

Romney Top Vote-Getter

Former automaker George Romney was Michigan's biggest vote-getter Tuesday as he ran unopposed for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

In other primary elections Tuesday, Sens. Frank Carlson and James B. Pearson won Republican nominations in Kansas and Sen. Edward V. Long, usually a backer of the Kennedy administration, won Democratic nomination in Missouri.

Romney, former president of American Motors, had tallied 380,540 votes with 4,516 of the state's 5,199 precincts counted while Democratic Gov. John B. Swainson, also unopposed, had 266,066 votes.

Jury Decides Against Radio Station

The question is, can a person hear Eugene radio station KASH in Oakridge?

No, said Catherine Copping, owner of Copping's Hub in Oakridge, in Lane County District Court Tuesday. "I never heard a program, not once," she said.

Yes, said station manager E. L. Kincaid, who brought suit against Mrs. Copping to recover \$216 for advertising she bought from KASH for her confectionary store and cafe in downtown Oakridge.

A four-woman, two-man jury listened to comments from both parties about radio reception in Oakridge.

Defendant Wins

The jury decided that a person should not have to pay for radio advertising where it can't be heard. So Mrs. Copping won.

No one disputed the facts that on April 29, 1959, Mrs. Copping signed a contract to purchase 52 thirty-second radio spots on KASH at \$27 a month for eight months. And KASH broadcasted the messages urging people to stop at Copping's Hub in Oakridge.

"But I took time off from work one day and tuned in to the program to hear what they said," Mrs. Copping testified. "But I never heard a thing."

She said she asked a number of customers if they had heard her commercials, but "they never did."

So she wrote to KASH and asked them to cancel the contract. "I wrote that the contract was not cancellable," Kincaid testified.

Views Differ

Joseph D. Kocer, owner of an Oakridge furniture and appliance store, testified for Mrs. Copping. "If there is one station you can't get in Oakridge, it's KASH," he said.

"But it is even worse in other places," Kocer commented. "In Westfir you can't even get a buzz."

Not so, testified Gordon V. Gillock, 1053 Maple St., Eugene. In 1959 he was a truck driver, he said, and tuned to KASH as soon as he came over the Willamette Pass from California.

And Herbert A. Schacker, 1495 Golden Ave., Eugene, who sold the ad contract to Mrs. Copping said, "I might have told her that KASH comes in good in Oakridge; I personally have heard it."

Schacker said he sold hundreds of these contracts in outlying areas during 1959, "and we only got two or three squawks, you might say, from Oakridge."

Bakers Face Court Action

PORTLAND (AP)—Bread from seven bakeries was seized Monday and Tuesday in preparation for court action against expanded loaves — the so-called balloon bread.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Charles Evans said, "The air is clear now. We're to start prosecuting."

It had not been determined whether to file complaints or ask for grand jury indictment. The State Department of Agriculture has banned the balloon loaves, saying they give the impression of being pound and a half while they actually weigh only a pound. Bakers say the people aren't fooled and they like the bread.

Truck Drivers To Vote on Offer

PORTLAND (AP)—Some 300 beer truck drivers in Oregon will vote next Tuesday on a proposed new contract.

The proposal was reached Tuesday evening after an all day session between negotiators for the Teamsters Union and Oregon beer distributors. The union members had given strike authorization earlier.

Teamster spokesman Joe Edgar called the proposal a compromise. Its terms were not revealed. Part of the dispute had centered on wages.

Bobcat Shot In Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—A Portland high school student is having a rug made from the hide of a bobcat he shot this week at the Albers Milling Co., plant on NW Front Avenue.

Earl Hart, a night watchman at the plant, told grandson Dennis Stanton about the cat he saw while making his rounds.

Other employees at the company refused to believe Hart's story. But Dennis, a junior at Benson High School, was not so skeptical.

Monday night, equipped with a shotgun, he spotted the animal while making the night rounds with his grandfather. He dropped the bobcat with a single shot.

Senate Gets Bill to Aid NW Lumber

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Commerce Committee Tuesday reported for floor action a bill aimed at aiding the U.S. lumber industry by earmarking 50 per cent of lumber tariffs for research and market development.

The bill is one of a series of proposals to bolster the ailing Northwest lumber industry against competition from Canada.

The committee approved the measure, sponsored by Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., in a closed session.

Magnuson said that duties on imported lumber bring in more than \$14 million a year, even though they are pegged at a low level.

Another Magnuson bill, which would repeal a law requiring Western lumbermen to ship their product to the East Coast in high-cost U.S. flag vessels, also has been approved by the Commerce Committee.

Magnuson said lumber prices have dropped 20 to 25 per cent from the 1958-59 levels.

He said that in the past five years, Canada's share of the U.S. market has more than doubled, forcing more than 200 Northwest lumber mills to close down and throwing 65,000 persons out of work.

Two Sentenced For Forgery

Two men who pleaded guilty to forgery charges in Lane County Circuit Court last Friday received four-year terms in the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Norman Grant Garrett, 21, of 1050 Ferry St., Eugene, was sentenced for passing a forged \$32.50 check May 16 at the W. T. Grant Co. in Eugene.

Ronald Galen MacPheter, 27, of 337 W. Fairview Dr., Springfield, was sentenced for passing a \$23 check on April 23 at the Tire Center, 2650 Main St., Springfield.

Nazi Camp Torn Down By Vigilantes

American Fascist Target of Britons

LONDON (AP)—Angry villagers led by the local publican stormed a Nazi camp in the English countryside Tuesday night in search of George Lincoln Rockwell.

They leveled the camp and routed the jack-booted Fascists but found no trace of the self-styled American Fuehrer.

The vigilantes from the Gloucestershire village of Guiting Power launched their attack in a woodland area known as Dead and Bury Hollow a few hours after the British government ordered the leader of the American Nazi party deported.

Scotland Yard was ordered to find Rockwell, but the Home Office said Wednesday he still had not been located.

Rockwell slipped into the country over the weekend to attend a Fascist rally at the camp organized by Colin Jordan's British National Socialist Movement in the rolling Cotswold Hills. Then Rockwell disappeared.

The villagers, however, wanted to see for themselves that Rockwell had not returned to the camp. Walter Morley, burly landlord of the village pub, led the assault. At his side was Clement Timmons, 57, champion badger catcher of the Cotswolds. Behind them came 100 more villagers.

The invaders punched their way past cudgel-swinging guards and began tearing down tents. Fights broke out.

A shotgun blast shredded a big swastika flag fluttering above the camp. A villager ripped the flag down and carried it off as a battle souvenir.

The outnumbered Nazis, about 50 in all, fled into nearby woods and fields.

The arrival of 70 policemen broke off the fight.

Fiery Crash

As youngsters watch from the Harlow Road overhead, Eugene firemen put out the last of the fire in a truck which flipped over and burst into flames on the Pacific Freeway Tuesday afternoon. The driver, Michael Richard Curtis, 17, of Eugene, was hospitalized with second degree burns.

Eight Hurt in Traffic Mishaps

Tourist Saves Truck Driver

A young truck driver, whose clothes caught fire after his small truck flipped over on the Pacific Freeway at the north end of Eugene, was saved Tuesday afternoon by a tourist who smothered the flames with a sleeping bag.

The truck driver, Michael Richard Curtis, 17, of 614 Fair Oaks Dr., Eugene, was one of eight persons hurt in a series of traffic mishaps Tuesday and early Wednesday.

Curtis was in good condition Wednesday at Sacred Heart Hospital with second degree burns on his back, neck and arms.

State police said Curtis apparently was driving south on the freeway when his truck ran off the road, struck a heavy metal post, and then flipped or rolled at least once.

The truck came to rest on its top directly beneath the Harlow Road overhead and burst into flames. A tourist identified as Donald M. Stevenson, of South St. Maria, Mich., helped Curtis out of the burning wreckage and then smothered the flames on Curtis' clothing with a sleeping bag.

In a second mishap, early Wednesday, a power pole guy wire apparently stopped an auto from plunging over a 20 to 25-

foot high embankment at the edge of Camp Creek Road, about three miles east of Hayden Bridge — saving the two occupants from further injury.

State police said it was about 12:15 a.m. daylight when an auto driven by Edward Anton Gebisch, 17, of 199 River Loop 2, Eugene, skidded on a curve and, barely missing the power pole, struck the guy wire.

Gebisch suffered a possible fractured hip, while his passenger, Linda Rene Brittain, 15, of Rt. 2 Box 380, Springfield (Waltersville), suffered a mouth injury. Both were in good condition at Eugene Hospital and Clinic.

Three persons were injured early Tuesday afternoon in a two-car collision on W. 11th Avenue at Crow Road.

Taken to Sacred Heart Hospital by Eugene Ambulance were Charles Aldon Salts, 28, of Rt. 5 Box 018, Eugene, driver of one car, who received outpatient treatment for minor injuries; Shirley Irene Eubank, 20, of Rt. 5 Box 246, Eugene, driver of the other car, admitted in good condition for observation; and Mrs. Eubank's son, Richard, 8 months, who suffered a cut forehead. The boy was dismissed from the hospital Wednesday.

State police said the mishap occurred as Salts, driving west on W. 11th, attempted to turn left into Crow Road and struck Mrs. Eubank's eastbound car. Salts told police his vision was obscured by rain and another vehicle.

A fourth mishap occurred at about 1:05 p.m. daylight Tuesday at Hawkins Lane and Mulkey Cemetery Road when cars driven by Don Juan Spence, 31, of 2495 Hawkins Lane, and Thomas Earle Nestell, 19, of 830 W. 21st Ave., Eugene, collided.

Nestell, who suffered a possible shoulder injury, and his nephew, Kenneth Erne, 5, a passenger in the car, received a check-up at Eugene Hospital and Clinic.

Jackson Bill Attacked

Senate Approaches Power Showdown

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate headed Tuesday in a showdown Wednesday in a five-day struggle over a bill to guarantee the Pacific Northwest first call on federal power produced at Columbia River dams.

The bill, introduced by Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., would allow only surplus federal power to be sold outside the Pacific Northwest.

It was designed to help meet objections raised in the region to a proposed extra-high-voltage transmission line to connect the Bonneville Power Administration system with federal power systems in California.

Supporters Silent

Under existing federal power policies, public agencies outside the Pacific Northwest would have first call on firm power now being delivered to private industry in Washington and Oregon.

Supporters of the legislation were almost silent Tuesday, abandoning the floor to three Republicans who charged the bill would "lock up" both present and future power resources in the Pacific Northwest.

Sens. Karl Mundt, R-S.D.; Jack Miller, R-Iowa, and Norris Cotton, R-N.H., criticized the bill as setting a precedent which eventually would kill the present policy of giving preference to public power agencies.

Mundt was among three sena-

tors who offered amendments to the bill to give individual states first call on federal power produced in the states.

Asks Rejection

He made it clear that his amendment to give South and North Dakota first preference to power produced at federal dams on the Missouri River was intended to cripple the Jackson bill, which he asked the Senate to reject.

Opponents of the legislation argued that regional preference would lead to "Balkanization" of the country, leaving some areas without sources of cheap federal power.

Its supporters say failure to pass the bill would lead to the draining off of firm power now going to private industry in the Pacific Northwest. They say this would result in the shutting down of aluminum processing plants and other industry dependent on cheap power.

The bill would limit sales outside the region to surplus power. Firm power would be reserved for Pacific Northwest customers, both private and public. Deliveries of surplus power could be cut off on 7 days notice.

Army Chief Challenged In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Reports from northern Argentina said Wednesday Gen. Federico Tornoz Montero had declared himself commander in chief of Argentina's army.

He was said to have demanded the resignation of the war secretary, Gen. Juan Bautista Lbza, who has been doubling as army commander in chief.

The rebellious general is the brother of Gen. Carlos Toranzo Montero, who rebelled against the former regime of President Arturo Frondizi in June 1959.

The affair at this stage appeared to be distinctly a dispute within army ranks and not a move against President Jose Maria Guido's government.

It could provoke a new administrative crisis. Reports of army unrest have been circling in Buenos Aires for several days.

Tacoma Man Given Four Years in Prison

A 29-year-old Tacoma, Wash. man, Jess Hutchinson, received a four-year term in the Oregon State Penitentiary when he appeared in Lane County Circuit Court Monday for sentencing on a burglary charge.

Hutchinson had pleaded guilty to breaking into the One O'Clock Market, 698 W. Sixth Ave., Eugene, on April 6, taking about \$400.

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
