

Talks Slated On Test Ban

WASHINGTON (AP)—Refreshed by a weekend of sailing, President Kennedy flew back to Washington Monday to open talks that may develop new U.S. proposals for a nuclear test ban treaty.

Besides the nuclear talks Kennedy also has scheduled a meeting with Lincoln Gordon, ambassador to Brazil, on the shape of Brazil's reshuffled government and its role in the Alliance for Progress.

Gordon has returned for White House and State Department consultations on Brazil, where uncertainty over the government's stability prompted both Washington and Brasilia to postpone a visit to the President and Mrs. Kennedy originally had planned to begin today.

Kennedy is expected to confer with Arthur H. Dean on the possibility of modifying U.S. demands to safeguard a nuclear test agreement. Dean is the chief U.S. negotiator at disarmament and nuclear talks in Geneva. Kennedy asked him to come back for discussions. He arrived late Saturday and is due to return to Geneva by the end of the week.

New data turned up by U.S. underground tests may persuade the United States to reduce its demands for on-site inspections and control posts designed to enforce any nuclear agreement with the Soviet Union.

While in Hyannis Port, Mass., for another weekend with Mrs. Kennedy and their children, the chief executive joined numerous other Kennedys in celebrating the First Lady's 33rd birthday on Saturday. Including youngsters with Kennedy sisters and brothers, there were at least two dozen on the scene.

Both Saturday and Sunday, Kennedy took the tiller of his 22-foot sailboat Victoria for jaunts into rough waters of Nantucket Sound and more placid Lewis Bay.

Another woman who, state police said, was a friend of the one on the bridge, went up a ladder to try to coax her down, but fainted and had to be helped down herself. State police and firemen were finally able to reach the would-be jumper and bring her down.

Police said the whole incident covered about two hours, with traffic over the bridge being blocked about an hour.

Engineers Killed In Train Crash

FOGGIA, Italy (AP)—Two engineers were killed Saturday in a head-on collision of a switching locomotive and a two-car passenger train just outside this south central city.

Authorities said 17 passengers were injured.

The wreck was the fifth fatal accident on Italian railroads in scarcely more than seven months. A total of 153 persons were killed in the five accidents. More than a dozen lesser mishaps also have occurred.

Six Persons Appear For Arraignment

Six persons accused of crimes by the grand jury appeared in Lane County Circuit Court Monday morning for arraignment.

The grand jury approved 10 indictments on Friday, five of them secret indictments that are revealed as the accused person is arrested.

The grand jury also returned one not true bill clearing James Clift of 505 N. Eighth St., Springfield, of a charge of obtaining money and property under false pretenses.

Walter Robert Wood, 40, of 2529 Riverview St., Eugene, was arraigned on two secret indictments. He is accused of assaulting a 12-year-old girl on March 18 with the intent to commit rape.

Wood is also accused of a sodomy charge involving the same girl on March 1. He will enter pleas on Wednesday.

Daniel Alvarez Marenden, 24, a transient with no known address, was also named in a secret indictment and will enter a plea Wednesday. He is accused of stealing an unknown amount of money from a woman on July 15.

Donald James Ross, 19, of 636 Willamette St., Eugene, pleaded innocent to an indictment accusing him of entering a motor vehicle with the intent to steal. He allegedly entered a car in a downtown Eugene parking lot on July 15.

Roland Lee Young Jr., 36, of Jasper, and George Wesley Oliver, 45, of 348 Willamette St., were arraigned on separate indictments accusing them of receiving and concealing stolen property.

Young allegedly possessed a sleeping bag and Oliver a suitcase, both stolen from Judith Hall, on July 13. Young will enter a plea Wednesday. Oliver pleaded innocent.

Henry Lee Jones Jr., 25, of 147 Washington St., Eugene, will enter a plea on Wednesday to a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. He allegedly shot a pistol on July 22 at Harry Morris in Eugene.

Jones entered a plea of innocent last week to a separate burglary charge.

Red Youth Festival Hit By Violence

Finnish Policemen Halt Demonstration

HELSINKI (AP)—Mounted police Sunday night broke up a crowd of demonstrators estimated at 5,000 who tossed rocks at vehicles carrying delegates to the Communist-backed World Youth Festival.

Bus windows were shattered and store windows broken by the anti-Communist demonstrators in downtown Helsinki. It was the second incident of violence in as many nights connected with the conference.

Soviet newspapers charged that the United States and West Germany were behind the demonstrations and said the loyalty of anti-festival rioters had been purchased by the "Central Intelligence Agency and the State Department."

Several persons were reported injured. Police made some arrests. Exact figures were not available.

Police stopped a crowd of several hundred youths from storming a park where festival slogans are displayed and which houses a Soviet cultural exhibit. The exhibit was attacked by demonstrators Saturday night.

Reliable sources said at least seven of the 500-member delegation from East Germany fled to Sweden Saturday night and asked for political asylum. There was no confirmation of the report.

About 10,000 delegates are attending the festival at Olympic Stadium.

MOSCOW (AP)—Moscow radio reported Monday 11 Americans at the "Sputnik" International Youth Camp in the Crimea have been disciplined for distributing anti-Soviet pamphlets among the local population.

Cardinal Dies After Operation

ROME (UP)—Gabriele Acazio Cardinal Cossua, 64, elevated to the Sacred College of Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church less than five months ago died Sunday after a brief illness.

The Syrian-born prelate underwent an appendectomy July 20 but pulmonary complications and peritonitis developed and his condition deteriorated steadily.

The death of Cardinal Cossua, who was secretary of the Sacred Congregation of the Eastern Church, reduced to 85 the membership of the College of Cardinals.

2 Drown, 3 Killed In Traffic Crashes

Three persons were killed on highways and two others were drowned in Oregon as thousands of persons sought relief from the heat by going to water resorts over the weekend.

A collision five miles east of Bend killed James F. Wooten, 67, Prineville, and injured six persons Sunday. The crash came after Wooten drove from a side road onto Highway 20.

Taken to St. Charles Hospital in Bend were his wife, who is 62, and Frank Cludd, 17, also Prineville. All the passengers in the other car also required hospital treatment. They were Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence O. Young of Alexis, Ill., and their three children, Frank L., 19, Pearl Mae, 17, and Bernice Marjorie, 10.

Another crash, this one on Highway 97 seven miles north of Chemult, killed Wesley D. Lindsley, Richmond, Calif., on Sunday.

Police also found the body of a woman killed in a one-car accident Friday on U.S. Highway 101 eight miles north of Newport.

She was Mrs. Iris T. Smith, 50. Police found her pinned beneath the vehicle Saturday evening. The car had rolled off the highway behind some brush.

The tide carried Tony Ciacciano, 4, to his death Sunday as he played on Bastendorf Beach near the south Jetty at Coos Bay. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Ciacciano, Roseburg, were unable to rescue him.

An Albany man, George W. Dolezal, 37, drowned while attempting to rescue his 10-year-old daughter from the little North Fork of the Santiam River Sunday.

State police said Dolezal dove in after his daughter, Teresa June, stepped into a deep hole while playing along the river edge.

He gave her a push toward shore, then sank. The daughter waded ashore.

The family was on a picnic east of Salem.

Fumes Given As Probable Crash Cause

An accident that state police said may have been caused by carbon monoxide fumes injured two persons early Sunday morning near Veneta.

Listed in fair condition Monday morning at Sacred Heart Hospital was Linda Lee Riensch, 16, of Rt. 2, Box 848, Elmira. A hospital spokesman said she suffered a fractured spine.

State police said the car was driven by Gary Lee Pocholee, 16, of Rt. 5, Box 432, Eugene. Pocholee was treated and released at the hospital.

Police said Pocholee told them he suddenly "went to sleep" at the wheel as the car was northbound on the Old Territorial Highway between Veneta and Elmira. The car went off the road and into a ditch.

The vehicle's muffler was missing and all the windows in the car shut, police said, adding that it was "probable and possible" that carbon monoxide from exhaust fumes caused Pocholee to pass out. He was unconscious for about ten minutes after the crash, police said.

In other accidents: • Ronald Burl Moore, 20, of Lowell, suffered head cuts early Sunday when his car failed to make a curve on Lost Creek Road, two miles north of Dexter, state police said. He was treated at McKenzie-Willamette Hospital in Springfield and released.

• Trudy Darlene Mayfield, 16, of 1045 E. Jackson St., Cottage Grove, was treated for facial lacerations and released at Cottage Grove Hospital early Monday. The car she was driving struck a power pole on South Tenth St. in Cottage Grove, according to police there.

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
