Tonight's predicted showers will be mostly confined to the upper and central Mississippi valley, north and central Plains and the northern Rockies, although a few showers are expected in the extreme northern sections of New England. Western Oregon will get some morning clouds Saturday, weathermen say. Cooler temperatures are due for the Northeast, and slightly warmer temperatures are forecast for the Dakotas and the upper Mississippi valley.

Restrictions On Camping Announced

Overnight camping outside developed campgrounds in the McKenzie district of the Willamette National Forest has been banned by administrative order, Forest Supervisor David Gibney announced this week.

Gibney said the action was taken to prevent unsanitary conditions, stream pollution and increased fire danger that has resulted from heavy and permanent use of undeveloped areas by campers.

The area is the site of several dam projects, and construction workers have been camping outside of developed areas. The upper McKenzie River, its south fork, and many of the tributary streams are in the area.

A ten-day limit on use of the developed campgrounds will also be enforced, the supervisor said.

"These are recreation areas and not intended for permanent home sites," he said.

The order applies to both tent and trailer camping.

Group Seeking Funds for Trees

PORTLAND (U)—Unless additional money can be raised for maintenance, some 40 per cent of the trees growing in cement-encased plots in downtown Portland streets may be hauled away.

Downtown Portland, Inc., said business firms fronted by the trees are being asked to put up \$18 for each, S. Eugene Allen, secretary, said 60 per cent of them have paid.

The organization now is trying to raise money to keep the other trees.

The trees were planted during Oregon's 1959 Centennial celebration.
