

Judge Rejects Negroes' Plea

MACON, Ga. (AP) — U.S. Dist. Judge W. A. Bootle refused Monday to interfere in an injunction issued by a fellow federal judge prohibiting mass integration demonstrations at Albany, Ga. The judge turned down a request for a hearing on an order of Dist. Judge J. Robert Elliott of Columbus, Ga., who Friday banned protest activities by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and other Negro integrationists.

"This matter is being handled by Judge Elliott," Bootle said. "Any matter for relief should be presented to Judge Elliott."

Struck Airline Schedules Four Flights

NEW YORK (AP) — Eastern Airlines put its first plan in the air Monday since it was struck by its flight engineers June 23 in an effort to resume limited service while the dispute continues.

An Eastern DCB jetliner took off from Idlewild Airport here for Miami, the first of four daily flights scheduled by the struck airline.

An Eastern flight from Miami to New York also was scheduled and two flights between the two cities were scheduled for latter Monday.

Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg scheduled a meeting at his Washington office with company representatives and Flight Engineers International Assn. President Ron Brown to discuss the dispute over the third pilot issue. Eastern has offered the engineers the same terms the union accepted from Trans World Airlines, but they have been turned down.

The first flight made no money for Eastern, which is reported to have lost \$30 million in revenue due to the strike. The 10 passengers aboard the jetliner were all Eastern employees or their dependents traveling on passes, and the total revenue was \$50.

The flight engineer aboard the plane was described by the airline as a FEIA member who had reported for duty in compliance with the airline's ultimatum issued last Wednesday. The airline had told the engineers to report to work by Tuesday or be replaced.

Sponsors of Korean Orphans Set Picnic

A picnic for sponsors of children at the Sungkuk Orphanage in Pusan, Korea, is planned for next Saturday, July 28, near Scottsburg, 15 miles east of Reedsport.

All sponsors and their families are invited.

The picnic will be at the Eugene Taylor farm, near Scottsburg, and directions on how to get there will be posted on the highway about one mile east of Scottsburg.

Picnic time will be 12 noon standard, 1 p.m. daylight. Coffee will be furnished.

Shakespearean Festival Opens

ASHLAND (AP) — The 22nd Oregon Shakespearean Festival opened Saturday night before an overflow audience of 1,160 after Gov. Mark Hatfield called it "one of the greatest jewels of our cultural life."

Hatfield addressed the audience briefly before the opening scenes of "Comedy of Errors." Three other plays will be shown in rotation during the 44-performance festival.

Nearly 1,500 persons joined in a huge barbecue in nearby Lithia Park before the play.

Ticket sales for the festival have been brisk, but officials stressed that seats are still available for most performances.

Morse Plans To Campaign For All Dems

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse pledged to campaign for the entire Democratic ticket in Oregon here Sunday, and repeated his denial of any campaign deal with GOP Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Morse spoke to some 400 Democrats at a picnic. He shared the platform with Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, candidate for governor, and House Speaker Robert Duncan of Medford, Fourth District Democratic congressional nominee.

Morse called false a report in a national magazine that he and Hatfield had agreed to a policy of non-interference in each other's race.

Morse also repeated his insistence that the Kennedy administration take action to relieve the northwest lumber industry. He again called for temporary quotas on Canadian lumber, based on the average of Canadian imports over the past ten years.

Thornton gave Hatfield a large share of the blame for a new timber tax law he said will force counties to raise taxes.

Thornton referred to the timber tax law passed by the 1961 legislature and signed by Hatfield. He said many counties will face increased taxes as a result of the law.

Land Offered

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican actor-comic Cantinflas, who starred in "Around the World in 80 Days," has offered to donate enough land for a subdivision of low-cost homes. He said the development would be for bit-part and other actors with low incomes.

Nine Persons Hurt in Lane Auto Crashes

Nine persons were injured in four weekend accidents in the Emerald Empire. Two of the injured remained hospitalized Monday morning.

Four of the injuries came Sunday evening when a car went out of control on a curve on Lone Pine School Road west of Eugene. State police said the car, driven by Stanley Leo Nielsen, 17, of Rt. 5, Box 1113, Eugene, skidded to the wrong side of the road and struck an oncoming car driven by William Grant Rogers, 26, of Santa Clara, Calif.

Nielsen, Rogers, and Rogers' wife Vivian, 26, were treated and released at Sacred Heart Hospital. A passenger in the Nielsen car, Clinton D. Smith, 18, of Rt. 5, Box 1122, Eugene, was reported in good condition at Sacred Heart Monday with facial lacerations.

Two cars collided at the intersection of Henderson Ave. and Highway 99 south of Eugene early Sunday morning, injuring one man, Frank R. Berkshire, 27, of Salem, was reported in good condition Monday at Eugene Hospital and Clinic with leg and arm injuries.

State police said a car driven by Owen Keith Hough, 20, of 2415 Henderson Ave., Eugene, pulled out of Henderson and was struck by Berkshire's southbound car on Highway 99.

A car blew a tire and wrecked in a ditch on Highway 58 about three miles east of Pleasant Hill early Monday, injuring one man, Wilbur Snyder, 23, of 176 Iowa St., Eugene, was treated at Sacred Heart and released.

Weekend Mishaps Kill 10 Oregonians

Accidents killed ten Oregonians, seven of them young people, during the weekend as residents turned out on the highways and waterways to escape the state's first real heat spell.

Five persons died in traffic accidents: four drowned, and one youth was killed in a farm accident.

Jack Kettlewell, 16, of Troutdale drowned in the Sandy River near Gordon Creek Road Sunday evening. His clothes and fishing pole were on the bank. His body was recovered.

Three children drowned Saturday. Linda Damaske, 11, Lake Grove, drowned after diving into Lake Oswego. Another swimmer saw her floating, but efforts to revive her failed.

David Mark Gray, 5, of Stayton, drowned on an outing at Thomas Creek. He wandered away and was not missed until his parents called the youngsters to a picnic dinner.

Wanda Sue Reed, 13, Ontario, was lost in the Snake River east of Ontario.

James S. Bauer, 16, son of a Portland automobile dealer, was killed late Saturday night when his car and another car collided.

Another 16-year-old youth, Merle Duane Seeley of Helix, was killed when his car went out of control at the edge of Pendleton.

Rotchley Jones, 60, of Yachats and Mrs. Marianne Moriet, 54, of Portland were killed on Highway 101 at Otter Crest Saturday.

Mrs. Rose Cantu, 39, a migrant farm worker, died in a Sa-

lem Saturday after a truck carrying 14 members of two families went over a 35-foot bank Friday. Six others were hospitalized.

A 16-year-old Halfway boy, Clarence Gully, died of injuries received when a bay elevator fell on him. Another boy was hurt.

8-Year-Old Halts Space Needle

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — An 8-year-old Connecticut girl stopped the revolving Space Needle restaurant Sunday.

World Fair officials said Mary Plunkett of Stamford, Conn., brought the restaurant to a halt when she caught her shoe between a partition and the turntable.

Firemen freed the child, who was taken to a hospital for precautionary X-rays.

The restaurant makes one revolution every hour, allowing diners a sweeping view of the city.
