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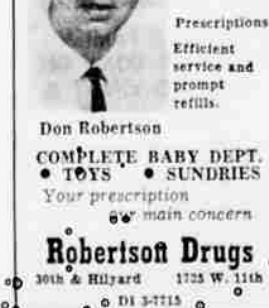

A "Knitting Knight" who began his sweat two years ago, completed it just in time to win the grand championship over 52 entries in the knitting division of Lane 4-H Fair this week.

Meanwhile, a 12-year-old boy got the jump on his female competitors by winning the only purple rosette awarded in the entire canning exhibit at the fair.

Lonnie Bradshaw, now a lanky 13-year-old from Dexter, is proud of his prize-winning sweater, but laughingly admits, "It's too small for me now. Look at the length of these sleeves."

But the handsome maroon handknit is a masterpiece—even if it did represent a marathon undertaking for football-minded Lonnie. Rows of cable knit are a decorative feature in the sleeves, and strips of gold and gray knitting accent the V-neckline and cuffs.

Lonnie is a member of the "Knitting Knights," 4-H knitting club led by his mother, Mrs. George Bradshaw, and Mrs. Max Witbeck of Pleasant Hill.

Charles Farver, 12, in his third year of 4-H Club work and his second in the 4-H foods preservation project, canned two jars of fruit for his exhibit—strawberry rhubarb and Bing cherries—to catch the judge's plaudits.

His brother, Eugene, 13, also won a blue ribbon on his Canning II exhibit. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Farver of Junction City.

As outdoor cooks, the male contestants surpassed the girls. Of the eight blue ribbons awarded, seven went to the boys.

But in bread baking and muffin baking divisions the girls held their own. Frances Page, 16, Eugene, usurped the position her brother, Jim, held a year ago as the champion in the Senior Dinner Club division with a loaf of whole wheat bread.

Joanne Halladay, Rt. 1, Junction City, followed in her sister Joyce's footsteps to become champion in the Intermediate division with a loaf of white bread. Kathleen Rae Jackson, 11-year-old Walton 4-H'er, topped all four divisions in the Easy Meals division as Grand Champion with four whole wheat muffins.
