ST. LOUIS (AP)—Ken Boyer singled home the winning run in the ninth inning as the St. Louis Cardinals dropped the San Francisco Giants four games behind the idle first-place Los Angeles Dodgers by defeating the Giants 5-4 Thursday night.
 The Giants carried a 4-3 lead

into the ninth inning which Curt Flood opened with a single of Dick LeMay, the losing pitcher. Stan Musial's single sent Flood to third and Flood scored the tying run on LeMay's balk.

Don Larsen, the fifth giant pitcher, walked Bill White intentionally and Boyer followed with his game-winning hit.

The San Francisco setback made the Dodgers' magic number six. That is, any combination of Dodger victories and Giant losses totaling six will clinch the pennant for Los Angeles. Each club has nine games left.

Bob Duliba, who worked a scoreless ninth, was the winning pitcher as the Cardinals ended an eight-game losing

streak. Duliba has a 2-0 record. LeMay is 0-1.

Hero Boyer had threatened to become a goat when the Giants broke a 1-1 tie with three runs, two unearned, off starter Ernie Broglio in the sixth inning.

With two on, Boyer threw wild on Orlando Cepeda's first sacrifice bunt in two years. Two runs scored with the help of Julian Javier's late throw home. Tom Haller's sacrifice fly brought in the third run.

The Cardinals bounced back with two runs in the seventh.

Starter Jack Sanford, who allowed only four hits but walked five and hit one batter, began the seventh by yielding a single to Julio Gotay and walking pinch-hitter Red Schoendienst.

Javier popped up but Flood walked. With a 3-2 count on Musial, southpaw Billy Pierce replaced Sanford and Musial walked, forcing in a run.

After White popped out, Bob Bolin relieved Pierce and Chuck Hiller muffed Boyer's grounder to let in another run.

The Giants scored a run in the second on a walk and singles by Sanford and Harvey Kuenn.

The Cards tied it in the third on Hiller's first error, Javier's single, a hit batsman and Musial's sacrifice fly.

Patton Joins Trio In Am Semifinals

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP)—Billy Joe Patton, 40, trying for the 12th time to win his first U.S. Amateur Golf Championship, attempts another step toward the coveted title Friday, with three youthful contenders.

Labron Harris Jr., in his third national amateur, and two first-timers, Charles Coody and Downing Gray, are the other survivors from the record entry of 2,000 men who started out full of hope earlier this month in sectional qualifying play.

Thirty-six hole semifinal competition was scheduled to begin with Patton meeting Harris and Gray facing Coody. The winners will meet in a 36-hole championship match Saturday, when former President Eisenhower, a

golfing companion of Patton at the Augusta National Club, joins the gallery.

Each semifinalist scored two victories Thursday over the demanding 7,051-yard No. 2 course at the Pinehurst Country Club.

Patton, a Morganton, N.C., lumber broker and three-time Walker Cup player, had the shortest route to the semifinals, winning his six matches in 92 holes while shooting 12 over par golf.

Harris, 20, an Oklahoma State student from Stillwater, Okla., has played 103 holes, four of them 2-1 matches, and shot nine over par.

Coody, a husky 25-year-old Air Force lieutenant from Stamford, Tex., has played closest to par, four over, in going 94 holes. Gray, 24, an insurance man from Pensacola, Fla., has traveled 104 holes and been 17 over par. Twice he's won on the 18th hole and once had to travel 20.

After a 2-1 fifth-round victory in which he three times had to come from behind to beat Duke sophomore John McKey of Orlando, Fla., Patton went back to his hotel to relax.

"No sense giving any of these young fellows any more of an edge than they already have," he said.

Never before has Patton advanced beyond the fourth round of the championship, and he gave evidence yesterday in his 7-6 quarterfinal romp over Jim Gabrielson of Athens, Ga., that he was getting fired up to meet the occasion.

He won four of the last five holes, three with birdies. Harris beat two-time public links champion Dick Sikes on the 21st hole and won three of the first seven back nine holes to put out Homero Blancas, 2-1. He had lost to the University of Houston star in the second round of the NCAA tournament last June.

Gray won the 12th and 13th holes to take the lead for the first time from fellow-Floridian Paul Desjardins of Miami Shores, then matched him on the five tense holes that followed to preserve his one-hole edge.

Coody, a former Texas high school basketball star, had to sweep the last three holes to win his quarterfinal match from Bill Newcomb of the University of Michigan.

Dupree, Boston Nab Track Meet Wins

HAMBURG, Germany (AP)—Jim Dupree of the United States won the 800 meters in 1:47.0 minutes at a floodlit international track-and-field meet Thursday night.

Former world record holder Ralph Boston easily took the broad jump with a mark of 25 feet 10.64 inches. He also won the 110-meter hurdles in 14.1 seconds.

Portland Golf Tourney Led By Nicklaus

PORTLAND (AP)—Jack Nicklaus and Tony Lema, 1-2 finishers in last week's Seattle Open, set the pace as the second round of the \$25,000 Portland Open began Friday.

Nicklaus, winner of the \$50,000 World Series of Golf the week before the Seattle Open, fired an eight-under par 64 Thursday to lead Lema by one stroke. At 66 were three-time Portland Open champion Billy Casper Jr. and Bob Rosburg.

Some 80 players found an easy touch on the par 36-36-72 Columbia-Edgewater course. The field will be cut to the low 70 and ties after Friday's round.

Nicklaus scored six birdies in a row from the seventh through 12th holes and had a total of eight birdies rounds of 31 and 33. He birdied all four par-5 holes, reaching the green in two strokes each time.

Lema, who made a strong closing finish at Seattle, holed a 140-yard iron shot for an eagle two on the third hole and had birdie putts of 12 and 15 feet to highlight a 33-32 round.

Casper said his putting was off, but he still managed a 32-34 to stay in strong contention for his fourth straight victory at Portland.

Rosburg matched Nicklaus for the day's best nine-hole score with a closing 31 after starting with a 35.

A huge gallery followed Nicklaus and Casper, who were paired with Australian Bruce Crampton. Only a few fans followed the other threesome as more than 100 professionals and amateurs played in cool, cloudy weather.

Californian Sets Mark
ROTTERDAM, The Netherlands (AP)—John Tarantino of San Francisco, bettered his own world record for the 1/2 ounce bait-casting with revolving spool at the world championships. He cast the bait 444 feet, 9 1/4 inches on his longest attempt. The Californian had an average of 424-1 1/2 for his three best casts of the five permitted. His world record was 433-3/4 and 409-11.

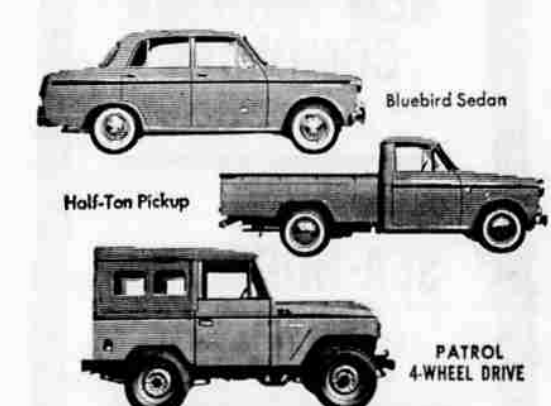

Aussies Need Wind

Weatherly Takes Lead in Cup Races

NEWPORT, R. I. (AP)—"Nothing's broken—only our hearts." They were Australian hearts, and it will take the kind of weather that sends a landlubber to the nearest dozy fireside to mend them again.

Doug Fairfax, portly spokesman for the Australian group that mounted a million-dollar challenge for the ugly old America's Cup, described the state of Australian equipment and hearts late Thursday after the yacht Gretel straggled into Newport harbor, badly-beaten, behind Weatherly, the American defender.

The victory, by the margin of 8 minutes and 40 seconds—about a mile of calm Atlantic water—gave Weatherly a 2-1 margin in the series. There will be no race Friday—the Australians again having exercised their privilege of skipping a day. The boats will tangle again Saturday.

The Americans will take Friday off, but the Australians will be out on the water all day, working to learn still more about Gretel, built in Sydney to challenge for the cup that represents world supremacy in yachting and never has been lost by America in the 111 years that men have sailed in pursuit of it.

The fourth race will be over the same triangular course on which Gretel scored her only victory Tuesday. Weatherly ran off with the first race, over the

upwind-downwind course used for Thursday's runaway.

It appeared certain it would take more than a course change to better Gretel's fortunes.

The Australians need wind—lots of it. The history of this series, of Weatherly, of Gretel and of the Australian crew proves the Australians are at their best in what yachtsmen call heavy weather, winds in the 15 miles an hour and up range.

The didn't get them Thursday. On the second leg of the four-leg course on which Weatherly shot into a 23-minute lead, the Australians ran into practically a dead calm.

When the winds picked up they regained some of the precious water, but they were never really in the race again.

For a time, it appeared to be a question of whether the American boat could finish the 24 miles under the six-hour time limit—if it had failed it would have been "no race"—but the freshened wind brought her home with more than an hour to spare.
