

Delegates Eye Test Protest

MOSCOW (UPI)—A number of delegates to the Kremlin Peace Congress said Thursday they would march through Moscow from Red Square to the U. S. Embassy Friday in protest against nuclear testing.

Moscow city authorities promptly warned them they would consider the demonstration "an infringement of hospitality."

Delegates planning the march include members of the British, French, Canadian, Indian, United States, Danish, Norwegian and Japanese delegates to the World Congress on Disarmament and Peace in the Kremlin.

British delegates said they understood Moscow city authorities did not plan to obstruct the demonstration physically. But they were warned any marchers would be deported.

Moscow authorities gave no further details, they said.

Two Speeches

The conference Thursday heard two speeches which attacked the Soviet attitude to cold war tensions.

British Labor Party member of Parliament Sidney Silverman said Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's recent speech on testing "gives little hope" that the present deadlock in disarmament negotiations can be broken.

American Homer A. Jack of New York drew cries of "No, no," when he told the conference West Berlin is part of the Western system and access to it must be guaranteed.

Jack, an official of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy in New York, challenged peace movements of Communist countries to criticize the armament policies of their own governments as well as those of the West.

4,000 Listeners

He told about 4,000 listeners in the Kremlin Palace of Congresses there is a "basic difference" between the "World Council of Peace," which sponsored the congress and which he said was largely Communist-dominated, and American peace organizations.

"The peace movement in the United States speaks to its government. The World Council of Peace speaks for government," he said.

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Woman Killed

Man Denies He Fired Fatal Shot

PORTLAND (UPI)—Fred Morgan, 61, a Portland used car salesman, told detectives from his hospital bed Wednesday that he did not fire the shot that killed Mary Aline Muskopf, 44, Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Muskopf died of a gunshot wound in the head after she drove into Morgan's driveway in the northeast Portland suburbs Tuesday evening, police said.

Morgan admitted shooting himself after Mrs. Muskopf was fatally wounded, detectives said. He was found on the floor of his home with a .38-caliber revolver beside him.

Morgan told police he didn't know why he shot himself. He was charged with first degree murder and a guard was posted at his hospital room.

A neighbor told police he saw the car drive up, then shortly afterward heard a shot. He said the car careened backwards out of the driveway and smashed into a tree. Witnesses said Morgan walked up to the car, looked at Mrs. Muskopf and then went inside his house. Two gunshots were heard from inside the house, neighbors said.

Detectives said Morgan's son told them his father had been divorced 25 years ago and had not remarried. He said he knew his father had been seeing Mrs. Muskopf the past several years.

40th Birthday For Governor

PORTLAND (UPI)—Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield is 40 years old Thursday, but he celebrated Wednesday night.

More than 400 persons attended a party in the governor's honor in Portland. It was arranged by Mrs. Avery G. Foote, chairman of the Hatfield Women's Campaign Activities Committee for Multnomah County.

The governor's wife also was present, as were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Hatfield. The elder Hatfield will celebrate his 75th birthday July 28.

The Hatfields joined guests in sampling cake, hot dogs, coffee and soft drinks.

Oregon Entry Wins Award In Florida

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Oregon's entry in the Miss Universe beauty contest, Joyce Collin, was chosen as one of 15 American finalists Wednesday.

One of the girls will represent the U.S. in the international competition with 50 other nations Friday and Saturday.

Miss Collin, 20, from Lebanon, also received an award for the best state costume, a green dress adorned with wood shavings and trimmed with fir to symbolize Oregon's lumber industry.

She attends Oregon State University.

U.S. Highway 126 Label Given to Clear Lake Cutoff

The name "U.S. Highway 126" has been taken away from the McKenzie Pass and given to a new route that will allow motorists to drive it any time of the year between Eugene and Sisters.

The change of route designation was announced Thursday by Oregon State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper. The state highway department gained approval for the change from the American Assn. of State Highway Officials.

Coming west from Sisters, the U.S. Highway 126 designation will follow the Santiam Highway concurrently with the U.S. 20 designation to the junction with the Clear Lake cutoff. The Highway 126 designation will then follow the cutoff down to Belknap Springs. The stretch between Belknap and Eugene will continue under the Highway 126 name it now holds.

The effect of the change is to remove the Highway 126 designation from the present McKenzie Highway over the McKenzie Pass from Belknap Springs to Sisters. That section of road is closed during winters. The new route of Highway 126 will be open year round.

The McKenzie Pass section of highway will be known instead under a state highway designation, according to the highway department.

The American Assn. of State Highway Officials turned down that part of the route designation request which would have extended the Highway 126 name over Route F from Eugene to Florence. The national body deferred action on this request since the highway itself is not yet completed.

Cooper said the department would again apply after work on this road is done.

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In Doctors' Strike

Demonstrators Fail To Sway Premier

REGINA, Sask. (UPI)—Premier

Woodrow Lloyd and his cabinet are weighing a reply to a citizens rally petition for a new law to replace Saskatchewan's controversial medical care insurance plan.

But Lloyd said the rally Wednesday has not changed the Socialist provincial government's stand.

The demonstration brought several thousand persons from all parts of the province into the capital.

30,000? 3,000?

Committee organizers claimed a predicted 30,000 persons came into Regina for the rally. Police Chief A. G. Cookson estimated it at 15,000.

But Lloyd said it was no more than 3,000 and declared "the size of the crowd doesn't lend support to claims of overwhelming opposition to the government."

The placard-carrying demonstrators gathered in a picnic mood outside the provincial legislature buildings while a 12-man delegation from the keep-our-doctors sponsoring committee presented the petition to Lloyd and his aides.

The petition asked suspension of the medical care act that went into effect July 1 and precipitated the strike of doctors, who said it opened the door to government control of the medical profession.

The plan, designed to provide medical care for everyone, is financed by single-person and family assessments of \$12 and \$24 a year and by general taxation.

10-Minute Meeting

The delegation saw Lloyd for 10 minutes and was told that the government would reply to the petition as soon as possible.

Then the delegation joined the demonstrators outside for two hours of speeches.

The keep-our-doctors committee sought suspension of the medical care act to allow the striking doctors to return to normal service. This would be followed by negotiations between the government and the Saskatchewan College of Physicians and Surgeons to draft a

medical care act acceptable to everybody.

The committee said if the government refuses to suspend the act, dissolution of the legislature and a general election will be demanded.

The province had 700 practicing doctors when the act became effective. About 200 have been providing free emergency services at 35 of the province's 154 hospitals. A government spokesman said 40 Saskatchewan doctors are practicing under the government plan.

A number of striking doctors have left the province—some going to Illinois, Montana and North Dakota—asserting they and their families have been threatened with violence.

Recruiting Program

The provincial government originally sought 50 to 100 British doctors to supplement the provincial medical men still on duty. It stepped up its program by asking London agents to send over 200. They are being offered \$900 to \$1,800 a month, about twice their average earnings at home.

In a political byplay to the rally, the 19 Liberal members of the Saskatchewan legislature found themselves locked out of the chamber while the rally went on. The opposition party has been urging Lloyd to call a special legislature session to deal with the problem.

Lloyd Thatcher, liberal party leader, called the lockout "one of the most autocratic steps ever taken in Saskatchewan."

The premier said Thatcher had demanded a special session of the legislature under way at the same hour as the rally and termed it a theatrical gesture. He said the government will call a special session when it is reasonably certain that it might contribute to a solution.

Royalty Payments

COLOMBO (UPI)—The Ceylon government is considering restricting to three years royalty payments to foreign manufacturers for use of trade names and trade marks. The proposed move is designed to conserve foreign exchange.

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
