

U. S. Envoy Leaves Peru

LIMA, Peru (AP)—U.S. Ambassador James Loeb took off for Washington Thursday to report on the military seizure of power, and the junta made it clear it was glad to see him leave Peru.

A statement labeled semi-official but emanating from the foreign ministry said Loeb's departure would tend to ease "existing tension between the two countries." It accused him of helping to create "a climate of misunderstanding in Washington," which cut off aid to Peru after the military's coup last week.

Asked about the charges, Loeb told newsmen at the airport, "I have heard about the statement and the foreign ministry will deny it." He said he hoped to return to Lima after he reports personally to President Kennedy.

Police Wednesday night broke up a demonstration of 500 students protesting the overthrow of President Manuel Prado and shouting "down with dictatorship." The rally was addressed by speakers identified as members of the leftist, but anti-Communist, American Popular Revolutionary Alliance.

In Caracas, the Venezuelan foreign ministry said eight nations out of a required 11 have now asked for a hemisphere meeting of foreign ministers to protest the coup in Peru. The ministry said Ecuador and Salvador have joined Venezuela, Colombia, Costa Rica, Honduras, Panama and the Dominican Republic in demands for the meeting. It added that Guatemala was seriously studying the proposal.

In Rio de Janeiro, however, a spokesman for the Brazilian foreign ministry said Brazil opposes the hemisphere meeting because it would smack of intervention in Peruvian affairs. The semi-official statement on Loeb said, in part: "It is believed that the U.S. diplomat has, without regard to his specific mission, made incursions in the field of internal politics, showing clear predilection for one of the presidential candidates."

Kitty Caught After Caper

The Eugene Fire Dept. successfully handled a cat call Wednesday morning.

The department got a call to 740 E. 14th Ave., where a two-week-old kitten had somehow fallen from an unfinished attic eight feet down between two walls. Firemen worked about 15 or 20 minutes before finally snaring the kitten with a noose on the end of a pole and pulling it to safety.

Frances Loge, a Los Angeles teacher attending the University of Oregon this summer, said the kitten's mother moved in a short time ago and promptly had four kittens. The trapped kitten as yet has no name, Miss Loge said.

The mother, however, is named Jeffrey, she added.

Lemnitzer Approved by NATO Council

PARIS (AP)—Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, a U.S. Army combat veteran, will take over as supreme Allied commander in Europe this fall.

President Kennedy's nomination of the retiring chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff won unanimous approval Wednesday at a special meeting of the permanent council of the 15-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Lemnitzer, 62, will succeed U.S. Air Force Gen. Lauris Norstad, 55, who resigned Fri-

day. The change is effective about Nov. 1.

Lemnitzer's succession to the NATO post became a certainty when Kennedy named him Friday to become commander in chief of U.S. forces in Europe, another assignment that Norstad is giving up. Though NATO could choose its commander from any of its members, the job has always gone to an American, largely because of the major contribution the United States makes to European de-

fense. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower became the first commander in 1950.

Although there was no opposition to Lemnitzer, his selection might have been delayed by France, President De Gaulle reportedly was annoyed at what he considered the haste with which Washington was trying to put through the appointment. But the French cabinet approved the nomination Wednesday, and the NATO council acted soon after.

Invitation to K. Agent of Eastern Sector Supported By Berliners

BERLIN (AP)—The West Berlin press and the man-in-the-street Thursday endorsed the suggestion by two American newspaper executives that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev "come and have a look" at the city's anti-refugee wall.

Berliners did not expect Khrushchev to accept the invitation, but they considered it a good idea that the man who ordered the wall constructed last Aug. 13 inspect his handiwork.

Walker Stone, editor in chief of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, and Paul Miller, president of the Gannett newspapers, sent Khrushchev an open letter Tuesday urging that he visit the Communist wall dividing Berlin.

They were among representatives of the American Society of Newspaper Editors who interviewed the Soviet premier July 13 at the Kremlin.

West Berlin newspapers splashed the story on front pages.

"Open letter to Khrushchev: Go to the wall," was another banner. A third newspaper headlined, "Khrushchev to the wall."

The newspapers reported Berliners interviewed by Miller and Stone said "nein" to Khrushchev's proposals to remove American, British and French troops from West Berlin.

Miller and Stone told Khrushchev "you have to see it (the wall) to believe it."

Miller and Stone stopped off here after their visit to Moscow, where Khrushchev told them and 10 other American newspaper executives that Berliners would be more secure, confident and happy if the Western Allies left Berlin.

German Confesses To Blasting Wall

BERLIN (AP)—West Berlin police announced Thursday that an agent of the East German secret police tried to blow up a refugee wall on the American sector border Wednesday night.

They said a 20-year-old man found injured near the scene confessed Thursday he set off a time bomb at the wall Wednesday night and another Saturday night.

He confessed, police said, Communist secret police caught him smuggling recording tapes to West Berlin and forced him to promise to work for them.

However, he denied he set off the time bombs on order of the

East German "state security service," police reported.

Communists Suspected

Police long have suspected the Communists might be behind dynamiting at the wall in order to blame the incidents on the West as part of their campaign charging that West Berlin is a threat to world peace.

The official Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland, in an editorial Thursday, warned President Kennedy that explosions set off by the West at the wall could have evil consequences.

The youth was found Wednesday night with two punctured ear drums, internal injuries and a cut arm near Niederkirchner Strasse, where two explosions blew two small holes in the wall.

Police identified him only as Ruediger K.

Frequent Trips

Police said the youth until three months ago had a West German identity card and made frequent trips to East Berlin after the wall went up Aug. 13.

He told police that on one trip to smuggle recording tapes back to West Berlin the Communists caught him. To escape jail he said he signed a paper pledging he would work for the East German secret police, Western headquarters announced.

Police said the youth was injured when the time bomb Wednesday night went off prematurely. As a result, the bomb made only two small holes in the wall.

The Saturday night blast, however, made a hole three feet high and eight feet long.

Food for Peace Director Named

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy Tuesday appointed Richard W. Reuter, now executive director of CARE, as director of the U.S. Food for Peace Program.

Reuter succeeds George McGovern, who has resigned to run for the Senate from South Dakota. McGovern, a Democrat, served in the House before Kennedy picked him to head the Food for Peace Program.

Reuter, 44, of New York, has been with CARE since 1946.

In addition to his post with the private relief organization, which ships food and supplies to needy overseas areas, Reuter is a vice chairman of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service.

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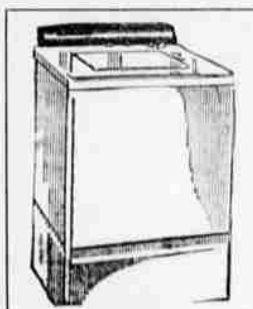
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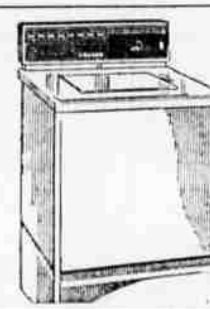
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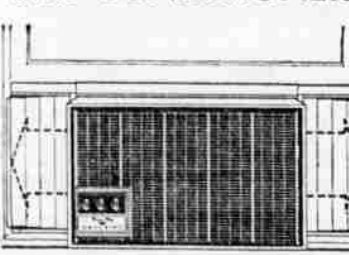
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
