

Cloture Vote Set Tuesday

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate leaders predicted Monday a close vote Tuesday on the issue of limiting debate on the Kennedy administration's beleaguered communications satellite bill.

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois told reporters he believes the necessary two-thirds of those voting will be mustered to invoke cloture and end a liberal Democratic filibuster against the private-ownership bill.

Negroes Try To Worship With Whites

ALBANY, Ga. (AP)—Single or in small groups, Negroes tried to worship at segregated white churches in this racially troubled city but only one got past the doors on an otherwise relaxed Sabbath.

A Negro woman, Doris Derby, 22, was admitted to St. Paul's Episcopal church. Two other Negroes attended Mass at St. Teresa's Catholic Church, but members of their race have worshipped there before.

Two churches turned Negroes away. A white New York minister, the Rev. Ralph Lord Roy, led two Negroes to Trinity Methodist church. He said they were asked to come back some other time.

Two Negroes who tried to attend Central Baptist church said a white man told them they would have to leave or he would summon a policeman.

The president of the Albany Movement, W. G. Anderson, said it was "sacriligious that worshippers are turned away from a house of God."

He disclosed plans for a major drive in Albany to register Negro voters and said his organization would "continue to test public facilities."

The efforts to use segregated facilities, he said, were being made on the basis of a statement by the city attorney, H. Grady Rawls, who said Friday in Recorder's Court that the city did not enforce its segregation ordinances.

Albany's city parks and library remained closed after they were locked Saturday when Negroes tried to use them.

'Gang Fight' Broken Up

OREGON CITY (AP)—More than 100 persons rioted here early Sunday in what the Clackamas County sheriff's office called a "gang fight."

Three adults and one juvenile were placed under arrest.

Police said the riot erupted about 2:45 a.m. in a grocery store lot, known as a congregating spot. Nine officers from county, city and state forces broke up the fight soon after it spread from the lot into the street.

Booked on disorderly conduct charges were Robert E. Rapp, 23, an Oregon City cook; George Allen Groener, 27, an Oregon City laborer; David P. Barringer, 20, a laborer from Montana; and one juvenile.

Officers said two of the four had been reprimanded by police earlier in the evening following a fight at Willamette.

Spragues Mark 50th Anniversary

SALEM (AP)—Former Gov. and Mrs. Charles A. Sprague celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary Sunday with a reception.

The Spragues were married at Walla Walla, Wash., on Aug. 8, 1912.

City Vocational Entrance Test Agenda Revealed

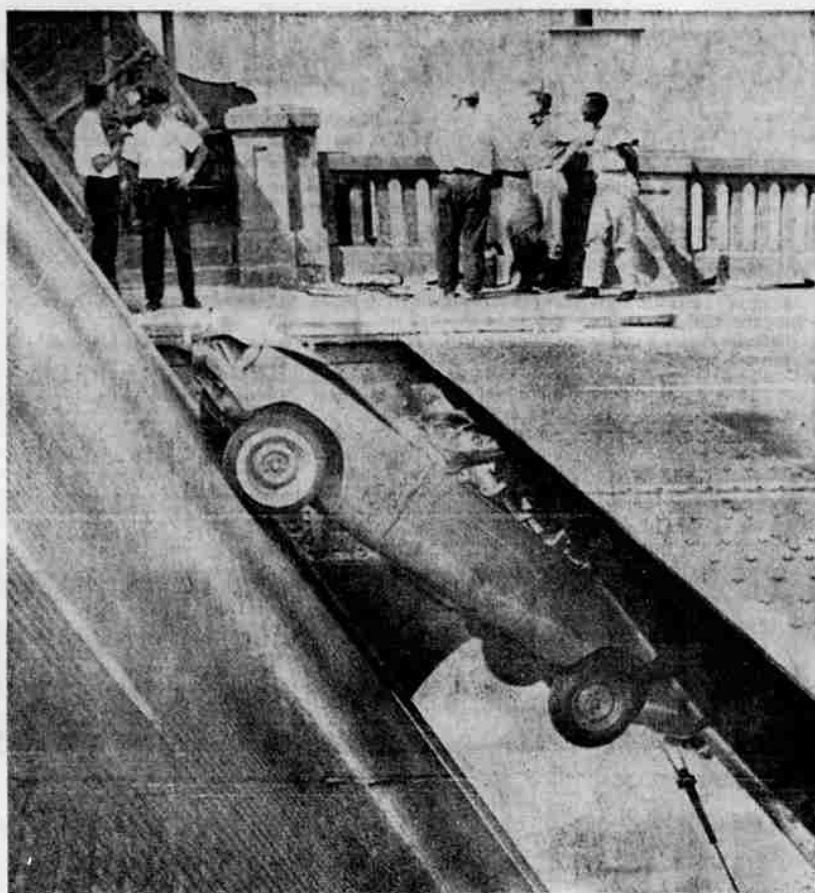

Planes Hunt For Capsules In Manitoba

SUNNYVALE, Calif. (AP)—A wide-area search was in progress Monday for two monkeys and four hamsters, lost over northeastern Manitoba when the giant research balloon from which they were suspended in capsules drifted away from its tracking plane.

Brad Evans, information director of the Ames Research Center, which directed the experiment to test radiation effects on the animals, said planes were searching a wide area for the four capsules which contained the animals and other experiments.

Launched Thursday

The balloon, part of a National Aeronautics and Space Administration experiment, was launched Thursday from Goose Bay, Labrador. It became lost in a storm sometime Saturday night, Evans said.

He said a broad search would have to be conducted because of uncertainty about where the capsules came down. Canadians living in the area, about 1,900 miles from the launch site, were alerted to be on the lookout for the red and white parachute or the capsules.

The balloon, which floated across the continent at an altitude of 135,000 feet, was equipped to drop its capsules automatically by parachute when it got below 30,000 feet.

Rations Aboard

"We assume it is down," said Evans. "There has been no further contact."

He said the capsule containing the animals was equipped with enough food to sustain the Rhesus monkeys and hamsters for 70 hours.

The experiment was designed to study radiation effects on the animals during high-altitude flights. Radiation measuring equipment and instruments to observe the animals' reactions were also contained in the capsules.

Soblen's Attorneys To Challenge Order

LONDON (AP)—Dr. Robert A. Soblen's attorneys go to Britain's high court again Tuesday for another legal attempt to save the fugitive spy from the life sentence waiting for him in the United States.

The lawyers for the 61-year-old psychiatrist said they would ask the court for Soblen's release on a writ of habeas corpus and challenge the order Home Secretary Henry Brooke issued Saturday for Soblen's deportation to the United States.

'Illegal Extradition'

Soblen's lawyers are expected to argue that while Brooke can expel the fugitive from the country, he cannot direct that he be delivered to the United States because that would constitute illegal extradition. Soblen was convicted of wartime spying for the Soviet Union, and espionage is not an extraditable crime under the U.S.-British extradition treaty.

Soblen remained in London's Brixton Prison. He may be there for several weeks while the legal battle is fought.

Brooke issued the deportation order after repeated frustration of British government attempts to send Soblen to New York by El Al, the Israeli government-owned airline which landed Soblen in Britain July 1. The Israeli government, under severe political pressure at home, said it would take Soblen out of Britain but it would only take him to Israel, not to the United States.

Expelled by Israel

Soblen late in June jumped \$100,000 bail in New York and fled to Israel on a dead brother's passport. The Israeli government expelled him and put him on an El Al plane bound for New York with a U.S. marshal aboard.

As the plane crossed Europe, Soblen slashed a wrist and stabbed himself in the abdomen to get himself landed in Britain. The British high court and the Court of Appeals already have denied Soblen a writ of habeas corpus and upheld the government's contention that the doctor had no legal right to remain in Britain. The court has not ruled on whether the government can specify Soblen's destination when he leaves Britain. Communist Czechoslovakia has offered him asylum.

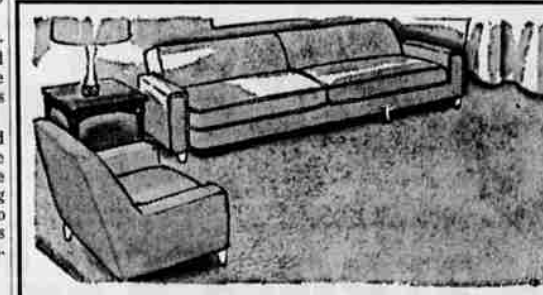
Flames Destroy Mammoth Stage

VERONA, Italy (AP)—Fire destroyed the mammoth opera stage at the ancient Roman amphitheater of Verona Sunday night.

Two stage hands and a fireman were injured slightly fighting the blaze.

Stage hands had just moved scenery in place for the night's performance of Giuseppe Verdi's "Un Ballo in Maschera" when the fire raced through the canvas, wood and cardboard props.

The blaze destroyed both scenery and stage. Officials estimated damage at \$30,000.

Oregon Fatalities

Weekend Mishaps Claim 8

Accidents reported over the weekend claimed the lives of eight persons in Oregon. Four were killed in automobile mishaps, two died in fires, one drowned and one was killed in a fall.

The automobile victims were George Raymond—Evanoff, 15, Roseburg; Jasper R. Blair, 52, Vancouver, Wash.; Rena Belum, 67, River Falls, Wis.; and Kenneth Raymond Logan, 26, Grande Ronde.

Head Injuries

Evanoff and Gary Lee Charon, 17, Sutherlin, were run over while lying in the middle of a road near Roseburg. Charon suffered severe injuries. Police are attempting to learn why the youths were lying on the road.

Blair suffered fatal head injuries when a Jeep ran off a road deep in Deschutes Canyon in Eastern Oregon. Steve O'Meara, The Dalles, who also was in the Jeep, suffered non-critical injuries.

The Wisconsin woman was killed outright and three other persons, all of them tourists from out of state, were injured in a three-car collision on Highway 99 south of Roseburg. Logan was killed when his car crashed into a power pole near Grande Ronde Saturday.

Man Drowns

The fire victims were Maceo Mayberry, about 35, and Mrs. Myrtle Townsend, 79, both of Portland. Fire investigators said Mrs. Townsend, who was blind and partially crippled, suffered fatal burns from a smoker's carelessness in a fire at her home. Mayberry is believed to have died from asphyxiation as the result of falling asleep while smoking.

Oakley Sage, about 65, of Springfield, drowned when his fishing skiff smashed up against the north jetty of the Umpqua River near Reedsport in Southern Oregon. Mary Roberts, 55, Eugene, who also was in the boat, was rescued by the Coast Guard.

Lester S. Wright, 68, was found dead at the foot of a cliff near Cove Palisades State Park on the Deschutes River Saturday. He apparently fell and struck his head on a stone.

Crane Falls Onto Tracks

NEW YORK (AP)—A highway construction crane toppled from an overpass onto Long Island Railroad tracks Monday, badly damaging the first of a five-car train and injuring six passengers, five of them critically, police reported.

The injured were taken to St. John's Hospital by police and hospital disaster units that were called to the scene in the Woodside section of Queens. All power was cut off on a major portion of the Long Island's Queens Line at the order of fire officials, but there was no fire.

Police said the crane was being used in construction of the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway when it toppled from the overpass onto the railroad right of way. The train was en route from the Jamaica Station in Queens to Pennsylvania Station in Manhattan.
