

Demo Blasts Harriman's Salmon Stand

Magnuson Urges Fish Conservation

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Assistant Secretary of State Averell Harriman should resign immediately if he is unwilling to press his country's case for greater salmon conservation in the North Pacific, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., asserted Wednesday.

Magnuson called upon Harriman to reverse his stand taken Tuesday before a House subcommittee in opposition to legislation forcing nations that sell salmon in the American market to adopt conservation practices followed by American fishermen.

"Either the statement which Harriman presented to the committee is his opinion—or it is not," Magnuson said.

"If it is his opinion, then he should resign without delay. We must get on with high seas fisheries conservation, or there will be no fish for any nation to catch."

Magnuson pointed out that Harriman, as an official of the Department of State, "surely must have reviewed findings of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service that the Japanese have constantly increased their take of North Pacific salmon through fishing practices on the high seas which have been prohibited to American fishermen."

Magnuson also termed Harriman's statement "alarming, coming as it does when the need is increasing for getting a realistic salmon-fishing program under way to safeguard the salmon fishing industry from total destruction."

Harriman said the bill would make it more difficult to extend the North Pacific Convention, of which Japan is one of the signatory nations. The convention becomes subject next year to termination on one year's notice.

Fisher Urges Drive For Defense Projects

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy has a bill before him putting the community of Los Alamos, N.M., up for sale. The measure passed the House Wednesday.

The government hopes to net \$38 million from the sale of homes, apartments and stores in Los Alamos to private owners.

In Wednesday's opening round, he posted times of 16 seconds for steer roping and 11.5 seconds for calf roping.

Dean Oliver of Boise, Idaho, was second in calf roping with 14 seconds. Oliver leads all U.S. rodeo performers in dollar earnings so far this year.

Mark Schrieker of Sutherlin, Ore., is not far behind the leaders. He is fourth in calf roping and second in bulldogging.

Rodeo clown Wilbur Plaugher quit making fun in the arena long enough Wednesday to take first in bulldogging at 6.2 seconds.
