

Red Chinese Accuse India Of Intrusions

'Can't Be Bullied,' Broadcast Says

TOKYO (AP)—Red China Monday accused India of "most fanatic" aggressive activities and charged a string of three new Indian outposts has been set up in the disputed frontier area of Ladakh.

"The Indian side will make a fatal mistake if it should think that China is flabby and can be bullied," said a Peiping broadcast of a new note handed to the Indian Embassy Monday.

The note warned against "playing with fire in an attempt to assert its territorial claims by armed force."

Garrison Encircled

The new Indian posts described by the note appeared to be south of the Galwan Valley in the Soda Plains area of Ladakh where a small Indian garrison has been partly encircled by about 400 Red Chinese for nearly a week.

New Delhi military sources said the Chinese withdrew to a distance of a little more than 200 yards from the post late last week after having approached to within 15 yards at places. India claims the post is 10 miles west of even the boundary claimed by Red China. Peiping claimed it was 10 miles inside Red China.

Troops Harassed

The new Red Chinese note said one of the new Indian outposts was on the north bank of Pangong Lake, more than a mile inside Chinese territory, and another on the south bank, six miles inside China. The lake was described as being astride the border. The third post was said to be several miles to the north of the lake.

Alleging "serious new Indian military intrusions and provocations," the note said Indian motorboats on Pangong Lake frequently intruded into Chinese territory, harassing Chinese troops and bringing in men and supplies "to support its newly established aggressive strong points."

Youth Injured in Fall From Rooster Rock

GRESHAM (AP)—Edward Bourgo, 17, a high school student, is recovering in a Gresham hospital from injuries he suffered Sunday in a fall from Rooster Rock in the Columbia Gorge.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Miss Universe could have danced all night, but she didn't. She had to be in her room at 1 a.m. Monday.

Norma Nolan, the 24-year-old brunette model from Argentina who has never had a date without a chaperone, formally opened her reign at the coronation ball in Miami Beach's swank Fontainebleau Hotel.

She had a date—and more than 1,000 escorts—at the ball, including consular officials from the 50 nations represented at the week-long pageant.

The smoky-eyed brunette dazzled the glittering crowd in a white evening gown that clung to her 35-25-36 figure, and a new white fur that cost the pageant \$10,000.

Honored guests along with Miss Nolan and blonde Marlene Schmidt of West Germany, the retiring Miss Universe, were the runners-up. Vatican Officials Investigate Blast

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Vatican officials investigated Monday a bomb explosion in St. Peter's Basilica but said they attach no political significance to the blast. They said it appeared the work of someone mentally deranged.

Thousands of worshippers and tourists visited the mother church of Roman Catholicism Sunday and services were held as usual. Extra guards were on hand, however, to make sure cameras and packages were checked at the door.

Rope surrounded the spot where the tiny bomb went off Saturday night after the Basilica had closed. Damage was slight and no one was injured.

Pope John XXIII made his normal Sunday appearance at his studio window at noon and gave his blessing to a crowd in St. Peter's Square. Then he was driven to his summer residence at Castel Gandolfo, 12 miles southeast of Rome, to stay until September.

Vatican sources said they

thought it would be almost impossible to pick out the bomber from the tens of thousands of tourists and worshippers who visited the Basilica Sunday.

Part of a timing device and fragments of the bomb were found, but apparently nothing else.

The bomb exploded in a chapel to the right of the main altar. It was placed on a monument in the chapel to Pope Clement X. A bit of marble was chipped off the monument and a nearby organ was slightly damaged.

Authorities speculated that the bomber was a tall man because the bomb had been placed atop a six-foot high pedestal of the monument. The authorities also said the bomb appeared to have been made by an expert, who deliberately set it to go off when no one would be in the Basilica.

For this reason, they felt, the bomber intended the explosion as a sign of protest, rather than an act of destruction.

Algerian Campaign for Power

Tribesmen Blocking Ben Bella

ALGIERS (AP)—The tough tribesmen of the Kabyle Mountains have become the biggest obstacle to Ahmed Ben Bella's campaign for power in Algeria.

The dissident deputy premier's followers describe Algeria's Kabyle minority as their main problem. They are working hard to win the Kabyles' sympathies.

But Ben Bella's agents, cam-

paigning in the towns and villages of the mountain range east of Algiers, are finding the Kabyles' tribal discipline impossible to break. Almost to a man, they are loyal to the government of Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda.

Estimated to number more than a million, the Kabyles took a leading part in the bitter underground war against the French. They suffered heavy losses. Hundreds of their inhabitants moved to relocation camps.

Now that the war is over, they are rebuilding their villages. They generally favor Algeria's cooperation with France, as laid down in the Evian peace agreements and promised by Ben Khedda. Ben Bella wants to turn Algeria toward the Communist East.

The Kabyles' leader is balding revolutionary hero Belkacem Krim, one of the strong men of Ben Khedda's team and the chief nationalist negotiator at the Evian talks.

TLEMCEN, Algeria (AP)—A meeting of top Algerians favor-

able to dissident Vice Premier Ahmed Ben Bella was being arranged Monday to discuss the struggle for power in the new nation.

Official sources refused to give any details on the gathering, but newsmen noted unusual activity around the villa where Ben Bella is installed with his aides. Civilian and military officials were arriving in cars and a radio-equipped army vehicle was parked nearby.

One report said that former rebel premier Ferhat Abbas and Col. Houari Boumedienne were among those who came to confer with Ben Bella.

Boumedienne was dismissed as chief of staff of the National Liberation Army by Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda of the Algerian Provisional Government, now installed in Algiers. But Boumedienne and Ben Bella have refused to recognize Ben Khedda's authority.

Meanwhile a meeting of military leaders favorable to Ben Khedda was scheduled to be held across the country near Blida sometime this week.

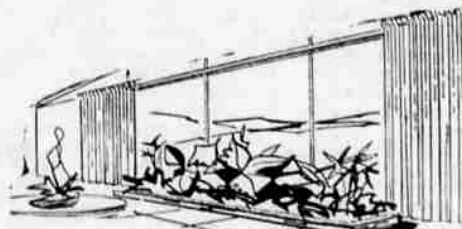
