Scandinavian Festival Ends After Attendance of 40,000

JUNCTION CITY — "We've got a town full of happy but tired people this morning," Dr. G. F. Fletchall, director of the Scandinavian Festival, said Monday after the conclusion of the four-day event.

Approximately 40,000 persons attended the second annual Thursday-through-Sunday festival. This is an increase of 15,000 over last year's total.

"We served more than 10,000 persons at the four meals dur-

ing the festival," Doctor Fletchall said, "and no one was turned away."

Throughout the day Sunday, participants sang and danced in downtown Junction City, as spectators watched the ring riding contest, barrel breaking and water fight in the park.

Two Junction City girls won first place in the ring riding contests. Lois Briggs won Saturday and Karla Madsen on Sunday. Miss Briggs also won last year.

Most of the children near the hanging wooden barrel took a swing at the container full of goodies before "the breaking of the barrel" was finally accomplished.

The scheduled Sunday tug-of-war between the Vikings and their wives didn't materialize because the warriors were engaged in other festival activities, but a water fight between four teams drew an enthusiastic audience.

The Junction City volunteer firemen defeated the Monroe firemen and Hult Plywood Co. downed Valley Plywood. Losers were thrown into a mud-and-water filled pit, but several winners also were dunked during the process.

An extra tour of the agricultural area had to be added Sunday to handle the crowds. Additional private cars were solicited during all four days of the festival to provide transportation for the trips.

The rain, which many feared would keep spectators away, never came to Junction City. "It rained all around us," Doctor Fletchall concluded, "and the weather here was absolutely perfect. Altogether the festival was a grand success."

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\$15,000 in Improvements Fairgrounds Ready to Go

People and exhibits really make the Lane County Fair, no question about that.

But it helps to have a nice place fixed up for those people and the exhibits when they come.

In the way of making an even nicer place out of the Lane County Fairgrounds for this year's fair (Aug. 22 through 26) the fair board has added a number of improvements.

The work on the grounds began in earnest the first of July and will continue until fair time.

Fair Manager Ernest McCulloch estimates that the various improvements to the grounds and buildings since last year will represent an investment of between \$15,000 and \$18,000.

What have they done? A number of things:

• Placed a plywood board-and-batten facade on the south side of the covered grandstand, stained walnut to match the rest of the buildings. The grandstand work also included remodeling the entrances to the back of the stand.

• Also placed stained board-and-batten facade on the south and east walls of the arena building, completing the face-lifting job begun last year. The same thing was done for the rabbit barn.

• Laid 600 feet of six-inch drain tile underground from the front of the Cow Palace around to the big Amazon channel. The tile, plus its six catch basins, will significantly improve surface water conditions around the palace.

• Installed 140 feet of wall on what was previously an open end of the sheep barn. This will go far toward protecting the woolly creatures from the afternoon sun.

• Built and installed 20 new show cases for the hobby and food departments, and a like number of dairy goat pens.

• Installed a modern milking parlor in the dairy barn. The parlor, large enough for two cows, will contain all the

latest automatic milking equipment. Spectators on the other side of the window will be able to see how they get milk from the cow in the Space Age.

• Painted the concrete and blacktop floor of the spacious commercial exhibits building.

• Rearranged the space to be taken up by the carnival equipment will run from the central blacktop area westerly parallel with the grandstand instead of running northerly toward the Cow Palace. This will allow more room for other things in the central area.

• Removed on old fence in the parking area along 13th Avenue and replaced it with a galvanized cable strung through steel posts placed in concrete.

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New Entrance Eases Parking at Fair

Go ahead. Take your car. Parking will be easier than ever at the Lane County Fair this year.

The fair opens at the fairgrounds on W. 13th Avenue on Aug. 22 and will run through Aug. 26.

Fair Manager Ernest McCulloch noted Friday that the big parking lot on the northwest side of the fairgrounds will be accessible from a new entrance this year.

The new entrance is at 13th Avenue and Van Buren Street. Previously the only entrance was from Adams Street.

The full list of entrances to the fairgrounds and the parking areas now reads: One on Adams Street, one at 13th and Van Buren, two on 15th Avenue (on the east and west sides of the fairgrounds) one on Madison Street, and one on Friendly Street.

Algerian Refugee Funds Being Sought

Members of the Eugene-Springfield Friends Meeting (Quakers) are conducting fund-raising drive to aid in the settlement and relief of refugees from Algeria.

The drive, conducted through a non-profit organization, the American Friends Service Committee, is to provide money for supplies in the countries concerned.

On a state-wide basis, the regional headquarters of the AFSC in Portland is seeking donations of beams from lumber companies for roof timbers. They are also asking for paper supplies, to be used in schools established for Algerian refugees by the AFSC.

At present, the AFSC has a staff of nine Americans and two Britons aiding the refugees. They have established schools in refugee camps, and are teaching a variety of subjects including academic work, carpentry, sewing, sanitation, nutrition and other skills and public health measures.

AFSC officials estimate that there are 250,000 refugees in border countries, including Tunisia and Morocco. Most of these refugees, AFSC officials say, are women and children.

In addition, there are an estimated 2 million Algerians—90 per cent without homes—in "re-

groupment" camps in rural Algeria.

The AFSC is one of the agencies officially invited by the Algerian government to work with the refugees.

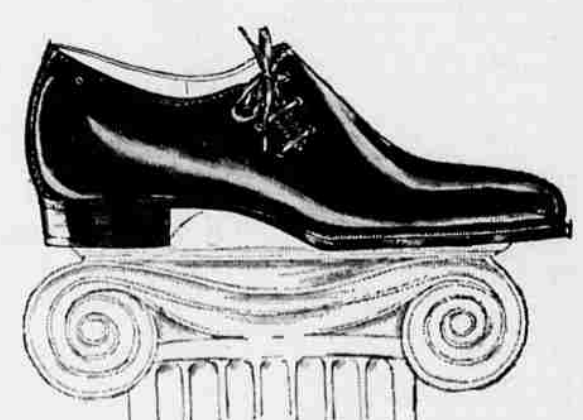
