

Springfield School Board Grading System Change Proposed

A pilot, non-graded program to start in 1963 in a large elementary school, for the first three years in school, has been recommended to the Springfield School Board.

A group of six Springfield elementary school principals presented the results of a study on the feasibility of adopting a program of levels of achievement instead of the traditional grading system.

Among their other recommendations were:

- An adequate budget to set up the new system and for an increase in books and supplies.
- A public relations plan to inform both parents and the public of the change.

Assistant Superintendent Douglas Olds told the board

"the non-graded situation is basically an administrative maneuver to improve both teaching procedures and the learning situation for students."

Asking the entire board to stand up, Olds said: "Look at the physical differences between yourselves. These same type differences exist in the first grades of school."

The board was told by the principals that first-year students will range as much as four years in physical and mental functioning.

Olds said the non-graded system would do away with the unrealistic pressures of promotion and retention in the same grade levels of achievement would instead provide more immediate goals for the students.

In other business the board accepted four new teachers to fill the complement for the year.

It also voted to accept the low bid of Mid-Century Insurance for auto and general liability insurance. Mid-Century's bid of \$4,873.62 was almost \$1,400 under the next price quoted by the General Accident Group.

Asylum Given U.A.R. Military Attache

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — The Syrian government says it has granted political asylum to a United Arab Republic military attache who fled his post in Lebanon.

The government said Maj. Zaghoul Abdalrahman crossed the Syria-Lebanon border Monday. He was the first U.A.R. diplomatic official to seek refuge in Syria since the Middle Eastern country pulled out of President Gamal Abdel Nasser's U.A.R. last September. Damascus has charged U.A.R. terrorist groups based in Lebanon have been operating in Syria.

Power Officials To Tour Russia

PORTLAND (AP) — Bonneville Power Administrator Charles F. Luce was among U.S. officials who left the nation's capital Tuesday with Interior Secretary Stewart Udall for the Soviet Union.

They will visit dams, hydroelectric power installations and extra high voltage lines. They will start back home from Moscow Sept. 8.

In the delegation, among others, are Undersecretary of the Interior James K. Carr, Federal Power Commission Chairman Joseph C. Swidler and Power Commissioner Howard Morgan, a former Oregon public utility commissioner.

The trip is in the nature of an exchange for a visit to the United States last spring of a 12-man team of Soviet power specialists.

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Commission Proposes Ban On Billboards

BEND (AP) — Proposals that billboards be forbidden on four central Oregon highway stretches were made Monday by the state scenic commission.

The Oregon Roadside Council suggested that the stretches be designated as scenic areas. That would ban signs and billboards, except those already up. These could remain for seven years.

The ban would not include on-premise signs, official signs, and those advertising sale or lease of property.

There were no strong objections to any of the proposals, although the Council of Outdoor Advertising suggested some modifications.

The commission has 30 days to decide on the proposals. Scenic areas suggested were: U.S. 20 from Bend to Sisters; U.S. 126 from Redmond to Sisters; U.S. 97 from north of Sisters to south of Madras; U.S. 20 from the old Bend-Burns Road east of Bend, to Millikan, about 12 miles distance.
