'Rifleman' to Arrive Roundup Eve

Chuck "The Rifleman" Connors will arrive Thursday in Eugene on the eve of the tenth annual Emerald Empire Roundup.

The television actor, featured attraction of the 1962 western celebration, is scheduled to be aboard a West Coast Airlines plane landing at 6:15 p.m. daylight at Mahlon Sweet Airport.

One City Post Petition In, 9 In Circulation

One petition has been turned in and nine others are being circulated for nominations to Eugene municipal offices, City Recorder Tom Beatty said Wednesday.

Eugene Councilman Ervin Molholm is the first candidate to turn in a completed petition, Beatty said. Molholm is seeking re-election to the Ward III council position he now holds. Councilmen serve a four-year term.

Beatty said petitions have been taken out on behalf of three incumbent members of the Eugene Water & Electric Board—Earl McNutt, of Ward II; John Tiffany, of Ward IV; and Calvin Smith, at-large member.

CPA a Candidate

Charles O. Porter, former Fourth District congressman, is circulating a nominating petition for the at-large position to run against Smith.

EWEB members serve five-year terms.

Alton H. Lenart, of 2625 Lincoln, has taken out a petition for the Ward IV city council position. He is a Eugene certified public accountant.

A petition has been taken out on behalf of John Foster, 1667 Fairmount Blvd., for the Ward I Council vacancy. He is a former member of the Eugene Planning Commission and is president of the Coca Cola Bottling Co. of Eugene.

Deadline Is Aug. 26

Clerks at the city hall said one man took out three nominating petitions Wednesday morning—for himself and two others. He didn't identify himself or the candidates but said he would make an announcement Thursday.

The deadline for filing nominating petitions will be Aug. 26. Open for election this fall are one city council position in each of the city's four wards, and three positions on the five-member Eugene Water & Electric Board.

Roundup officials announced Tuesday.

Connors and another actor from "The Rifleman" series, Joe Higgins, will be met at the airport by Roundup princesses and other officials, then escorted in a motorcade to the Eugene Hotel. It will be just in time to begin a gamut of Roundup appearances, including:

- The Kick-off dinner at 6:30 p.m. daylight in The Carriage Trade Restaurant. The dinner will be the occasion for coronation of one of the six Roundup princesses as queen. The dinner is open to the public, but seats are limited. Only 72 of 250 seats were still available Tuesday afternoon.
- The Roundup dance, starting at 9:30 p.m. daylight in the Agriculture Bldg. at the Lane County Fairgrounds. The dance, an annual Roundup affair, will have music, mostly popular but with some western numbers, by Roy Cook's Western All Stars. Admission will be \$1 per person.
- The Buckaroo Breakfast from 6 to 11 a.m. daylight Saturday and 6 a.m. to noon daylight Sunday at the Fairgrounds. The breakfast, as in past years, will offer all the sausage, eggs and pancakes you can eat for \$1.
- The Roundup parade, starting at 11 a.m. daylight Saturday. Connors will be grand marshal of the parade, which will follow a route from the Fairgrounds to Adams Street, east on 12th Avenue to Olive Street, north on Olive to Eighth Avenue, east on Eighth to Willamette Street, south on Willamette to 18th Avenue, west

on 18th to Friendly Street, and back to the Fairgrounds.

Sgt. Richard Plane of the Eugene police, parade chairman, reminded potential entries Wednesday that deadline for entries—if they want to qualify for trophies—must be submitted to the Roundup headquarters, 1245 Willamette St., or the police department in City Hall by 11 a.m. daylight Friday. There already were some 80 entries by Wednesday morning.

Connors will appear at all four of the rodeo performances: At 8 p.m. daylight Friday and Saturday, at 1:30 p.m. daylight Saturday and at 4 p.m. daylight Sunday.

The television celebrity also will aid in giving away a yearling Shetland pony at each of the rodeo performances. The ponies, from the Bar T ranch at Elmira, will be given away free under sponsorship of four Eugene business firms.

Tickets for the rodeo performances are available at Roundup headquarters, 1245 Willamette St., or may be reserved by calling DI 2-2403. Prices are \$1.50 for adults general admission, children's general admission 75 cents, reserved seats \$2.50, and box seats \$5. General admission tickets also are on sale at 946 Willamette St.

Springfield Officials Tour Fast-Paced Sewer Job

Members of Springfield's city council and utility board toured the city's 2 1/4-million sewer trunk line project Tuesday and learned that contractors could finish the job as much as three months ahead of schedule.

A spokesman for the contractors—M & S Construction Co.—said the firm can complete the three trunk lines in mid-September if work continues at a consistent rate. The contract calls for completion in late December.

on 30th to Commercial Avenue. The H trunk joins I and runs along Commercial, through Weaver Road. The M trunk goes from 32nd Street to the McKenzie Highway where it turns east and parallels the highway to the city limits just past the 71st Street intersection.

The H line is 25,000 feet long and M is 26,300 feet long. Work on I and H began in

April, but the work on the M line began in September of 1961 and proceeded through the winter.

Smith said 85 employees are being used in peak work periods and over \$600,000 worth of special equipment has made the job move more quickly.

The group completed its inspection by touring the recently completed additions to the disposal plant.
