## High Court Justice Given Alumni Post

Justice A. T. Goodwin of the Oregon Supreme Court has been elected president of the University of Oregon Alumni Assn. for 1962-63.

Goodwin has been active in university alumni affairs and has served on the association's executive committee for a number of years. He was graduated from the university School of Journalism in 1947 and received a bachelor of laws degree in 1949 and a doctor of jurisprudence degree in 1951 from the university School of Law.

In the alumni association elections, held last Saturday, Lester E. Anderson of Eugene, class of '43 and former alumni secretary, was named vice-president, and Willis Warren of Portland, '30, was named treasurer.

Elected to the executive committee were Corland Mobley of Portland, '51; Robert Davis of Grants Pass, '48; Robert Thomas of Bend, '36; Orville Thompson of Albany, '35; Robert Summers, Eugene, '55; and Groer Drew, Klamath Falls, '36. The elected officers and the alumni secretary, William Landers, also serve on the executive committee.

The alumni association, Landers said Thursday, is now operating under the new constitution adopted last spring. This provides dues-free membership for all graduates and all former students of the University. The alumni magazine, "Old Oregon," now goes to all these members, who total more than 42,000.

Under the new constitution the association is governed by an expanded board of directors, which includes the executive committee, student and administrative representation, and representatives from the Duck Club, Oregon Mothers, Oregon Dads, and other allied organizations.

# Well Liability 'A Mistake'

The City of Springfield should not consider itself economically liable for claims that construction of a trunk line sewer has caused several wells to go dry in the vicinity of 54th and Main streets, city officials were informed Friday.

Sidney S. Lasswell, representative of the engineering firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield of Corvallis, made this statement in a letter to Lem Eison, city engineer.

L. M. Spurrier, 5390 McKenzie Highway, told the city council last week that the recent installation of the sewer line has dried up his 20-foot well. "I feel I have been damaged," he said. The council then called for an investigation.

Lasswell's letter said: "After our investigation of the well difficulties on the Spurrier property, it is my opinion that the city should not consider payment of claims for damages on such shallow wells as a result of the recent sewer construction."

Lasswell said that while there is some evidence that the sewer construction could have had some effect on the Spurrier well, it is also "very possible," because of the well's shallow depth, that a combination of other factors also contributed to the difficulty.

"There is no reason at this time to believe that the condition is permanent, since it is very possible that the groundwater later will re-establish and maintain itself during the coming winter. Because of these circumstances, we feel the city would be making a mistake in setting a precedent for payment of damages on any private below-ground installation as a result of utility construction in public right-of-way," the letter concluded.

City Manager Frank Smiley is expected to discuss contents of the letter with the city council Monday night.

## Compromise Reached On Sidewalk Location

Springfield councilmen, meeting informally Thursday evening, with M Street property owners, agreed on a "compromise proposal" for the location of a proposed sidewalk between Eighth and Ninth Streets.

Property owners originally petitioned for construction of a sidewalk adjacent to the curb. The city's normal policy, however, calls for about a six-foot-wide parking strip between sidewalk and curb if there is sufficient right-of-way.

Councilmen, after viewing the premises in question, told property owners Thursday night they will approve a plan calling for location of the sidewalk about three feet from the curb. This proposal "splits the difference" between what property

## Real Estate Board Selects E.H. Peterson

Lane County Planning Commission member Earl H. Peterson, 73, has been named "Eugene Realtor of the Year" by the Eugene Real Estate Board.

Peterson was selected Thursday by a special committee of the real estate board. His selection follows an announcement this week by the Springfield Board of Realtors that Daren Engel was selected as that city's realtor of the year.

Both realtors become candidates for the title of "State Realtor of the Year" to be awarded Sept. 28 at the annual state convention and educational conference of the Oregon Assn. of Real Estate Boards in Pendleton.

## Missouri Barn

Peterson was born in Missouri July 11, 1889, and has lived in the Pacific Northwest since the age of 13. He has been a real estate broker in Eugene since 1926.

Peterson is the only member of the Lane County Planning Commission who has served on that board since it was created in 1949. The award cites him for "community, realty, and fraternal service."

## Headed State Group

He held the post of president of the Oregon Assn. of Real Estate Boards in 1945, and was a director of the organization from 1940 to 1945. Peterson served one term on the Eugene Planning Commission in 1948, and has since been a member of the Lane Commission.

He has been a member of the Eugene Elks Lodge for 44 years, and is past chairman of that group's board of directors. He holds a lifetime membership.

Peterson and his wife, Hazel, reside at 2290 Lariat Dr., Eugene.

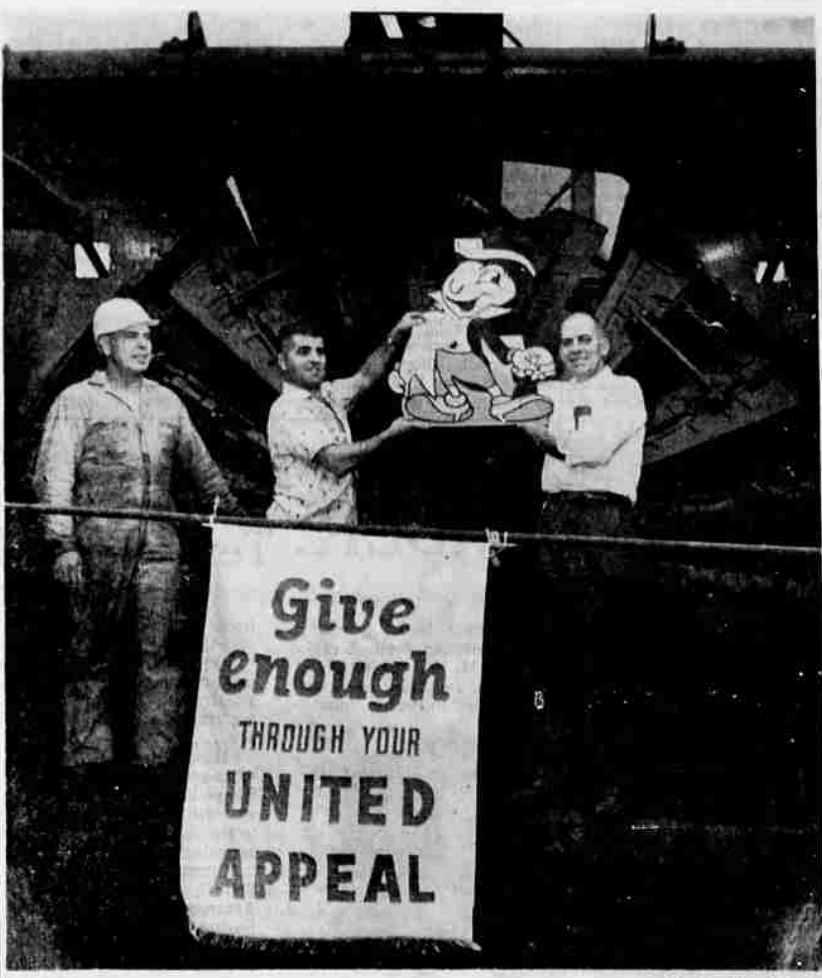

## Smoke, Clouds to Keep Lid On Emerald Empire Awhile

Eugene, Springfield and much of the rest of the Emerald Empire will have a mostly cloudy sky through Saturday as smoke continues to hang over the area.

The smoke, various sources indicated, came from burning of woodland slash and from stubble. It is trapped over the area, the Eugene weatherman said, by an "inversion"—that weather phenomenon occurring when air at upper altitudes is warmer than the air near the ground. The warm upper air serves as a "lid" to keep smoke and fog in the valleys.

Above the smoke, the Eugene weatherman said, are clouds. He expects partly cloudy skies tonight and Saturday, with a high temperature of 72 degrees both days. Regional forecasters predict that temperatures will remain in the 70s for the next five days, and that there will be little or no precipitation over the weekend.
