

'Years Don't Affect Age'

At 80, Former Professor Still Lives His Philosophy

Robert C. Hall, who is celebrating his 80th birthday today, believes "your age doesn't depend on the number of years you have lived."

Hall is a good example of his own philosophy. He retired from the University of Oregon journalism faculty in 1948, but he did not retire from a life of constant activity.

Hall, who began his career at Oregon just as the university press was being established, was instrumental in developing the press through the years.

Now, "I'm just having a good time," Hall said during an interview. "I play golf three times a week, the rest of the time I work in the garden."

Hall went to the University of Oregon in 1917, when the School of Journalism was young, and the university press was just getting started.

"I was a practical printer, so I went right to work in the press," Hall said.

He had been publisher of a weekly newspaper in Glendale, Ore., before coming to Eugene, and earlier in his career had managed other newspapers.

"At that time we only had a few pieces of machinery and some type that had been donated," Hall said. "We kept improving it, doing more and more printing. A lot of equipment has been added since I retired in 1948. In my opinion it is one of the outstanding university presses in the country."

In addition to his work as a university press staff member, Hall taught several courses in the School of Journalism, including publishing, proof reading and typography.

Hall retired with the title associate professor emeritus of journalism.

Tonight Hall will observe his 80th birthday with his children and other members of his family, at a dinner at the Eugene Country Club. Hosts for the party are Dr. and Mrs. John E. Lucas, Seattle; Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Hall, Portland, and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur McNett, Portland.

One Set for This Year

Council Approves 3 Paving Projects

Eugene's city council, meeting Thursday noon as a committee-of-the-whole, recommended approval of three more city paving projects. Two of the projects, however, won't be carried out until next summer.

Approved for this summer was the paving of an alley between Sixth and Seventh Avenues from Madison to Monroe streets.

Approved for next year's construction season was the paving of Tyler Street from 26th to 28th Avenue and the paving of Clark Avenue from Jackson to Lawrence Street. The council must still decide whether to put in curb sidewalks along Clark or require sidewalks with normal parking strips.

The council rejected a petition for paving part of the alley between 17th and 18th Avenues from Patterson Street to the north-south alley. Petitions representing 49.69 per cent of the property owners sought the project but several other owners

opposed it. Convening as the city's Urban Renewal Agency, the council members set Aug. 13 as the date for a public hearing on the University of Oregon's urban renewal project.

The project is intended to acquire properties for the university's east campus expansion. After the hearing the council must decide whether to sign a contract with the federal government for execution of the project.

Rose, Fuchsia Clubs Plan Sunday Picnic

No Cause Discovered For Crash

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — No conclusions have been reached about the cause of a light plane crash in which an Associated Press regional membership executive was critically injured June 27, state aeronautics officials said Thursday.

Tom Tugman, 34, remained in critical condition at Cheyenne's Memorial Hospital Thursday. He has been unconscious since the accident occurred at Douglas, Wyo., 134 miles north of Cheyenne.

Tugman was flying the rented plane alone from Denver to Gillette, Wyo., on a business trip. He works out of the Denver Associated Press bureau.

The Federal Aviation Agency has not yet begun an investigation of the crash.

Marvin Stevenson, state aeronautics director, said Tugman apparently attempted to land the single-engine craft downwind instead of against the wind, normal landing procedure.

The investigators said the reason for the crash may not be known until Tugman regains consciousness.

Tugman is the son of the late William Tugman, former editor of the Eugene Register-Guard, and later editor and publisher of the Reedsport Port Umpqua Courier.

Child Released From Hospital

COTTAGE GROVE—An 18-month-old boy, Kenneth J. Elmore Jr., who was rescued from a well Sunday, was released Friday from the Cottage Grove Hospital.

The boy's mother jumped into the well, pulled him to the surface and administered mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration for more than two hours before help arrived so she and the child could get out of the well.

Trees, Traffic Group Meets

A committee which grew out of a protest meeting over the removal of trees from portions of Hilyard and Patterson Streets held its second session Thursday night—and has scheduled another meeting for Aug. 9.

Vince Farina, Eugene Planning Commission member, who was elected chairman of the new Trees and Traffic Committee at its initial meeting last month, said Friday he feels the organization is rapidly becoming familiar with the problems involved in traffic planning.

About 25 persons attended the meeting at Harris Hall. Maps, showing some of the planning studies that have been made for Eugene's long-range traffic needs, were presented.

Farina said the next meeting will be devoted to a study of what some other cities have done to improve the movement of traffic, short of widening streets and removing trees along them.

Committees, except for the city planning commission representatives, all volunteered to serve on the committee last May.

They attended the meeting to protest the removal of trees to widen Hilyard and Patterson from Franklin Boulevard to 13th Avenue.

Betty Niven, commission member, urged the protesters then to help find other solutions to the city's traffic needs by serving on a citizens committee.

Pilot Highway Study Tests New Methods

A long-range highway needs study done for the Eugene-Springfield area is a pilot experiment that may save dollars for cities throughout the country.

This was revealed Thursday at a meeting of officials from Lane County, Eugene, Springfield, the Central Lane Planning Council, the State Highway Dept. and the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

These were the agencies that participated in financing the local study. The work itself was done by the University of Oregon Bureau of Municipal Research, this project under the direction of Donald N. Johnson.

J. Al Head, assistant traffic engineer in the state highway department, explained that Johnson's approach to determining future highway needs in new and original. It is also consider-

ably easier and less expensive than the usual method employed: A comprehensive origin-destination study involving door-to-door surveying of local residents.

Head stated that sometime in the future the State Highway Dept., with the help of the local agencies, will conduct a traditional origin-destination study in the Eugene-Springfield area.

Such a study will take three to four years and cost about \$250,000. Head stated, although the approximately 25 per cent share borne by local agencies could be made up mostly in contribution of services.

The results of the traditional type of study will be checked against the results of Johnson's study in hopes of proving that Johnson's methods can produce the same results.

If the effectiveness of Johnson's methods are verified, it will be possible for communi-

ties around the country to employ that method in trying to map out their future highway needs.

A representative of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads explained that the new method could become even more valuable in light of a new provision in amendments to the Federal Highway Act being passed by Congress this year.

One of those provisions, which becomes effective in 1965, will require a community to have available a comprehensive highway plan before any federal highway money can be spent in that urban area. No such requirement exists now.

The highway study method employed by Johnson at the Bureau of Municipal Research may prove a simpler and cheaper way of producing the necessary urban highway plans.

Employment Up Again During June

Employment continued to go up and unemployment continued to go down during the month of June in Lane County.

The monthly report from the Eugene office of the State Employment Service showed that only 3.2 per cent of those covered by unemployment insurance were out of work at the

This compares with a rate of 4.3 per cent in June the year before and the same rate in May of this year.

Farm employment registered a seasonal increase of some 1,100 workers from mid-May to mid-June. In addition, food processors added 120 employees and lumber and wood products firms increased their crews by 440.

Transportation-utilities, retail trade, finance and service categories all showed employee increases of 100 or more.

The single dark spot for June was in the construction industry. "Here the labor dispute not only prevented the normal increase, but caused a net decline from May," the report stated.

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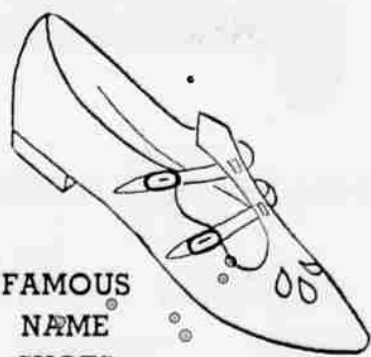
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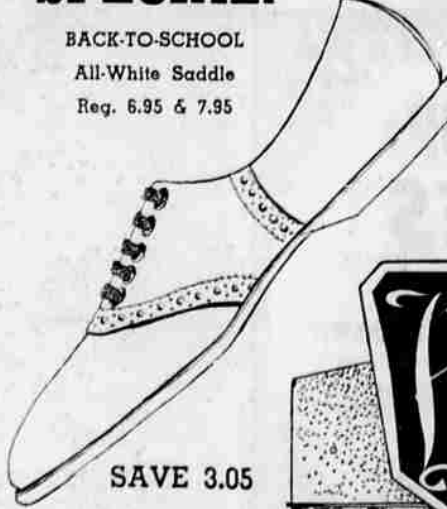
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
