

Senator Lodges Protest

Tax Bill Up For Action

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate took up the administration's tax revision bill Monday amid demands from critics that they be allowed ample time to debate proposed changes.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., protested that he had been advised that leaders had agreed to use tabling motions to chop off debate on dozens of pending amendments. A motion to table is not debatable.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana replied that no agreement had been reached with anyone. But he said he was reserving the right to make tabling

Heavy Load Fills Docket Of Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—Heading into what they hope will be the final month of the session, the Senate and House buckle down Monday to a full week of work.

Twenty-two bills, several of them highly controversial, were crowded onto Monday's House calendar, to be followed Tuesday by consideration of a \$900-million public works bill.

Poll Tax Bill

Top attraction on the House docket is a proposal to eliminate payment of poll taxes as a qualification for voting in elections involving federal office. It is one of 13 bills slated to be called up today under a procedure requiring a two-thirds vote for passage.

Inasmuch as the proposal would submit the poll tax issue to the states as a constitutional amendment, it would need a two-thirds vote for passage at any time. To become effective it would have to be ratified by three-fourths of the states.

The poll tax measure easily mustered the two-thirds easily needed in the Senate and its House backers were confident they could steer it through their branch.

Only Five States

Only five states still impose such taxes. They are Virginia, Texas, Mississippi, Alabama and Arkansas.

Sharing top billings in the House Monday were bills dealing with housing for elderly persons in rural areas, bank mergers, several measures affecting internal security and establishment of a communications satellite system.

The satellite bill passed the House once before, stirred up a hornet's nest and a filibuster in the Senate before passage there, and is back in the House for action on Senate amendments.

Republican Raps Rival

HEPPNER (AP)—Robert Chandler, Republican candidate for second district congressman, charged during the weekend that residents of 18 counties of Eastern Oregon are not being properly represented in Congress.

Chandler accused Democratic incumbent Al Ullman of failing to represent constituents in four specific areas.

He said Ullman promised two years ago that if elected he would straighten out the lumber industry. Chandler said the industry is "worse now than it was two years ago."

He said a farm bill backed by Ullman "would have shackled the hands of efficient wheat growers and all other agricultural growers."

Chandler pointed to medicare as another area where he said voters are not being represented in their wishes. Chandler also said Ullman has never voted against the AFL-CIO or Americans for Democratic Action.

Chandler's remarks were made while he visited the Morrow County fair.

U.S. Investigating Shelling of Havana

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government pressed an investigation Monday to determine if the shelling of Havana violated the U. S. Neutrality Act.

The State Department already has pinned on a Miami-based exiled Cuban students group the responsibility for Friday night's attack, but has not said whether the raiders sailed from this country.

The neutrality law prohibits launching from U. S. soil armed attacks on countries not at war with the United States. The Justice Department is trying to find out if prosecutions under this law are called for.

In a Miami news conference Sunday, Juan Manuel Salvat, leader of the students group, declined to say where the ships used in the off-shore shelling of Miramar suburb were based. But, he declared, "I don't feel we have violated any law of any country."

In holding the Students Revolutionary Directorate responsible for the sortie the State Department warned Saturday that "any repetition of such action by any group could involve the provisions of the Neutrality Act."

A spokesman said the government had no advance knowledge of the attack.

While U. S. officials personally have some sympathy for exiled Cubans, they take the view that such hit-and-run attacks only serve to feed Prime Minister Fidel Castro's claim that he needs Communist arms to build up his defenses.

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U.S. Blames Berlin Woes On Russia

Urges 4-Power Talks on Problem

MOSCOW (AP)—The United States, in a note Monday, held the Soviet Union responsible for shooting and disorders along the Berlin wall and again invited it to a four-power conference to deal with the problem.

The note, delivered to the Foreign Office, replied to a Soviet note to the United States Friday which protested stoning of Soviet troop buses in West Berlin and warning that "necessary measures" would be taken.

"The U. S. government understands the concern of the Soviet government about the stone-throwing at Soviet personnel," the American note said, "but the Soviet government cannot expect to escape censure for, or to avoid the consequences of, permitting brutalities to occur in the sector of the city for which it is responsible."

The note cited what it called the "wanton provocations" in the Eastern sector.

"It should not be necessary to remind the Soviet government," it said, "that the present tensions in Berlin have been caused by the illegal erection of the wall and the senseless cruelty of the police of the Soviet sector."

The note was delivered less than 72 hours after the Soviet note was received, setting something of a record in exchanges between East and West Berlin.

The note called attention to the shooting of an East German youth Aug. 17 by East German police, who let him bleed to death without aid. It recalled also that on Aug. 23 "another young German was shot in the back by the police of the Soviet sector."

He was taken to a West Berlin hospital but died there.

BERLIN (AP)—An East German policeman took advantage of the changing of the guard Monday to escape across the Red wall to West Berlin.

Eyewitnesses said the policeman found himself alone for a few minutes while border guards were being changed along the wall.

JFK Visits Son, Returns to Work

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy returned to the White House Monday after a joyous reunion with his 21-month-old son Sunday at Newport, R. I.

The presidential jet landed at nearby Andrews Air Force Base, Md. The President took a helicopter to the White House. The jet flight from Quonset Naval Air Station, R. I., took only 41 minutes.

Kennedy flew to Newport Sunday to see John Jr., who has been staying with Mrs. Kennedy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss, while the First Lady is in Italy.

The President spent two nights at Hyannis Port, Mass., before flying Sunday to Newport, where he spent the night at the Auchincloss home.

Albany Child Revived After Fall Into Pool

ALBANY (AP)—Former Albany police officer Art Sass applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation Saturday to save the life of 18-month old Timmie Schappell.

Little Timmie fell into a plastic wading pool near a home Sass was visiting. He revived Timmie when the efforts of the child's mother, Mrs. Gene Schappell, failed.

School Is Desegregated Quietly in Pensacola, Fla.

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)—Negro pupils entered nine previously white Escambia County public schools Monday. The desegregation was done quietly and no incidents were reported.

Twenty-one Negroes went into the schools in the first such move in northwestern Florida. There were virtually no spectators on hand at the schools, which are scattered throughout the city and county.

Eighth Purple Heart

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Lt. Col. Howard C. Blazard of Louisville won his eighth Purple Heart award recently. He was wounded on a helicopter mission in South Viet Nam.

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
