

# 10 Years in Africa Mission Couple Visiting Eugene

Progress in Africa, said the Rev. Don Smith of Eugene, is like the growth of a stream from its beginning to its mouth—"a little bit now will make a big difference later."

The Rev. Smith can speak about African progress firsthand. Now only 33, he's spent the last 10 years in the Republic of South Africa, working for the South Africa General Mission, a large, interdenominational mission agency.

He has founded a large, general circulation Christian magazine that is Africa's fourth largest, and he works with a Christian publishing house which provides material for much of the continent.

He and his wife, Faye, also a Eugenean, will leave soon to return to Johannesburg, Republic of South Africa, where the publishing company has its headquarters.

They have spent most of a short furlough in Eugene, although both were called on for talks and programs in many parts of the United States.

A reception and program scheduled Sunday at First Baptist Church to honor the Rev. Smith and his wife has been postponed, due to the illness of the minister.

Church officials said that a new date for the program and reception will be announced in the near future.

The Rev. Smith became interested in church work while attending Westmont College in Santa Barbara, Calif. "I struggled," he admits. "I was determined to be anything but a missionary."

## DEGREES FROM UO

Journalism was his first love, and he managed to combine studies in this field with courses in biology after transferring to the University of Oregon. He received a bachelor's degree in biology and a master's degree in general studies, with emphasis on study in African affairs.

Mrs. Smith is also a graduate of the University of Oregon, and holds bachelor's and master's degrees in music from the university.

The couple began work in Africa as teachers in the Evangelical Teacher Training College in Vryheid, Natal, in the Republic of South Africa. He taught English and science, and Mrs. Smith, English and music.

## GIVEN TRANSFER

Then they were transferred to a fledgling publishing program of the South Africa Mission, which has now grown to include publication of a magazine, "Our Africa," a million religious booklets in 15 African languages, and many other publications.

In the near future, the program will also include the publication of Sunday school materials—Africa's first—for the entire continent. These materials, the Rev. Smith said, will be used by many missions of many denominations.

"Our Africa," the magazine, is the program's major venture, however.

It is a monthly publication, and articles—the majority written by African members of the staff who have been writing for only a few years—range from current events (the Katanga crisis, for example) to foods. Other features include cartoons, Biblical quizzes, a Bible commentary for daily use, many pictures and interviews.

## REACHES 450,000

"We compete commercially," the Rev. Smith said. Although the magazine's circulation is only 30,000 subscribers, surveys show that it reaches an estimated 450,000 persons monthly.

It is Africa's fourth largest magazine, but its three editions have the highest per capital readership of any of Africa's magazines.

And the mission can see the results of the magazine. Each month, he said, an estimated 135 readers make "a clear-cut decision" for Christianity as a result of the magazine.

The currents of African affairs and politics are little understood by Americans, the minister said. This ignorance—which he termed "dangerous"—is reflected in American foreign policy and in other U.S. programs. He doubts the long-range effectiveness of the Peace Corps, for example, as the Corps members spend "far too short a time" in each country to understand it.

"In the mission," he laughs, "you don't even get a vote until you've been there about three years."

Americans could do the most good at this time, he feels, by strongly supporting—financially and with other aid—the African mission programs.

"They're doing the job in Africa," he said.

## Methodist Pastor Takes New Position

The Rev. R. Roderick Hulet, pastor of First Free Methodist Church, Eugene, has accepted call to Oroville, Calif., and will leave Eugene next week.

He will preach his final sermons in Eugene Sunday; at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. standard, 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. daylight, at the church, 1295 W. 18th Ave., Eugene.

At Oroville, the minister will organize a new Free Methodist Church, under his denomination's California conference. He came to Eugene six years ago, after three previous pastorates.

At present, he is serving as vice president of the Eugene Ministerial Assn., secretary of the Northwest region of the National Assn. of Evangelicals and secretary of the Oregon Conference, Free Methodist Church.

The Reverend Hulet is the Eugene church's second pastor. He and his wife and four children have been living in the church parsonage, 1975 Tyler St., Eugene. The church's congregation now numbers 125 persons.

The Reverend Hulet said that a new pastor for the Eugene congregation may be named at the Oregon Conference's meeting July 14 at Turner.

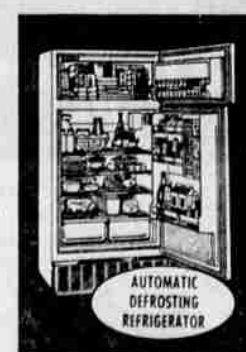
