'An International Style'

Composer, Educator See 'International' Music

An Austrian composer and a German music educator agreed in Eugene Monday that contemporary composers are doing away with national differences in music.

"European and American composers are coming closer together every year," declared Egon Kraus, of Oldenburg, Germany. "We are seeing the end of national schools of music. There will be an international style."

To this statement, Cesar Bresgen, of Salzburg, Austria, nodded his approval. The only exception to the trend, he said, are the Iron Curtain countries where music is subject to political ideology.

Both men are here for the month of July to participate in summer school events at the University of Oregon. Bresgen is acting as guest lecturer in the university's summer Academy of Contemporary Arts and taking part in an International Music Education Workshop at the school of music. Kraus is in teaching three classes in the music school workshop.

Kraus is a professor of music education at Oldenburg and lectures widely in Europe. He is executive secretary of UNESCO's International Music Council. Bresgen is a professor of composition at the State Academy of Music in Salzburg, Austria. He has composed ballets, choruses, cantatas and numerous other works.

A free concert of some of Bresgen's works will be presented July 26, at 7 p.m. standard, 8 p.m. daylight in the school of music auditorium. Bresgen will play some of the selections on the piano and others will be presented by a chamber ensemble.

The two men reported that the music profession in Europe is in a healthy state.

"The question is not how to give young musicians a job," declared Kraus, "but how to fill the vacancies that exist in our orchestras."

One boon to "live" music in Europe, they explained, is the state-operated radio systems in most countries.

In Germany, for example, Kraus said recorded music is prohibited on radio stations. Almost every radio station has at least one orchestra—and some have several — he said. Citizens pay an annual permit fee of \$6 for their radio sets and this money all goes back to operate the radio stations.

Even though the popular taste for serious music still centers around the classics of the past, modern European composers are venturing out into many new forms of music expressions, Bresgen said.

"They are all searching for new sounds," he said.

"They are trying to explore the boundaries of musical sound to the extremes," Kraus added.

"Serial" composing, basing music on mathematical combinations; the use of instruments to approach electronic sounds—or even combinations of musical instruments and electronic sounds — are all being tried.

"This is music for the few," Bresgen noted.

Both men said they are enjoying their stay in Eugene. "I felt at home from the first minute," Kraus declared. The men are hopeful of getting away from the campus during part of this weekend for a hike in the Cascade Mountains.

City Planners Vote Against Street Appeal

Vacation Sought For Football Field

Eugene's city planning commission Monday recommended that the city not vacate a 400 foot strip of 16th Avenue right-of-way to enable St. Francis High School to install power poles for a lighted football field within the right-of-way.

The commission said future street needs are too uncertain in the area to permit the city to give up the right-of-way for a 15-year period, as requested by the Catholic Archdiocese of Portland.

The commission adopted a sub-committee report recommending against the vacation. The committee recommendation leaves a way open for the church to acquire the land it needs, however. It suggests that "if the petitioner wants to pursue the matter further, the petitioner be requested to present a feasible plan for relocation of 16th Avenue to the city, and that the plan presented have the approval of the county and the county fair board."

The 16th Avenue right-of-way runs between the high school and the county fairgrounds.

Eugene City Council members met with the commission Monday. Several of the council members questioned the planners' recommendation. Councilman M. F. Moyer said it was "foolish" to ask the church to try to find an alternate route for the street when the planners couldn't recommend one themselves.

Councilman Wallace Swanson said he still feels the city "should do what we can" to make the land available to the high school for lighting purposes.

In another matter, the commission recommended the city grant R-2 permissive use for a tract located at 1510 Coburg Road to enable the petitioner, Charles E. Wilkins, to construct an apartment house there. The land is now zoned RA outer residential.

On Carmen-Smith

4½-Month Delay OK'd

A 4½-month delay in completion of Eugene Water & Electric Board's complex \$28 million Carmen-Smith hydroelectric project due to construction difficulties was granted Monday by EWEB directors.

The decision was made upon recommendation of the utility's project engineers, the Bechtel Corp. And these recommendations were based upon time extension requests made by the project's prime contractor, Peter Kiewit Sons Inc.

Directors agreed to move back completion of the hydro-

electric project on the upper McKenzie River from Oct. 1, 1962 to Feb. 13, 1963—a 135 day delay.

The major reason for granting the time extensions was labor troubles that have stopped work on the project three times during the past year, according to Project Engineer Ed Peterson of Bechtel.

These were the six-week strike-lockout of the operating engineers last summer; the week-long carpenters' lockout this spring, and the current ironworkers work stoppage that is now in the eighth week.

Peterson said the contractor also requested delays due to bad weather and power outages, and these were all taken into consideration in determining a new completion date.

Peter Kiewit Sons have previously been granted delays of 45 days for completion of the water-plugged diversion tunnel and 22 days for the project's largest dam, Smith Dam. But this is the first time that EWEB directors have granted a new completion date for the entire Carmen-Smith project.

This involves seven main components: Carmen diversion dam, Smith Dam, and Trail Bridge Dam; the Carmen power tunnel and the diversion tunnel; the Carmen power house, and the Trail Bridge power house.

Peterson said the Carmen powerhouse that will hold two generators producing 80,000 kilowatts of electricity has "encountered more delays than any other feature of the project."

The new completion date for the project is 30 days after the date set for completing this powerhouse.

The present ironworkers dispute is tying up work on every feature of the Carmen-Smith project except the two tunnels, Peterson said.

\$2.5 Million Bond Issue Authorized

A resolution authorizing the sale of a \$2.5 million bond issue to finance increased costs of the Eugene Water & Electric Board's Carmen-Smith project was approved Monday by EWEB directors.

The resolution states the terms under which the bond issue will be sold. EWEB Supt. Byron Price said he hopes the issue will be sold on Sept. 25.

L. C. Peterman, a bond consultant employed by the utility, said that he thinks EWEB will probably pay a 3¼-per-cent interest rate for the 20-year issue.

EWEB paid a 3.93-per-cent rate on the original \$25 million bond issue for Carmen-Smith that was sold in 1960.

No Tax Money

The bond issue will be financed from the municipal utility's revenues, and will not involve tax money or cause hikes in utility rates, Price said.

The extra money for Carmen-Smith is needed because construction difficulties arose primarily in excavating the project's two long tunnels. Total costs rose by about \$3½ million, and EWEB is financing more than \$1 million of these out of accumulated savings.

EWEB directors approved the spending of \$268,676 for building new water department facilities.

These include a new 1¼-million gallon concrete reservoir atop an 800-foot hill off South Willamette Street in the vicinity of South 48th Avenue. This will cost about \$96,452 and is part of EWEB's long-range plan of building a series of new reservoirs in the city to improve water pressure and provide service for new residential areas.

Transmission Line

EWEB also will spend \$168,000 to build a transmission line from the Hawkins Hill Reservoir that is now under construction. It will connect the reservoir to lines on West 7th Avenue.

And directors approved bids totaling \$4,224.30 for valves needed for the Hawkins Hill Reservoir transmission line. Low bidders were Consolidated Supply Co. and Fabri-Valve Co.

"During my first term, Eugene voters have been good enough to pass many millions worth of bonds for streets, sewers, a new city hall — everything we've asked for," Molholm said. "Our plans and money to finance them have come to reality. I feel it would be unfair if all of us on the council now drop out and not help implement these programs."

TV Film Cancels Roundup Scenes

There's no business like show business, according to the old saying.

And so far as some extra show business at the Emerald Empire Roundup is concerned, there'll be no business.

That was the report Tuesday on the chances that a Hollywood production company would come to Eugene Aug. 3-5 to film portions of a new television show, "The Wide Country," at the various Roundup events.

"It's very disappointing," said Glen Flock, secretary of the Roundup association's board of directors.

The possibility that the 1962 Roundup would serve as backdrop for the television cameras fell into the laps of Roundup officials recently—and they were obviously happy at the prospect.

"The Wide Country," starring actor Earl Holliman as a rodeo rider, was supposed to involve shooting scenes of rodeo action and other events.

Veteran actor and rodeo clown Slim Pickens, also associated with the new series, was said to be responsible for the choice of Eugene's Roundup as a location site.

"We thought everything was all fixed," Flock said. Revue Studios, which is doing the filming, even authorized Roundup officials to release publicity about the forthcoming location work.

But scarcely had the news releases gone out over the week-end when the whole situation took a reverse turn. It was reported to the Roundup board Monday night that the television people had canceled the appearance here.

This was confirmed Tuesday by George Lollier, production manager for Revue Studios. "We have canceled out completely," he said in Hollywood. "We just can't get away . . . production is too heavy here."

Two Persons Hurt, Two Horses Killed in Collision

A Eugene couple was injured Tuesday morning when their auto plowed into a group of horses which had jumped onto Highway 99 near the Saginaw intersection.

Two of the animals—registered quarter horses owned by Preston H. Russell, of 780 N. Tenth St., Cottage Grove—were killed outright.

Injured were the driver of the car, Hugh Carnes Phelps, 56, of 2352 Willamette St., and his wife, Fern, 46. Phelps was first taken by private auto to Cottage Grove Hospital and later transferred to Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene with an eye injury. He was in fairly good condition.

Mrs. Phelps received outpatient treatment at Cottage Grove for cuts and bruises.

State police said the Phelps were driving south about 55 or 60 miles an hour when five horses jumped onto the highway and into the path of the vehicle. Phelps swerved but couldn't avoid a sorrel mare which smashed the auto's hood and windshield, or a gray colt. The car was described as a total wreck.

The mishap occurred shortly before dawn.
