

Reedsport Men Hurt In Mishaps

REEDSPORT—Two separate logging accidents near here Thursday resulted in injuries to two Reedsport men.

Arnold Wessels, 54, 912 N. Eighth St., was listed in fair condition Friday.

Another Reedsport logger, 23-year-old Raymond McColley, received a broken leg. He was rushed to Keizer Hospital where his condition was reported good.

A fellow logger, Ken Edgar, said that a log attached to a choker upended and struck McColley across the back of the thighs. He also incurred minor chest injuries.

The accident happened at Foot Log Ridge, near Loon Lake, 20 miles east of here.

Wessels, who works for Compton Logging Co., was bucking logs at Five-Mile, which is 14 miles northeast of here on Lake Tahkenitch when the mishap occurred at 3:18 p.m. daylight.

He was reportedly injured when the log he was bucking rolled and pinned him against timber which had been felled. Wessels was taken by ambulance to Keizer Hospital in North Bend after being attended at the scene by a Reedsport doctor.

The physician reported late Thursday night that Wessels had received a crushed chest and probable internal injuries. The hospital said Friday his condition was fair.

Breeding, Management Aid in Upgrading Herds

The commercial beef herd can move to the upper echelon of "purebred qualities" through use of a good purebred bull and replacement of older cows with "desirable heifers."

In four generations of breeding, says Cleve Dumdi, Lane extension agent in livestock, the offspring in this "select situation" will practically duplicate the traits of the purebred level.

For instance, the first generation of calves from a purebred bull will possess 50 per cent of the inheritance of the purebred, the agent explains. The second generation, by mating the heifer offspring to another purebred of the same breed, 75 per cent of the inheritance.

Poor Filbert Crop Predicted in Lane

The filbert crop is pretty much a failure in Lane County. The only bright spot is up the McKenzie where a fair yield is forecast for several orchards.

Trees supporting fat clusters of filberts a year ago now have only single hanging nuts—"and they're sparse," reports Duane Hatch, Lane extension agent.

He blames winter damage for the crop failure. "Probably the catkins were frozen before they pollinated the blossoms," he explains.

Throughout the county the situation in most orchards is only a gradation of "low expectations." The crop's so poor in several Creswell orchards that the nuts probably won't cover the expense of the control program for the filbert worm. The situation in River Road is described as "extremely spotty."

When Child Gets First Job

Parents' Attitude Important

If your youngster is trying his hand at a job for the first time this summer, do your part to see that he gets more than a paycheck out of the experience, an Oregon State University specialist advises parents.

"Although you can't follow him to the berry or bean fields, you can help him to build sound attitudes toward work," says Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist.

Parents should listen to themselves to learn what they're teaching their offspring. How

adults talk about their jobs influences the way a youngster feels about his first job. As parents, she asks, do you talk about how you've gotten by with little effort? Do you emphasize the quick instead of the best way of doing a job? Do you show respect for your employer and responsibility for your job by putting in a full day's work?

As you talk to your youngster about his work, help him to see his responsibilities to his employer, suggests Mrs. Frasier. If you plan a family vacation men-

tion this to the employer when the youngster is hired. If he's working on an hourly basis or expected at a certain hour, help him get to work on time.

A major aim of parents is to help a child develop a good feeling about himself so as he matures he'll feel good toward others, says Mrs. Frasier. This is why it's important, she continues, for a youngster to succeed at his first job.

Parents should be familiar with the job so they know the youngster is capable of doing it. Adults sometimes labor under a false assumption—pushing a child into a job early in life will develop his initiative to be industrious. Pushing too hard too early may do just the opposite—discourage initiative.

Another important memo to parents—not all children are ready to work at the same age. A couple of 16-year-olds may differ greatly in their abilities to hold down the same job.

Mrs. Frasier emphasizes tuning a sensitive ear toward youngsters' reactions as they come and go from their jobs. If your youngster suddenly resists going to work, try to find out what he's feeling. Some have upsetting experiences on the job, and forcing them back to work may be a mistake.
