

Reds to Snub Court View

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A World Court opinion that all United Nations members are legally bound to share peace-keeping costs of the Congo and Suez sparked predictions Saturday that some debtor nations would swing into line—but not the Soviet-led Communist bloc.

The Soviet Union, which refuses to pay on either the Congo or Middle East operation, already has made clear it will ignore the 9-5 decision handed down at The Hague and oppose any attempt by the U.N. General Assembly to endorse it.

Diplomats generally expressed confidence that the 104-nation assembly can muster enough votes when it convenes this fall to uphold the court's advisory opinion.

The Hague decision opened the way for crucial assembly debate not only on whether to uphold the court's opinion, but whether to revoke the voting power of any nation falling more than two years behind in its dues for the peace-keeping operations and the regular U.N. budget. The U.N. charter provides for such penalties, but they have never been imposed.

At present only Bolivia, Guatemala, Paraguay and Yemen are two full years behind in all U.N. assessments. By paying a total of about \$37,000 they could avoid sanctions. Diplomats close to the issue predicted they would do this before the assembly meets Sept. 18 for the new session.

The United States hailed the decision as one of fundamental importance to international law and to the present and future capacity of the United Nations to maintain peace.

Officials in Washington said the court action should strengthen President Kennedy's hand in getting Congress to let him buy up half of the \$200-million U.N. emergency bond issue to help ease the world forum from bankruptcy.

The General Assembly had asked the World Court to hand down an opinion whether the cost of the U.N. Congo force and the emergency force stationed between Israel and Egypt should be borne by all U.N. members as apportioned by the assembly.

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The statement also noted that funds held in escrow and a \$10 million insurance policy protect the department. It stood on the previous statements by Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman that the government won't lose a cent through shortage in Estes Elevators.

Seven Killed In Collision

SHAWANO, Wis. (AP)—A two-car collision at the crest of a hill on a country road in northeastern Wisconsin early Saturday killed seven persons—six in one car and one in the other. There were no survivors.

The Shawano County sheriff's office identified the dead as: Walter Grimm, 48, and his wife, 44; John Koepke, 51, his wife 46; and Oscar Mehler, 52, and his wife, 43, all lived near the village of Marion on the Shawano-Waupaca County line; and Dilton Pingel, 23, who lived in Marion.

The sheriff's office said the two vehicles crashed head-on near the top of a rather steep hill within five miles of the homes of the victims.

The accident was reported to the sheriff's office at 3:36 A.M. However, the watches of two women were stopped at 1:15.

The couples were trapped inside the wreckage of their car. The driver of the other was thrown partially out by the impact.
