Science Sessions Drawing to Close

CORVALLIS (AP)—A meeting of more than 4,000 scientists nears an end Thursday night with an address by the secretary-general of the International Union of Biological Sciences.

He is G. Ledyard Stebbins, chairman of the Genetics Department at the University of California, Davis.

The joint meeting of the American Institute of Biological Sciences and the Pacific Division of the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science ends Friday.

Chromosomes, lung diseases and tadpoles were among topics discussed by the scientists Wednesday.

Chromosome Study
Scientists also heard a report on a new fingerprinting

system, which uses a plastic mixture instead of ink.

Susumu Ohno of the City of Hope Medical Center, Duarte, Calif., offered new ideas on the role of X chromosomes in human heredity. He said studies indicate that only one of the female cell's two X chromosomes are at work. It was previously thought that both X chromosomes were equally active in the developmental process.

Chromosomes carry genes, the units of heredity.

Hillel B. Levine of the Naval Biological Laboratory at the University of California, Berkeley, said vaccine to prevent a lung disease known as valley fever is currently being tested in humans.

Levine said the disease, widespread in Southwest states and northern Mexico, is acquired by inhaling spores of a fungus that grows in the soil. He said that in 50 per cent of the cases where it spreads throughout the body, patients die.

Protective Vaccine
Levine added, however, that experimental animals have been protected from the disease with the new vaccine.

The new fingerprinting method was described by Dr. Robert Tips of the Oregon Primate Research Center at Beaverton. He said the plastic mixture dries quickly and reveals a precise set of fingerprints when peeled off.

Tips said the method was developed in connection with a study linking diseases with fingerprints. Robert G. McKinnell, a Tulane University zoologist, said he had produced tadpoles by transplanting the nuclei of cancerous frog kidney cells into non-fertile frog eggs. However, he added, the tadpoles died of undetermined causes.

Knife Wounds, Acid Burns Inflicted on Young Wife

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP)—The blonde wife of a Hungarian doctor was still in critical condition Thursday at Santa Clara County Hospital, suffering from knife wounds and acid burns which her husband admitted inflicting on her.

A hospital spokesman said Mrs. Hajna de Kaplany, 25, suffered third degree acid burns over 60 per cent of her body and was injured internally. She had also been beaten and slashed with surgical instruments.

The husband, Dr. Geza de Kaplany, was held by San Jose police on a charge of attempted murder. Police said formal charges were held up pending the outcome of Mrs. De Kaplany's struggle for life.

De Kaplany, 36, told police he tied the hands and feet of his beautiful bride of five weeks and threw acid over her nude body, after beating and slashing her.

"I did it to frighten her," police quoted him as saying, "to put fear into her for being an adultress. She's not going to die. I just wanted to take her beauty away."

"I know for a fact that she has been unfaithful," he added. From her hospital bed, Mrs. De Kaplany, a former showgirl and fashion model, denied that she had been unfaithful.

Both Dr. De Kaplany and his wife were Hungarian refugees who came to this country after the revolution of 1956.

Town Resists Fairgrounds Destruction

DAMASCUS, Ore. (AP)—A Portland construction company has been trying to tear down buildings on the grounds of the Little World's Fair, but residents of this small community near Portland are resisting.

Adolfo Bardi, president of Bardi General Contractors, says the fair owes him \$14,000 for construction. Tuesday, his workmen ripped down the front of the fair's main office and carried away part of a boardwalk.

They were stopped when Fair President Garland Wiley asked them to show a court order giving them authorization, but they said they would return.

Wednesday, the workmen tried to get back on the fairgrounds, but Damascus residents lined up their cars bumper-to-bumper and held them off.

A spokesman for the fair said a suit has been filed against Bardi. It asks \$500,000, claiming that the construction firm has failed to meet contract agreements and overcharged for its work.

The Little World's Fair started with a great fanfare earlier this summer. But crowds have dwindled and financial troubles have beset the fair for several weeks.

Soblen Described As Political Refugee

LONDON (AP)—Dr. Robert A. Soblen was described by his lawyer in the Court of Appeal Thursday as a political refugee meriting sanctuary from the arm of American law.

The lawyer argued that the offenses for which Soblen was convicted in America—passing wartime secrets to the Russians—"touched upon the sovereignty of the United States."

Soblen, 61, is appearing against a High Court decision last week which approved a British deportation order.

Magazine Takes Issue With Jesuits

Warning to Jews Prompts Rebuff

NEW YORK (AP)—The Roman Catholic magazine Commonweal, edited by laymen, has criticized an editorial in America, a Catholic magazine edited by Jesuit priests, for warning Jews that pressure by some Jewish groups to keep religion out of public schools could encourage anti-Semitism.

America referred in its Sept. 1 issue to the U.S. Supreme Court decision outlawing an official prayer in New York State public schools, a move supported by some Jewish groups.

America urged that "provident leaders of American Judaism ask their more militant colleagues whether what is gained through the courts by such victories is worth the breakdown of community relations which will inevitably follow them."

Commonweal, in a lead editorial in its Sept. 7 issue titled "On Warning Jews," said it found America's approach to combating anti-Semitism "very odd."

"If there is any real danger of anti-Semitism among Catholics, then it is Catholics who ought to be warned. Indeed, 'warned' is too mild a word. They ought to be told as sharply as possible of the sin of any form of anti-Semitism," the editorial said.

The American Jewish Congress and two Reform Jewish groups have said that the America editorial amounted to a threat. They pointed out that Protestant, as well as some Catholic spokesmen, had supported the court's prayer decision and the principle of separation of church and state.

Anthem's Use As Prayer Ruled Illegal

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—Use of the Star-Spangled Banner as an official school prayer is illegal but, as the national anthem, it may be sung, read, and recited in public schools, the state education commissioner says.

In a formal ruling, Commissioner James E. Allen Jr., also said that schools could set aside periods of silence for meditation in place of spoken prayers.

He added that there was no objection to teaching about religions in public schools, although he said the teaching of religion was unconstitutional.

Allen's decision was taken as an official statement of the State Education Department position in the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court's opinion that barred use of official prayers in public schools in New York.

The commissioner had indicated that his ruling in the case involving the Star-Spangled Banner would attempt to provide guides for school boards on what was permissible under the Supreme Court decision.

After the court ruling, the Hicksville Board of Education on Long Island had designated the last stanza of the Star-Spangled Banner as a school prayer. It contains the words, "In God we trust."

Allen held that the board's action was contrary to the view of the court. The fact that it was officially adopted by the board, he said, made it an official prayer and thus illegal.
