

Planning, Research Chief Named at UO

John E. Lallas has been appointed to the new position of director of planning and institutional research at the University of Oregon, President Arthur S. Flemming announced Monday.

Lallas, 38, has been on the university staff since 1957. He is an associate professor of education.

As director of planning, Flemming explained, Lallas will be responsible for conducting research programs to improve the effectiveness of both administration and instruction at the university.

During a news conference Monday Flemming also reviewed summer school enrollment, discussed a new early registration program for freshmen, and gave a report on new buildings. Lallas will work in the office

of Robert D. Clark, dean of faculties.

Lallas is a graduate of the University of Washington and Western Washington College. He received the doctor of education degree from Stanford University. He is a member of the American Psychological Assn., the California Assn. of School Psychologists and the Assn. of California State College Instructors.

Lallas will begin his new duties Sept. 1. His appointment is subject to confirmation by the State Board of Higher Education.

Figures are still being compiled on summer school enrollment, Flemming said, but the total will be about 3,600. This compares to 3,220 enrolled last summer.

Discussing the university's new program of pre-registration, Flemming said 270 high school students are taking part this week. The program is on a pilot basis this year, he said.

If it is successful, a larger program, to take in the majority of new students, will be planned for next summer.

The 270 selected for this summer's program make up a small percentage of the total fresh-

man class of 3,000 expected this fall.

The summer program, Flemming said, will make it possible to give students more individual attention than in the rush of fall term registration.

Discussing buildings, Flemming said new dormitories should be ready for the fall term. The new units this year are the second half of Hamilton Hall, with five units, housing 420 students, and the first half of Bean Hall, housing 360 students.

Kitchens will not be ready, Flemming said, but living quarters will be completed by mid-September.

Eugene Couple On Quiz Show

A Eugene couple, Mr. and Mrs. Galen Shorack of 2374 Harris St., will be contestants for the third week tonight on "Play Your Hunch," a nationally televised quiz show.

The U.S. Forest Service provided tools and supervision. Fred Behm of Blue River provided horses to get equipment and water into the area. The ten volunteers did the work.

Flemming Fields Moon Flight Query

Should vast amounts of money be spent on space research, in an attempt to reach the moon, when there are so many needs on earth?

This question was tossed to President Arthur S. Flemming of the University of Oregon during a news conference Monday.

"I think it's difficult to be dogmatic one way or another," Flemming said.

Looking at the requirements of welfare and educational programs, Flemming said, many persons have questioned the wisdom of spending huge sums for space research.

"But it is not fair to say money spent to reach the moon is wasted money," he said. "If these attempts are successful, we do not know what it might mean."

Space exploration, he said, may open opportunities "undreamed of today."

But, he added, effort to reach the moon "should not be used as an excuse to fail to do what desperately needs to be done in the fields of education and welfare."
