Tork Loses To Nikula In Finland

HELSINKI, Finland (AP)—U.S. Marine Dave Tork, a 16 feet, 2-inch pole vaulter, was beaten by world record claimant Pentti Nikula of Finland Friday on the final day of an international meet.

Nikula, who has a 16-2½ vault up for recognition, won the event at 15-11, and failed in three tries at 16-5, the five meter barrier.

Tork was third with 15-1. Another Finn, Haisto Laitinen was second at 15-3.

The U.S. took three of the six events on the card.

John Reilly of Georgetown captured the 800 meters in 1:49.6, with Herbert Misala of West Germany second by a stride and Gary Weisner of the U.S. Marines third, another step back.

Russ Rogers of Maryland State took the 400 meter hurdles in 52.2 seconds, and Jay Silvester, Tremonton, Utah, won the shot put with a heave of 56 feet, 4 inches.

Hans Joachim Reske of West Germany won the 200 meters in 21.7 and Slavko Span, Yugoslavia, won the 3,000-meter steeplechase in 8:54.8.

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England (AP)—A crew of fuzzy-cheeked kids from Washington Lee High School in Arlington, Va., wound up as the lone American representatives today in the Henley Royal Regatta.

The Virginia youngsters will vie for a berth in the final of the Thames Cup competition by meeting England's National Provincial Boat crew, which eliminated the Detroit Boat Club in Friday's quarterfinals.

Washington-Lee reached the semi-final by scoring a three-quarters of a length victory over the Argosies Rowing Club, comprised mainly of London dock workers.

The Yanks' last hope for a victory in the Grand Challenge Cup competition for heavy-weight eights vanished Friday when the University of Pennsylvania crew was eliminated by Moto-Guzzi of Italy in the semi-finals.

At Wimbledon Susman Tennis Winner

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Mrs. Karen Hantz Susman of San Antonio, Tex., brought the Wimbledon women's singles title back to the United States after four years today by defeating Mrs. Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia.

Mrs. Susman was seeded eighth. Mrs. Sukova was unseeded—the first women in Wimbledon's long history to reach the final from the unranked list.

Mrs. Susman gained victory in front of a packed and cheering center court crowd basking in the warmest weather here this year. She is 19. Mrs. Sukova is 30.

The triumph made Mrs. Susman the youngest winner of the woman's title since Maureen Connolly, also of the United States, triumphed in 1953. Mrs. Susman's college student husband watched her triumph.

Although the new net queen's home is in Chula Vista, Calif., she and her husband, Rodney, live in San Antonio, Tex., where he is attending Trinity University.

The American, seeking revenge for a loss in the recent Wightman Cup Matches, marched through the entire tournament, without losing a set. To her drive for the final round, Mrs. Sukova ousted defending champion Angela Mortimer, Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., and Maria Bueno of Brazil, seeded No. 1, 2, and 3, respectively.

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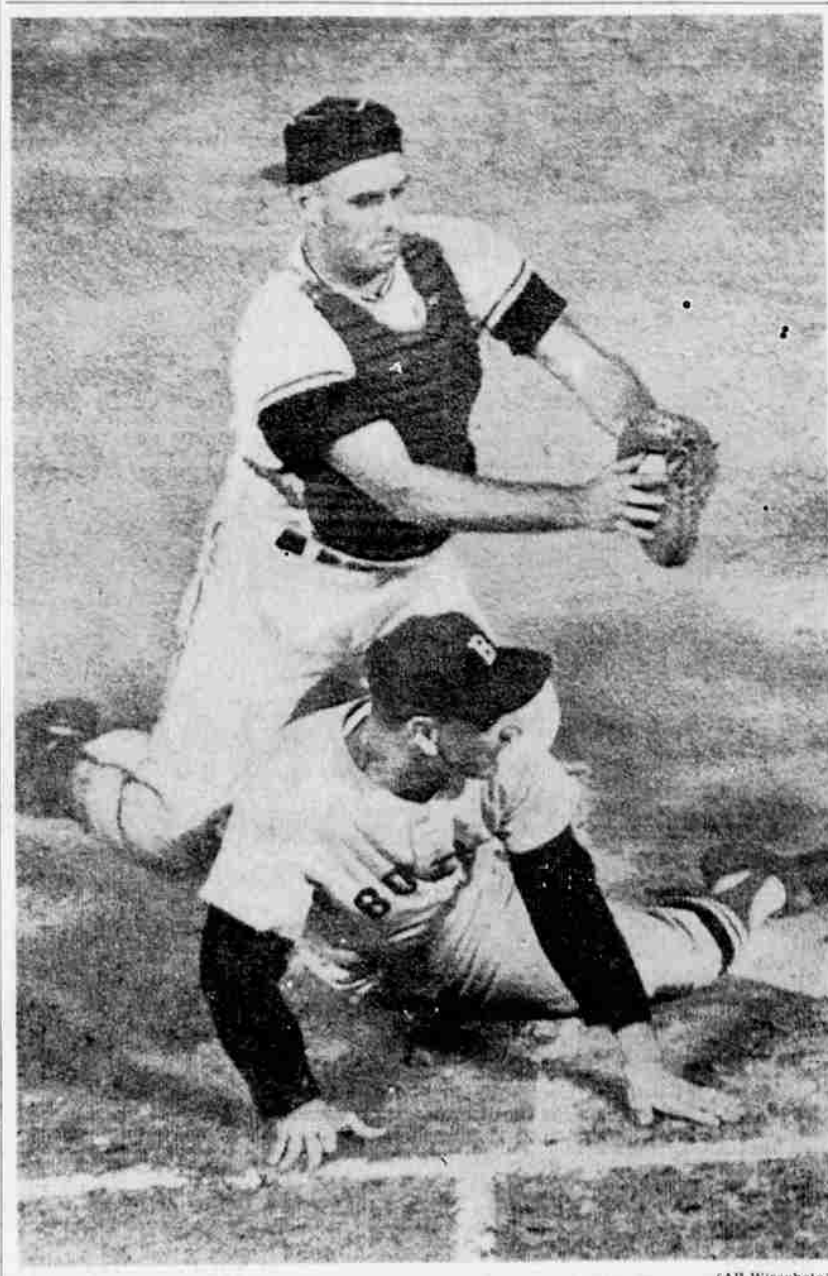

Mick, Rog Hit Four Homers

MINNEAPOLIS-ST. PAUL (AP)—The Yankees are ready to do business again, Maris and Mantle are back from lunch.

They were "gone" so long, a lot of people had nearly given up on them, but not patient, understanding Ralph Houk.

Houk says if another war broke out tomorrow, the first two guys he'd want on his side would be Roger and Mickey. As a quick afterthought, he claims they're not a bad combination to have in peacetime, either.

Between them both, they have hit a total of 13 home runs during the past week. Each clouted a pair in Friday night's 7-4 victory over the Minnesota Twins that kept the Yankees a scant half-game from first place.

Mantle, still hobbling occasionally because of a thigh injury that isn't completely healed yet, tied a major league record by connecting for successive homers off losing Camilo Pascual in his first two times up.

Mick had hit a pair of hom-

ers against Kansas City Wednesday in his last two times at bat, so that made him the 13th player ever to hit four homers in consecutive times up. He has 17 for the year, seven of which came in the past week.

Maris, with 21 homers for the season, rapped his first of the game Friday night with two on in the opening frame and connected again with the bases empty off reliever Lee Stange in the fifth.

The Indians, shut out by Wynn the first two times he faced them this season, scored two runs in the third inning. Ty Cline beat out a bunt and went to second on Nelson Fox's wild throw to first. Don Dillard's triple to right field sent Cline home and Dillard scored on an infield out.

Marichal Fans 13 as SF Trims Lead to ½ Game

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Juan Marichal has a simple formula in his highly successful pitching campaign for the San Francisco Giants this season: Starting plus finishing equals winning.

The youthful right-hander from the Dominican Republic followed his formula Friday night, firing a 5-hitter and striking out 13 as the Giants completed Los Angeles 12-3. It was Marichal's 12th victory, all complete games, and it moved San Francisco to within a half game of the National League-leading Dodgers—who had won eight in a row.

Collecting 11 hits off loser Stan Williams and reliever Ed Roebuck, and capitalizing on an outbreak of Dodger misplays, the Giants scored in clusters. They netted four runs in the third inning, five in the fifth and three in the sixth. Mean-
