

'Prophecy and the Jew' Conferences Start Sunday

Ikedo Assured Of Keeping Job

TOKYO (AP)—Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda, good friend of the United States, was virtually assured of keeping his job Saturday.

Eisaku Sato, a cabinet minister regarded as a possible challenger, announced he would not seek the presidency of the ruling Liberal-Democratic party at its convention July 14.

In Japan the job of prime minister traditionally goes to the leader of the ruling party.

The withdrawal of Sato, international trade and industry minister, from the race left only wealthy industrialist Aichihiro Fujiyama who resigned a week ago from Ikeda's cabinet as a possible contender—but he is not expected to be able to pull many votes.

Missioners To Discuss Their Work

A missionary doctor and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. Robert Sandilands, will be guest speakers Tuesday at a medical missions coffee hour at Central Presbyterian Church, Eugene.

The program, an annual event to emphasize the work of medical missionaries throughout the world, will be in the church's fellowship hall, beginning at 9 a.m. standard, 10 a.m. daylight. It is open to the public.

Sponsors of the program is the Women's Assn. of the church, with Circles 5, 9 and 11 serving as hostesses. Mrs. Stanley E. Drumm of Eugene is program chairman.

Dr. and Mrs. Sandilands are now stationed in the Bafia and Ilong mission stations in Cameroon, West Africa, where the doctor is director of medical mission work. They are on furlough until September, and are living in Salem until then.

The couple, both Oregonians, first went to the field in 1946. Their work now includes operating traveling clinics in remote areas with teaching worship as part of the program. They also teach nurses and medical assistants, direct Bible study for lepers and maintain central medical facilities at their two main stations.

A "sacrificial offering" will be taken at the coffee hour for the medical missions program of the National Ecumenical Mission Boards of the United Presbyterian Church.

Projects to be aided by the offering include medical work with the Navajo Indians in Arizona; child care in Alaska; Severance Hospital, Seoul, Korea; Christian hospital in Meshed, Iran, and Presbyterian Hospital in Melet, Cameroon, West Africa.

The Eugene schedule is "Israel's Sufferings," the Rev. den Arend, Sunday night; "Can the World Do Without the Jew?" the Rev. Gruen; "Israel's Restoration," the Rev. de Arend, and "The Patience of Love," Miss Backus.

All programs are open to the public.

The present seating capacity of the sanctuary is 175 persons, but this can be expanded to seat more than 200.

Construction of the building was completed this spring. The congregation moved from temporary meeting facilities at Harris School to the new building in March.

China Uses Religion For Its Own Ends

TOKYO — Communist China has announced that it will maintain its version of religious freedom for a long time to come. It conceded, however, that it has been guilty of errors in its religious policy.

These declarations were made by Chang Chih-yi, deputy director of the Communist Party's United Work Front Department, in the April issue of Nationalities, a translation of which has just been made available here. They were part of a restatement of the Chinese line on religion.

Chang noted that the principal religions in China are Catholicism, Islam, Buddhism, Taoism, and Christianity, by which he presumably meant Protestantism.

"These five different religions not only have a long history but will exist for quite a long period of time to come after the establishment of a Socialist society or even a Communist society," he said.

The Chinese Communist policy towards religion, he indicated, is to recognize its impact on the masses and seek to use it for its own ends.

To do so, it has placed religion under patriotic control and imprisoned priests and missionaries, both Chinese and foreign, who resisted this move.

The purged religions which have emerged have been given at least surface freedom. Churches, mosques and temples remain open, in some cases they have been repaired or reconstructed, and religious believers have been free to attend them.
