Ex-GOP Official Gets Prison Term

PORTLAND (AP)—A federal judge Wednesday sentenced Donald I. Quesinberry, 40, former Clackamas County Republican chairman, to a year in prison for transporting forged checks. A charge of illegal possession of draft cards was dismissed on a prosecution motion.

Quesinberry was arrested in San Francisco. Frank L. Price, San Francisco FBI agent, said more than \$30,000 in bogus checks were cashed.

District Judge Gus Solomon asked Quesinberry to tell federal agents what happened to the type used in printing the checks.

"I threw it away. I put it in a trash can outside the city hall in San Francisco."

"If it develops that you still have the type, it will not go well with you," said the judge.

Candidates Stepping Up Campaigns

The tempo of political activity is increasing in Oregon as the November election draws nearer.

Here is what some of the candidates are saying:

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, Democratic candidate for governor, proposes formation of an Oregon Commission to consult with Canadian officials on the state's lumber problems.

He told a Portland Democratic meeting Tuesday that negotiations "on a direct basis" are needed to solve the problem which permits Canadian lumbermen in Eastern U.S. markets.

Thornton also advocated a state consumer protection program for control of crime and delinquency.

Thornton's opponent will be Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Sig Unander, Republican candidate for U.S. senator, said that doctors and hospital administrators must take the lead in formulating effective medical care for the aged legislation.

His Democratic opponent, Sen. Wayne Morse, is scheduled to speak in Portland next Thursday.

Carl Fisher, Republican candidate for 4th District congressman, urged in a speech at Coos Bay that Americans stand behind President Kennedy in the tense Cuban situation.

Fisher's Democratic opponent is Robert Duncan, speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives.

Pat Blair, Salem, Republican candidate for state labor commissioner, will open his Portland campaign headquarters on Sept. 26. He now is touring Eastern Oregon.

His Democratic opponent is incumbent Norman O. Nilsen.

Grant Sought For Caravan

SALEM (AP)—A caravan of three exhibit trailers may tour Northwest school districts in the school year 1963-64 if a requested grant of \$900,575 is approved by the U. S. Office of Education.

The Oregon Board of Education has decided to ask for the grant, although the project is a cooperative one among the Northwest states.

The three units would be equipped with graphic descriptions of the use of new technological developments to improve teaching.

One of them shows what is possible in education. Another demonstrates new materials and equipment, mostly electronic. The third trailer shows new kinds of facilities, including demonstrations of new school design.

The mobile units would visit about thirty key communities throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana.

A team of experts would accompany the caravan to give lectures, demonstrations and lead discussions for local school boards, educators and citizens.

It is designed to help the local educators know what new developments are available to increase the quality of teaching, and the kinds of facilities needed to make the best use of new instructional materials and equipment.

Oregon would serve as the agent for the other states in the project, designed as the first phase in the development of a northwest educational research organization.

The overall aim is to improve public education in the Northwest.

Lloyds of London Named in Suit

PORTLAND (AP)—A \$100,000 suit was filed at U.S. District Court in Portland Tuesday against the famed insurance firm, Lloyds of London. The suit was brought by the congregation of Ahavath Achim Synagogue.

The congregation says the firm failed to make good on insurance claims regarding the recently demolished congregation temple.

The Jewish temple was torn down after it was damaged while being moved out of an urban renewal area. Lloyds had a contract to insure against damage caused by moving, the congregation said.

Lumbermen Meet

PORTLAND (AP)—The three-day semi-annual meeting of the Western Pine Assn. opened here Wednesday. Highlight will be an address Friday by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

Association president is J. B. Edens, Phoenix, Ariz. The association maintains its headquarters here with W. E. Griffee, Portland, secretary-manager.

Standing and special committees met Wednesday and Thursday.

Matters up for discussion include government timber sale policies which have been criticized by lumbermen.

\$20 Million Project

PORTLAND (AP)—A major federal installation to cost more than \$20 million is under consideration for the Baker, Ore., area. Sen. Wayne Morse said through his Portland office.

Morse said a decision on whether the project will go there will be made within 10 days.

"I cannot reveal the nature of it yet," he said, but added that it would bring a substantial, continual payroll.

Workman Killed

POWERS (AP)—Earl Garred, 27, was killed instantly Wednesday when struck by a falling trailer from a logging truck at the Coos Bay Timber Co. log dump here.

Truck owner Beaty Lay, Powers, said the trailer was being hoisted on the rear of the truck when the accident occurred. He said that apparently the brakes on the hoisting machine were damp, causing the trailer to slip.

Garred is survived by his widow and three children.

JPs Appointed

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Mark O. Hatfield announced the appointment Wednesday of two justices of the peace in Union County.

He named Walter F. Ruberg, Union, for the Union district, and Harold A. Decker, La Grande, for the La Grande district.

Ruberg succeeds E. L. Knight and Decker succeeds George H. Miller.

Death Investigated

PORTLAND (AP)—Jean Paul Dionne, 40, died Tuesday following a scuffle outside his trailer home. Sheriff's officers said he apparently suffered a heart attack after an altercation with Harold Radke, owner of a trailer court. An autopsy is planned.

Morse Suggests 'McNary Unit'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said Tuesday he has asked that one of the management units of the Oregon & California lands be designated as the Senator Charles McNary forest.

Morse said he made the suggestion to Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall in connection with the 25th anniversary of the O&C Sustained Yield Act. McNary was instrumental in securing passage of the act, Morse said.

In his letter to Udall, Morse said the designation would "serve as an inspiration throughout the years to those who benefit from Charles McNary's devotion to wise forest use and would create a safeguard for the principles for which he stood."

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
