SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Neither popoff optimism from Giants

quarters nor sinking pessimism from the Dodgers is in evidence today despite San Francisco's three-game weekend sweep over Los Angeles that rebuilt a neck-and-neck National League pennant race.

Juan Marichal, hurling an excellent four-hitter, stopped the Dodgers 5-1 Sunday to complete the sweep that began with 11-2 and 5-4 victories Friday and Saturday.

The second-place Giants thus pulled within 2 1/2 games of the leaders and cancelled the Los

Angeles 3-game sweep of two weeks ago that apparently had knocked the Giants from the race.

"I don't want to pop about this," smiled Giants manager Alvin Dark. "Talk to the players, they all played great the whole series."

From the players came only pats on the back for each other and confident smiles, but no cocky blasts as they realized the season has seven weeks left.

Dodger Manager Walt Alton, asked if he thought a 2 1/2 game lead was sufficient, reminded listeners he had never said a 5 1/2-game margin, which the Dodgers had before Friday's game, was enough.

"Sometimes even 13 1/2 hasn't been enough," he said, referring to 1951 when the Giants overcame a Dodger lead which was that big at precisely this time of the season.

"But just because the Giants won three," he added, "I don't think they ought to get overconfident."

The only hits off Marichal at Candlestick Park Sunday were Ron Fairly's homer and singles by Tommy Davis, Frank Howard and Jim Gilliam. A season-high crowd of 41,812 saw Marichal strike out eight and walk one, that one intentionally.

With the score tied at 1-1 in the fourth, Alou singled and raced home on Jose Pagan's triple. Felipe Alou's third single in the eighth started a two-run rally. Felipe produced the first run in the second when he singled, took second on a passed ball and took one base each on two fly balls. The sweep thus squarely up to the Giants to win in Los Angeles. They have never won a game at Dodger Stadium, losing five there this year, plus five in a row last season at the Coliseum. In fact, they have not won a game in Los Angeles since Aug. 2, 1961. They meet for the last four times in Los Angeles, Sept. 3-7.

HIGHCLIMBER

★ Could you also see the quick gambling hand of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. (NCAA) dealing in an attempt to trump the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) in the fight for establishment of track, basketball and gymnastic federations that would soften the iron-fisted control of amateur sports in these United States?

To us the NCAA's motive in adding small-college competition in golf, tennis, track and wrestling... Until now the NCAA has conducted only basketball and cross country in the so-called college division while at the university level championships in 13 sports are conducted appeared quite obvious....

Action in adding the four sports, making six in all in the college division, came at a Portland meeting of the executive group within a month of an announcement by the National Assn. of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) that the group governing all small colleges would string along with the AAU instead of the NCAA-spawned federations.... It is a move that may have come much too late....

Also at the meeting, the NCAA selected Albuquerque, N.M., as the site for the 42nd track-and-field championships next June.... The action came as somewhat of a surprise, but few people realize that Albuquerque has a population of more than 200,000 people and the climate is reasonably good in June at an altitude of some 5,000 feet.... The host school, University of New Mexico, has an enrollment of around 10,000—and a better-than-average track program.

Also of interest is that the meet will be spread out over three days instead of the usual two and that a six-mile run has been added to the program....

Even with the larger population and evident interest in track, it seems unlikely that the 1963 meet will approach the financial success of this year's event that grossed more than any previous meet in NCAA history.

★ Track followers and experts lost two good friends recently with the deaths of 82-year-old Dean Cromwell and 65-year-old Dink Templeton who were rivals in the early days of the Pacific Coast Conference as coaches of USC and Stanford, respectively....

Cromwell was probably the better known because of his powerful Trojan track teams and his development of Olympic champions.... We had in our possession, until a few years ago, a number of Cromwell's flip coaching books on a number of track events.... The books included a series of pictures that would show basic techniques.... Everyone must have attended, at one time or another, the penny arcades that included "movies" of the keystone comedies with a crank flipping the pictures with rapidity.... That was the idea of Cromwell's books.... We gave ours to Bill Bowerman, who now has a nearly complete collection—which are also collectors' items....

Templeton was not only a great coach of individual athletes, but would teach any youngster who came down the pike.... That's how the late Col. Bill Hayward heard of Les Steers, who later became a world record-holder in the high jump under Hayward.... Templeton was also a sports columnist for the Palo Alto daily newspaper....

Both were beloved men—men who have left a great heritage to collegiate track and field.

★ Because Oregon is the defending NCAA champion and Bowerman is expected to have another outstanding squad in the 1963 with seniors the likes of Harry Jerome, Keith Forman, Vic Reeve, Dave Steen and John Burns, there will be considerable interest in the Albuquerque meet.... Quite a few Emerald Empire and Corvallis-area fans will likely make the jaunt.

Here is the tentative schedule of events:
June 13—Pole vault qualifying; high jump qualifying; broad jump trials; 100, 220 and 440-yard dash trials; 120 and 440-yard hurdle trials; half-mile trials; and the six-mile run.

June 14—Hammer throw trials and finals; broad jump finals; hop-step-jump trials; javelin, shot, discus and mile trials; semi-finals in the 100, 220, 440 and 880-yard runs; semi-finals in both hurdles; and the three-mile run trials.

June 15—finals in the 100, 220, 440, 880, Mile, both hurdles, pole vault, high jump, javelin, shot, discus, hop-step-jump, and steeplechase.
