

Recreation Area Program On Schedule

The U.S. Forest Service is just about on schedule with its vast program of rehabilitation, modernization and enlargement of recreation facilities throughout the nation, the service's top man said in Eugene Friday.

Chief Forester Edward Cliff, making an unannounced visit to Eugene as part of a tour of the Pacific Northwest, said that financing is following closely the schedule set up some years back.

"The budget for 1963 will put us within 10 per cent of the development schedule," he said.

The current recreational budget is about \$25 million a year, more than 10 times what it was ten years ago, Cliff said.

The problem is that so much time, money and effort has been spent "catching up," he explained. Many campsites which were built in the CCC days of the 1930s are run down and worn out. These have to be brought into shape before money can be spent on new campsites.

Cliff believes that private capital can do much to boost recreation usage of areas in the nation.

"We supply the areas on public land and hope that ski areas, resorts, lodges and other such developments can be built with private capital," he said.

There are many areas where private operators are making a tidy profit from such developments, he said, although there are many instances where private operation is failing.

Reasons for failures

The failures can generally be traced to poor financing and poor management, he claimed. "And, in ski areas, you can sometimes blame poor snow."

The chief forester expressed confidence that the newly created Federal Bureau of Recreation will provide "leadership, planning and coordination of activities" among the several federal agencies which have recreation as an obligation.

He said that Ed Crafts, the former Forest Service official who now heads the new bureau, is recruiting help, arranging finances and "shaping the bureau up at a good pace."

Although the bureau will have only long-range planning to do, Cliff said he is sure that much good can be accomplished.

Major Goal

"One of the major goals of the bureau is to assist states in developing their own recreational facilities," he said.

"When I return to Washington Monday, I will testify on two important bills before Congress: One of them would give recreational sanction to the recreation bureau which was created by executive order; the other would provide money to purchase land and help with state cooperation."

The chief, who served in the Pacific Northwest for many years, left Eugene Saturday morning to visit the Cottage Grove area and then to drive through the Umpqua National Forest.

\$75 Million Raised

The Rev. A. H. McDonnell will officiate at the funeral. Cremation will be at Rest-Haven Memorial Park.

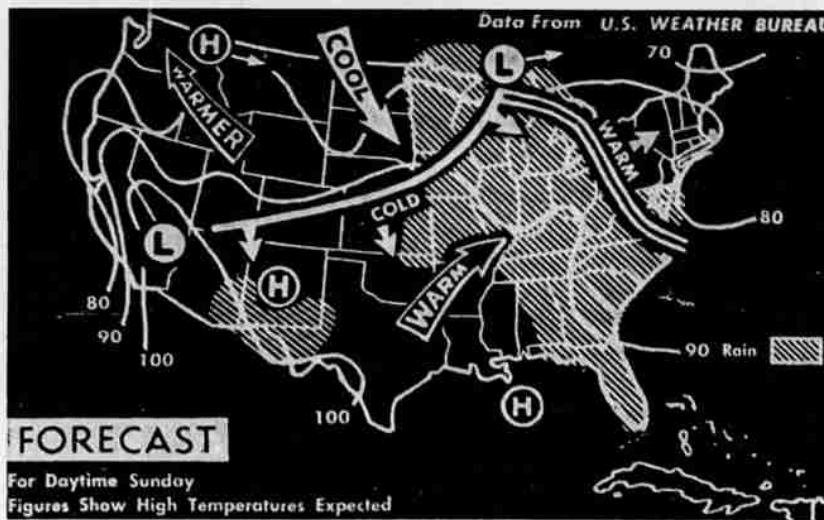
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Aerospace Unions Set Strike Date

BURBANK, Calif. (AP)—Unions for 125,000 workers have set a strike for July 23. They said it would cripple the United States aerospace industry.

The strike decision was reached Saturday at a meeting between top-level negotiators of the International Assn. of Machinists and the United Aerospace Workers, AFL-CIO.

A walkout would involve production workers at missile and airplane plants throughout the nation, as well as at many missile bases.

Action Not Disclosed

The announcement came a few days after a clear indication from a federal official that the administration would step in to avert any tieup in the sprawling aerospace industry. What action might be taken was not disclosed.

Unless contract agreements are reached by July 23, union negotiators said, the two unions will strike all plants of Lockheed, North American, Douglas, General Dynamics, Convair, Ryan, Aeronautics and Conquest General throughout the United States.

Workers also will be called off the job at these missile bases: Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.; Pacific Missile Range; Cape Canaveral, Fla.; Sheppard AFB, Tex.; Dyess AFB, Tex.; Walker AFB, Roswell, N.M.; Lincoln AFB, Neb.; Warren AFB, Cheyenne, Wyo.; Fairchild AFB, Wash.; and missile bases at White Sands, N.M.; Omaha, Neb.; Plattsburgh, N.Y.; Forbes, Kan.; Schilling, Kan.; Altus, Okla.; and Neosho, Mo.

To Receive Notice

Negotiators said the companies will be given notice of contract termination on July 13, with the strike date set for 10 days later. The strike date had been set tentatively a few days ago.

Federal Mediator Walter Magliolo said a few days ago that Labor Secretary Arthur Goldberg won't tolerate a walkout in the huge aerospace industry but did not indicate what action the administration might take in event a strike was called.

The unions are seeking wage increases and other benefits. Average hourly wage in the aerospace industry is \$2.71.

The government could invoke an 80-day injunction under the Taft-Hartley Act or appeal to both sides to wait until a fact-finding committee is appointed.
