

Khrushchev, East German Huddle Red Treaty Believed Near

WASHINGTON — Soviet Premier Khrushchev probably will sign a separate peace treaty with Communist East Germany later this year. But it is highly unlikely he will give the German Reds the power to plunge the world into war over Berlin.

American leaders are now generally agreed that a new Berlin crisis is in the making.

They are receiving a steady flow of Soviet-inspired rumors of trouble in European capitals. They get forewarnings, too, through such agencies as increased Soviet aircraft operations in the Berlin air corridors and the Red threat to shoot down an American helicopter at Berlin earlier this week.

Signs of Flare-Up

The signs of a new flareup of crisis are growing almost every day. Yet there is also evidence that Khrushchev has

not made all his final decisions as he continues his pressures to get the United States, Britain and France to abandon West Berlin.

Problems of Berlin strategy and diplomatic and legal issues related to the peace treaty itself are assumed here to be under discussion or planned for discussion between Khrushchev and East German Communist leader Walter Ulbricht somewhere on the Black Sea. Ulbricht flew from Berlin to the Soviet Union Wednesday.

The latest direct account of Khrushchev's views was reported to Washington by retiring U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson just before he left Moscow last week. He spent considerable time with the Soviet leader a week ago Wednesday.

May Go to U. N.

Khrushchev is understood to have told Thompson that he would have to make up his mind about the long-threatened peace

treaty without too much further delay. He also gave Thompson to understand that he wants to develop further his case for a change in the status of West Berlin. This could mean that he intends to open up the whole issue in the United Nations General Assembly in the fall, again claiming that the continued Western occupation of the city creates a threat of war which could be eliminated if the West would bow to his demands.

Several weeks ago Kennedy called in Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin to try to get across to Khrushchev through the envoy that the United States will not withdraw from West Berlin and will if necessary use force to defend the Communist-encircled city. No one here is really sure yet that Khrushchev believes this message.

Kennedy and Secretary of State Dean Rusk are known to doubt, however, that if any doubt remains in Khrushchev's

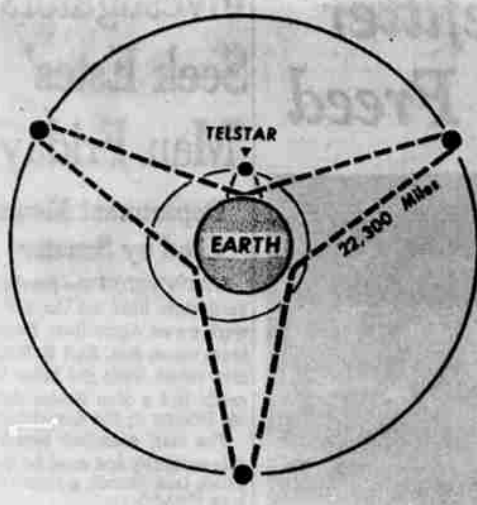
mind about Western intentions, it is a fairly small one.

The best informed officials here believe that in the end Khrushchev will choose to avoid war but that he will go through with the peace treaty threat.

Reserve Rights

Official Washington is all but convinced, however, that Khrushchev will see that the treaty contains some provision specifying reserve rights for the Soviet Union on the more critical Berlin problem. Otherwise Khrushchev would be in the position of giving Ulbricht a much freer hand in determining the future of the Berlin problem than it seems to be in the Soviet Union's interest.

The power to force the issue on Berlin is the power to start World War III. And no one in the government here believes that Khrushchev wants to spread that kind of power beyond the confines of the Kremlin.

3 Satellites May Provide Worldwide Television

CULVER CITY, Calif. (AP)—A spokesman says the Hughes Aircraft aerospace group is developing a communications satellite that will remain stationary over one point on earth. He announced Thursday that the satellite, which looks like a cylindrical bird-cage, someday may provide continuous worldwide television programming.

Hughes scientists are working on the project under a multimillion-dollar government contract. The 500-pound satellite, fixed at an altitude of 22,300 miles, would match the Earth's rate of rotation, thus appearing to hang motionless overhead.

Its extreme height could give a view of nearly a third of the earth. Smaller experimental versions of the satellite are scheduled for launching early next year, the spokesman said. No date was set for putting the finished model into space.

Three of the finished satellites could blanket the earth in a system that would require 40 to 50 low-altitude satellites for a similar job.

Deaf, Blind Mother Dies; 1955 Court Case Recalled

AKRON, Ohio (AP)—Georgia Hathaway, a deaf and blind woman whose battle to rear her own baby aroused nationwide attention in 1955, is dead of a heart attack.

The 43-year-old woman died Thursday night at Akron General Hospital, where she was taken July 22.

Mrs. Hathaway had known for some time that her rheumatic heart condition was serious, but she had told friends she hoped

she might live until her son, Clarence, grew up.

Clarence is only 7, but in many ways he already is grown up. For the last few years he has been the eyes and ears of his parents. He helped with household chores, answered the telephone and the doorbell at their home in nearby Stow and helped with the shopping.

His father, Harold, 60, also is deaf and blind.

The Hathaways were married in Kansas after a romance conducted by letters written in Braille. When Clarence, who has normal hearing and vision, was born Feb. 17, 1955, his mother insisted she could take care of him. Welfare authorities were not so sure, and the case went to Juvenile Court Judge Russell W. Thomas, who ruled that the couple could keep their child.

Mrs. Hathaway was aided in her task by visiting nurses. The couple's main source of income has been welfare aid.

JFK to Visit California, South Dakota

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House announced Friday that President Kennedy will participate in ceremonies opening a power project in South Dakota and an irrigation system in California on the weekend of Aug. 17-19.

Kennedy will be present for the ground-breaking on the San Luis project near Los Banos, Calif., on Aug. 18.

On the way to California, the President will stop at Pierre, S.D., and turn a switch starting circulation of power from the Oahe Dam on Aug. 17.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said the President is likely to stop at other places, either going or coming.

Kennedy now expects to leave Washington the morning of Aug. 17. It has not yet been decided where he will spend either that night or the next.

The White House said he probably would head back the night of Aug. 19, landing at Andrews Air Force Base near Washington next morning.

Kennedy will spend next weekend in Maine, participating in a charity event at the Brunswick Naval Air Station on Friday evening before going to the island home of former heavyweight champion Gene Tunney for the remainder of the week-end.

The White House confirmed that Kennedy will stay at the Tunney vacation home on John's Island in John's Bay.

Kennedy plans no public appearances except for the affair at the naval air station while in Maine.

2 Women Fined For Drunkenness

School Designing Studied At Educational Workshop

SALEM — A school building is a facility to make the tools of education available to the student.

It is the largest, most complicated and most expensive piece of teaching equipment the local school district has to purchase.

But if new methods of teaching are to improve educational quality, the school plant in which these methods are used will have a great effect on the success of those methods.

These things were pointed out Friday by an Illinois educator who described the experience of his school district at the Oregon Program Workshop.

300 Participants

The two-week workshop is being attended by some 300 educators from Oregon as the kickoff to a state-wide program to improve the quality of education in the state.

It is the first of its kind in the country and is supported by a \$3.5 million grant from the Ford foundation.

Finkbines Cancel Flight

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Sherri Finkbine and her husband have cancelled a reservation for a flight to Sweden and are thinking of going to Japan for her planned abortion, an airline said Friday.

Scandinavian Airlines, which had the couple booked on a Friday flight to Stockholm, said Robert Finkbine telephoned the message to its airport office.

Mrs. Finkbine fears her child might be born with a drug-caused deformation.

The airline said Finkbine phoned from nearby Beverly Hills. The airline said it received a previous call from Finkbine, undecided whether to make the flight to Sweden because the couple doesn't want to meet with reporters and photographers.

An airline spokesman quoted Finkbine: "We have not made up our minds. We're seeing about a Japanese visa."

Abortions are legal in both Sweden and Japan.

Cheap, Too

EXMOUTH, England (UPI)—Schoolchildren put an ad in the local newspaper offering for sale a "fine old Georgian residence."

The residence is their school building.

Clyde Parker, superintendent of the Niles Township District in Skokie, Ill., told the educators about the district's new high school, which breaks away from the traditional design.

The need for new educational designs does not mean new educational methods can not work without a new building. Delos Williams of the state Department of Education emphasized this earlier in the week.

Public Support

What has been stressed at the workshop is that as the need for new high schools arises, new concepts of design should be seriously considered.

Parker said the success of such an undertaking depends basically on the support of the public, and the public's representatives, the board of education.

They should be kept informed of every step in the planning, he said, so that no surprises are sprung on them.

Series of Reports

Among the innovations in the Niles Township High School are provisions to take advantage of advances in audio-visual education, and various sized rooms

with movable walls that can be adjusted for various classes.

These changes can take better advantage of new teaching methods as team teaching or non-graded schools.

A series of printed reports on changes in school design from the Ford Foundation's educational facilities laboratories also were available Friday to the workshop participants.

These described schools already built, under construction, or planned. They are complete departures from the traditional school with a series of classrooms opening off a hall.

Some of the schools incorporate a series of hexagonal units with a central unit for such things as a gymnasium and auditorium.

Triangles, Circles

Others use triangles, circles, windowless outside walls and other innovations.

Most of new designs have provisions for expansion simply by adding another unit.

Some of the designs have no fixed walls except for the outside, taking advantage of some design that requires no interior support walls.

All of this, top educators says, makes it easier to incorporate the flexibility that modern methods of teaching require.

Springfield Man In Fair Condition

Loren L. Miles, 24, of 343 S. Third St., Springfield, was listed in fair condition Friday morning at McKenzie-Williamette Hospital due to injuries suffered when he walked into a moving train Thursday.

Miles has a fractured left leg and lacerations of the face. Witnesses said Miles walked into a slowly moving eastbound box car being pushed by a switch engine at South Second Street in Springfield.

The train was going about 10 miles an hour and was blowing its warning horn and crossing bells were ringing at the time of the accident, according to witnesses.

Girl, 10, Injured In Auto Crash

Ten-year-old Cathy Nora Eggo received minor injuries after being hurt in a single-car accident Thursday morning at Echo Hollow Road and Barger Drive.

State police said her sister, Elina Diane, 17, was driving north on Echo Hollow when the car's brakes failed and smashed into a wooden barrier at the intersection.

Both girls live at 2561 Haig St., Eugene. The accident occurred about 11:45 a.m. daylight. Cathy was given outpatient treatment at Eugene Hospital and Clinic.

Tugman Off Critical List

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—Tom Tugman is off the critical list for the first time since he was injured in an airplane crash 37 days ago.

Tugman, an Associated Press employee at Denver, suffered head injuries June 27 when the light plane he was flying crashed at Douglas, Wyo.

He has not recovered consciousness since the crash. Although removed from the critical list, Tugman is in serious condition, his doctor said.

Tugman, who is 34, has a home at Littleton, Colo. He is married and has three children.

He is the son of the late William Tugman, former editor of the Eugene Register-Guard and publisher of the Port Umpqua Courier in Reedsport. The younger Tugman formerly worked on both papers.

Algiers Hails Leftist Chief

ALGIERS (AP)—Deputy Premier Ahmed Ben Bella, the former French army sergeant who has won a major battle in his bid to rule a leftist Algeria, received a roaring welcome on his arrival in this flag-bedecked capital Friday.

Crowds of wildly enthusiastic Algerians surged to greet him as he landed from a plane that brought him from his headquarters in the western city of Oran.

A compromise Thursday between the rival political factions Thursday gave Ben Bella, 45, a possibly dominant role in shaping the future of this infant country.

Under the truce, the Ben Bella-led, seven-man political bureau will set the stage for general elections Aug. 27. Power then will be turned over to the National Council of the Algerian Revolution, the old revolutionary parliament.

Two opponents of Ben Bella, Deputy Premier Belkacem Krim and Mohammed Boudiaf, said they agreed to this solution to keep Algeria from collapsing into total anarchy.

Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda, moderate ex-pharmacist who led the exile regime in the last months of struggle for nationhood, remains as nominal head of the provisional government. The real power, however, will be in the hands of the political bureau.

The truce agreement dodged a basic issue — the future of the army and its general staff. The general staff, headed by Col. Houari Boumedienne, was accused of plotting dictatorship and fired by Ben Khedda on the eve of independence. It flouted the dismissal and rallied behind Ben Bella.

Officials said the problem of the 40,000-man army, equipped by Communist countries, will be faced after the elections. Some observers suspect Boumedienne has been using Ben Bella while he prepares a bid of his own to take over Algeria.

Ben Bella has called for a drastic leftist revolution. He would break up the big French holdings but has told Europeans they would have a place in the new Moslem-ruled Algeria.
