Goldberg Announces Settlement

Iron Strike Over

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg announced Saturday settlement of the weeks-long ironworkers strike in parts of Oregon and Washington.

Missile Strike Postponed For 60 Days

WASHINGTON (AP)—The machinist union announced Saturday a 60-day postponement of a threatened Monday strike deadline at U. S. missile plants and sites, as requested by President Kennedy.

The announcement was made here by Vice President Jesse McGon of the union, the AFL-CIO International Assn. of Machinists, shortly after Kennedy appealed for a delay to permit a fact-finding panel to study the dispute.

The union represents about 120,000 of the 150,000 aerospace industry workers who had been scheduled to strike major missile manufacturing plants at noon Monday.

A spokesman said officials of the United Auto Workers Union, which represents the remaining 30,000 men, were meeting in Los Angeles to consider the President's appeal.

Treaty Approved For Neutral Laos

GENEVA (AP)—The East-West conference on Laos Saturday formally approved a treaty pledging the independence and neutrality of that Southeast Asian kingdom—amid recriminations and warnings exchanged between the United States and Red China.

U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk reminded the Communists that the agreement must be scrupulously observed if it is to achieve its objective of ending civil war and taking Laos out of the cold war.

2 Returned To Newport

Two suspects captured near Creswell Friday following a high speed, bullet-punctuated police chase have been returned to Newport in Lincoln County to face charges of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon.

WARRANTS for Joseph Ronald Haber, 19, of Tampa, Fla., and Blair Henry Record Jr., 20, of Seattle—both identified as escapees from the Hillsboro County Prison in Florida—were issued Friday in connection with the robbery of a service station at Agate Beach, near Newport.

Two young men and a girl took \$5 in cash and \$3 worth of gasoline. A knife reportedly was used in the robbery.

The girl captured with the two men, Jeannette Dale Aosa, 15, of Seattle, was not charged. She was held for a time at Skipworth Juvenile Home and then released to her parents.

The chase occurred after State Policeman Allen F. Jacobs spotted their car on Highway 99 West, north of Eugene. He gave chase but lost it. Eugene policemen spotted the car again at Franklin Boulevard and Walnut Street and chased it south on Highway 99.
