywood manufacturer will arrive here this summer to become this city's first foreign exchange student.

The student is Mario Belloch Lopez, 17, of Valencia, Spain, who has been awarded an American Field Service Exchange (AFSE) scholarship to study in the United States during the 1962-63 school year. He will enter Junction City High School this fall as a senior.

He is the son of Senor and Senora Mario Belloch and has a brother, 14, and a sister who is eight.

In Junction City, Mario will live with Mr. and Mrs. Jerry M. Brown and family, at 1297 Nyssa St. The Browns have a son, Larry, 14, who will be a sophomore next year, and a daughter, Jeri Lynn, 12, who will be in the eighth grade.

The Browns are looking forward to having Mario as a member of the family. "We think the experience will broaden our home life immeasurably," Brown said.

And by the same token, Mario is looking forward to his visit, too. In a letter to the AFSE national committee he wrote:

"I think that it would be a wonderful opportunity for me to study a year in the United States to understand the American people and to help them understand the Spanish people."

As for the future, Mario would like to become an engineer (he didn't specify which kind) and of course mathematics is at the top of his list of favorite academic subjects. He is not one that keeps his head buried in a book, however. He does some painting and is an avid sportsman.

"Some of my paintings are naturalistic, but I have painted two abstracts which everybody who comes to the house says have good colors," Mario noted in his letter.

Sports are an important activity for him also and he is particularly interested in handball, football and swimming. However, he doesn't consider himself expert in any of these because, as he noted, "...I play them all and I don't concentrate on only a few as I should."

Lumber, Plywood Prices Steady Despite Problems

Lumber and plywood prices held steady this week despite unsettling labor-management problems.

Increases contemplated earlier apparently will not take place, according to Random Lengths, a lumber industry newsletter.

Sharp price increases resulted last week with a buying wave involving green Douglas fir lumber. But most mills have been more interested in holding the new price levels than in trying to establish higher ones, the newsletter reports.

The letter adds that the announcement Wednesday by the International Woodworkers of America that they would not strike for higher wages has had a steadying influence on both mills and buyers.

Plywood prices remained almost unchanged this week, with sanded holding to \$62 per thousand square feet.

Kills dry fire and hemlock lumber is reported to be moving readily with mills having some difficulty in meeting shipping schedules.
