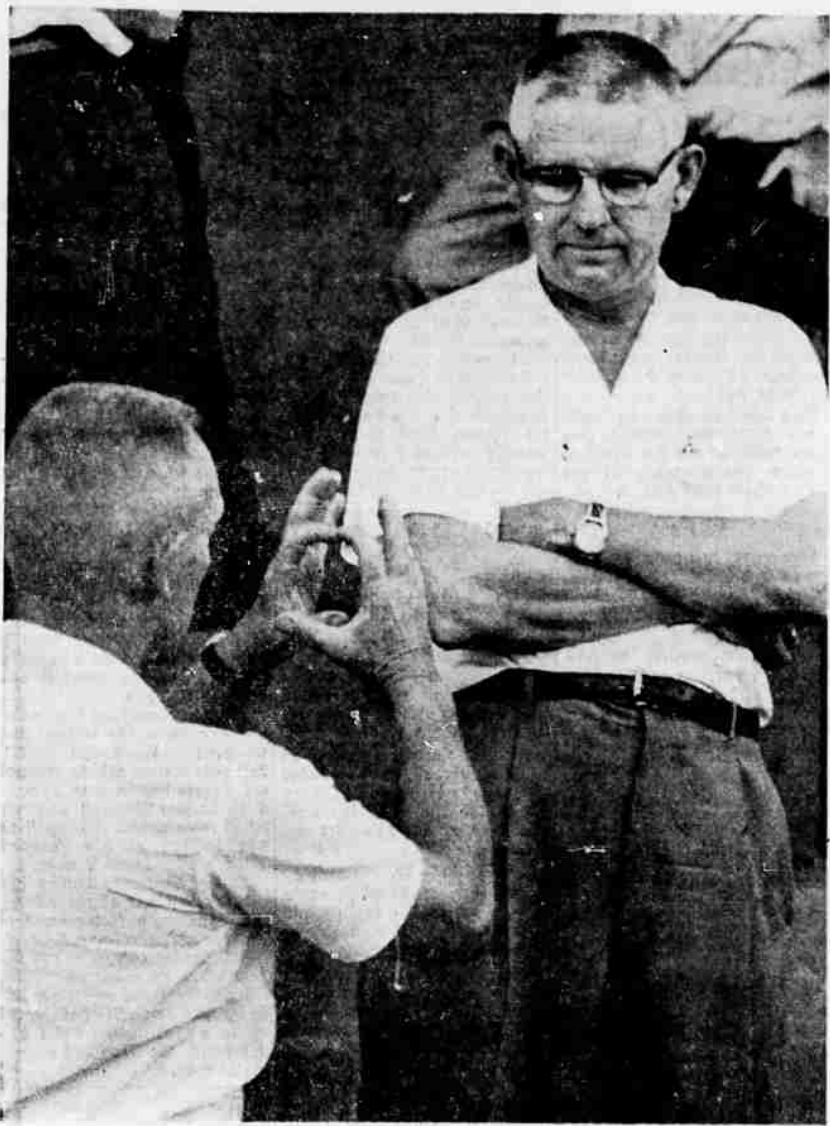

Taylor Rites Set Thursday In Eugene

Funeral services will be held in Eugene Thursday for Charles Edward Taylor, 280 E. 47th Ave., Eugene, who died Monday in Portland.

Taylor, a victim of multiple sclerosis for several years, died at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Portland, where he had been a patient for the past two months.

He was 32, and had been a resident of the Eugene area for the past eight years. Taylor was office manager and accountant for Vik Construction Co. He was an avid bowler, and served as secretary-treasurer of the New-U Bowl Construction League.

He also was former treasurer for the Eugene Chapter, National Office Management Assn., and a member of Emerald Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Myrtle; a son, Stephen Edward, at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward of Eugene, and a brother and sister.

Funeral services will be Thursday at 9:30 a.m. standard, 10:30 a.m. daylight, at Simon-Lounsbury Funeral Chapel, Eugene. The Rev. Charles Moore of Portland, former pastor of Emerald Baptist, will officiate. Interment will be in Rest Haven Memorial Park.

'Old Oregon' To Be Sent To 34,000

All Former Students To Get Magazine

This week, 'Old Oregon,' University of Oregon alumni magazine, will go out to 34,000 former students.

Until now, the circulation has been only 4,200.

The big jump was achieved, explained UO President Arthur S. Flemming, by the decision to mail 'Old Oregon' to all alumni—not just those who pay dues to the alumni association.

"We feel this will be a real help in re-establishing contact between the university and alumni," Flemming said during a news conference Tuesday.

The university is also receiving more contributions toward a fund to be used for faculty benefits, such as payment of expenses to professional meetings, Flemming said. So far this year, \$21,819 has been contributed for this purpose, compared to \$8,647 at the same time last year.

In another matter, Flemming said 243 students had enrolled for this year's 11-week summer session. This summer the university planned both 8-week and 11-week sessions. About 3,600 students enrolled in the regular 8-week term.

The success of the full summer term means it will be offered again next year, Flemming said. By taking the 11-week course, a student may complete as many courses as he would during a regular fall, winter or spring term.

200 Cowboys Expected for Event

World's Champions Among Emerald Rodeo Contestants

Perhaps as many as 200 cowboys—many of them either current or former world's champions—will be contesting for shares of prize money in the 1962 Emerald Empire Roundup beginning Friday evening.

This estimate was made Tuesday by Bob Cook, rodeo secretary for Christensen Bros. rodeo stock contractors of Eugene, who is in charge of accepting entries from contestants.

Noting that the 1961 Roundup attracted 147 cowboys, Cook predicted the 1962 go-round will draw even more, largely because the \$7,200 purse put up by the Emerald Empire Roundup Assn. is \$1,200 larger than last year.

With entry fees of the cowboys added to the purse, total prize money up for grabs should be between \$15,000 and \$16,000, Cook estimates. Total payoff at the 1961 rodeo was \$13,370.

Two of the world's top saddle bronc riders will be here, Cook said. They are Winston Bruce of Calgary, Alta., 1961 world's champion, and Enoch Walker of Bend, 1960 world's champion saddle bronc rider and runner-up to Bruce in 1961.

Two other reigning world's champions expected to enter the Roundup are calf rider Dean Oliver of Boise, Idaho, and Al Hooper of Escalon, Calif., the top team roper of 1961.

They'll be facing stiff competition, however, including Jim Rodriguez Jr., of Castrolville, Calif., 1960 world's champion team roper; Dale Smith, of Chandler, Ariz., seventh-ranked for all-around cowboy in 1961; and Gene Rambo of Shandon, Calif., who has won more individual championships than any man on the West Coast.

A longtime favorite of Roundup spectators, Harley May, of Oakdale, Calif., twice the winner of the Golden Triangle trophy for being top cowboy at the Emerald Empire Roundup, the Crooked River Roundup at

Prineville, and the Klamath Basin Roundup, also will be back.

And so will Bob A. Robinson of Tuttle, Idaho, 1960 world's champion bulldogger and winner of the all-around cowboy title at the Roundup for three consecutive years, 1959 through 1961 (though he shared it with Bob Cook in 1959).

Rodeo Cowboys Assn. headquarters in Denver has announced that Freckles Brown of Lawton, Okla., Johnny Hawkins of Twain Harte, Calif., and Harry Charters of Melba, Idaho, will be among the entries.

Brown, in the lead for the world champion in bull riding, is 41 years old—an age when most rodeo pros are hunting the sidelines. He has been among the sport's top winners for the last two years, earning

\$22,652 last year. He also competes in saddle and bareback bronc riding events.

Hawkins, 30, has been a title contender on bareback broncs for four of the last five years. His absence from the standings last year was due to a shattered thigh which kept him on the sidelines over 14 months. At the California rodeo in Salinas recently, he hit the winner's circle for the first time on the comeback trail.

Entries for the cowboys will close at 6 p.m. daylight Thursday.

Cook said Tuesday that permit-holders will be accepted, contrary to former releases. Permit-holders are non-professional cowboys who, by buying permits, may compete against pros until they earn \$1,000 and thus qualify as professionals.

Saturday Night Sellout Reported Highly Possible

A sellout of tickets for the Saturday evening performance of the 1962 Emerald Empire Roundup is quite likely.

This was the report Tuesday from Wendell Austin, advertising and publicity manager.

He said only 20 to 25 percent of the reserved tickets remain, and pre-sale of general admission tickets also has been high.

Plenty of good seats remain, but the best choice now is for the Friday evening performance and the Saturday and Sunday

matinees, Austin said. Reserved and general admission seats are on sale at Roundup headquarters, 1245 Willamette St., and general admission tickets also are available at 946 Willamette St.

Prices are \$5 for box seats, \$2.50 reserved, \$1.50 adult's general admission, and 75 cents children's general admission. Tickets may be reserved by calling DI 2-2403.

Austin noted also that parking at the Lane County Fairgrounds will be free.

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
